Advanced EAL Pupils



'Advanced bilingual learners are defined as pupils who have had all or most of their school education in the UK and whose oral proficiency in English is usually indistinguishable from that of pupils with English as a first language but whose writing may still show distinctive features related to their language.

Ongoing research shows that family engagement in schools improves student achievement, reduces absenteeism, and restores parents' confidence in their children's education. Introduction to EAL leaders



A fifth of student educators still had little confidence in their ability to support EAL learners and 13% felt they still had very little or no understanding of the needs of EAL learners. (The Bell Foundation 21st March 2019)

The role of the specialist EAL leader is to: share opportunities to draw on pupils' prior experience and first language. ... provide or develop differentiated resources to ensure pupils' access to the curriculum and development of EAL. Enable pupils with EAL to transfer skills from one topic/subject to another.

Developing EMA co-ordinators: New to role – This course provides an opportunity for staff to fully understand the scope of their work, develop their knowledge and skill base and also to strategically plan their support in school.

Supporting newly arrived learners who have English as an Additional Language (EAL)



The course explores a range of strategies and resources to support learners who arrive in schools or settings with little English or with English as an additional language.

What can you do when an EAL family arrives at your school?

What strategies are in place to ensure the EAL pupil and their family have the information they need?

Is your school website "welcoming" to EAL families and is the information cleat and accessible?

Does the school know about the strengths and weaknesses, likes and dislikes of a new EAL pupil?

Who and what information is given to EAL parents?

Is communicating in your first language important?

- Delegates will develop familiarity with a broad range of strategies and resources that support learners with English as an additional language across the stages.

A First Language Assessment aims to establish a pupil's level of competence and skill in his/her first language, i.e. Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing, and to enable comparison between the pupil's levels of competence in first language versus additional language, i.e. English.

Festival assemblies and workshops

Southampton Language Services offers a selection of assembly's and workshops on different Festivals.

We will ensure your school has excellent cultural awareness around a selection of festivals. Our Bilingual Assistants celebrate these festivals in the UK having the experience and knowledge from their home country.

Our Bilingual Assistant's would like to tell you about the festivals, what they do, show you exemplar resources and use first language so that pupils can say some phrases in another language.

What assemblies and workshops can offer?

AIM:

Assemblies will be delivered for around 30-40 minutes on a school morning. An introduction will be given by using the Bilingual Assistant's first language and engaging the pupils. 2 members of staff will be delivering the session.

Outcome

Pupils will be able have an understanding of the festivals and will be able to share these important days with their friends in school. This will be part of every child's future.

AIM:

Workshops will be tailor made to be age specific and will give the pupils a much more cultural feeling of the festival as practical activities will be used. In some cases dance and singing will be used to make it more enjoyable. 2 members of staff will be delivering the session.

Outcome

To be involved in cultural relevant tasks and to have more exposure to culture and diversity at school.
