Disclosure of Interests

Members are required to disclose, in accordance with the Members' Code of Conduct, *both* the existence *and* nature of any "personal" or "prejudicial" interests they may have in relation to matters for consideration on this Agenda.

Personal Interests

A Member must regard himself or herself as having a personal interest in any matter

- if the matter relates to an interest in the Member's register of interests; or (i)
- (ii) if a decision upon a matter might reasonably be regarded as affecting to a greater extent than other Council Tax payers, ratepayers and inhabitants of the District, the wellbeing or financial position of himself or herself, a relative or a friend or:-
 - (a) any employment or business carried on by such person;
 - (b) any person who employs or has appointed such a person, any firm in which such a person is a partner, or any company of which such a person is a director:
 - (c) any corporate body in which such a person has a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £5,000; or
 - (d) any body listed in Article 14(a) to (e) in which such a person holds a position of general control or management.

A Member must disclose a personal interest.

Prejudicial Interests

Having identified a personal interest, a Member must consider whether a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably think that the interest was so significant and particular that it could prejudice that Member's judgement of the public interest. If that is the case, the interest must be regarded as "prejudicial" and the Member must disclose the interest and withdraw from the meeting room during discussion on the item.

It should be noted that a prejudicial interest may apply to part or the whole of an item.

Where there are a series of inter-related financial or resource matters, with a limited resource available, under consideration a prejudicial interest in one matter relating to that resource may lead to a member being excluded from considering the other matters relating to that same limited resource.

There are some limited exceptions.

<u>Note:</u> Members are encouraged to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer or his staff in Democratic Services if they have any problems or concerns in relation to the above.

Principles of Decision Making

All decisions of the Council will be made in accordance with the following principles:-

- proportionality (i.e. the action must be proportionate to the desired outcome);
- due consultation and the taking of professional advice from officers;
- respect for human rights;
- a presumption in favour of openness, accountability and transparency;
- setting out what options have been considered;
- setting out reasons for the decision; and
- clarity of aims and desired outcomes.

In exercising discretion, the decision maker must:

- understand the law that regulates the decision making power and gives effect to it. The decision-maker must direct itself properly in law;
- take into account all relevant matters (those matters which the law requires the authority as a matter of legal obligation to take into account);
- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);
- comply with the rule that local government finance is to be conducted on an annual basis. Save to the extent authorised by Parliament, 'live now, pay later' and forward funding are unlawful; and
- act with procedural propriety in accordance with the rules of fairness.

65. ELECTION OF CHAIR

<u>RESOLVED</u> that Councillor Parnell be appointed Chair for the purposes of the meeting.

COUNCILLOR PARNELL IN THE CHAIR

66. <u>MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING (INCLUDING MATTERS</u> <u>ARISING)</u>

RESOLVED that the Minutes of the meeting held on 24th March 2011 be signed as a correct record. (Copy of the minutes circulated with the agenda and appended to the signed minutes).

67. EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC

RESOLVED that in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 that the press and public be excluded at a predetermined point whilst the Sub-Committee reach its decisions.

68. <u>APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE - CRE8 LEISURE LIMITED,</u> <u>1ST AND 2ND FLOOR, 15-17 HIGH STREET, S014 2DF</u>

The Sub-Committee noted that the application for a premises licence in respect of Cre8 Leisure Limited, 1st and 2nd Floor, 15-17 High Street, Southampton, S014 2DF, had been withdrawn as agreement had been reached between the applicant and Environmental Health.

69. APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - PIZZA CHICKEN KEBAB HOT 2 YOU, 1A BEDFORD PLACE, SOUTHAMPTON

The Sub-Committee considered the report of the Solicitor to the Council detailing an application by Hampshire Constabulary – Licensing for a review of a premises licence in respect of Pizza Chicken Kebab Hot 2 You, 1A Bedford Place, Polygon, S015 2BY. (Copy of report circulated with the agenda and appended to signed minutes).

Mr J Wallsgrove, Solicitor for Pizza Chicken Kebab Hot 2 You, Mr N Mohammed, PC Harris and PS Marshman were present and, with the consent of the Chair addressed the meeting. The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED

- that the Sub-Committee noted that the parties had reached agreement prior to the commencement of the hearing as to suggested conditions and a proposed suspension of the licence for a period of 14 days, detailed below:-
 - 1. one SIA registered door staff to be employed on Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from midnight until 02.30;
 - last entry to the premises by members of the public will be 02.15 and all members of the public must have left the premises by 02.30;
 - 3. the permitted hours for late night refreshment and the opening hours set out in this premises licence after 02.30 are to be used solely for the purposes of the delivery service offered by the premises licence holder. For the avoidance of any doubt, this condition prohibits collection of any order by a member of the public from the premises after 02.15. Deliveries will only take place to a dwelling or place of work with a recognisable postal address;
 - 4. the premises licence will be suspended for a period of 14 days commencing on the day after the period of time given to appeal this decision or such earlier day as may be notified to the Local Authority and Police by the premises licence holder; and

the CCTV system will be checked on a weekly basis to ensure that all cameras are operational and the system is recording. A copy will be made onto disc of 5 minutes footage. From the system all footage will be kept for inspection by the Police for 3 months. A record of CCTV checks will be kept at the premises for inspection by the Police on request.

- (ii) that the above conditions as agreed be imposed, subject to the following amendments:-
 - 1. additional condition 3 shall have the following added:-
 - delivery destinations after 02.15 hours shall be recorded and kept for inspection by the Police for a period of at least seven days; and
 - delivery drivers or those making deliveries shall only access the premises by the rear entrance and shall not use the front door after 02.15 hours on any day;
 - 2. condition 4 shall not be implemented; and

3. additional CCTV condition (not numbered) be amended to state:-

The CCTV system will be checked on a weekly basis to ensure that all cameras are operational and the system is recording. As a record of this check, a copy will be made onto disc every seven days of 5 minutes footage from the system. All footage recorded shall be available for inspection immediately upon request by the Police at the premises. This includes both these records of checks as well as the continuous recording; and

(iii) that the premises licence be suspended for a period of 7 days.

REASON FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee considered the application for the review of the premises licence and gave due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance, the adopted Statement of Licensing Policy as well as representations made by both parties and accepted the agreed conditions with additional amendments.

The Sub-Committee had considered the proposed 14 day suspension of the licence and accepted that a suspension may be imposed as a deterrent, but noted that the Guidance to the Act required such to be necessary and proportionate in promoting the Licensing Objectives and felt that on this occasion it would be a disproportionate outcome which would have a further financial impact on the business, combined with the reduction in trading hours as implemented by the additional conditions.

The Sub-Committee accepted that this was a serious matter insofar as it was a second review regarding breaches of imposed conditions, but in assessing the impact of the breaches on the Licensing Objectives, particularly crime and disorder at or in the vicinity of the premises, the suspension as imposed was a more appropriate deterrent.

70. APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE - CO-OPERATIVE, 195-197 SHIRLEY ROAD, SOUTHAMPTON, S015 3FJ

The Sub-Committee considered the report of the Solicitor to the Council detailing an application for a premises licence in respect of Co-operative, 195-197 Shirley Road, Southampton, S015 3FJ. (Copy of report circulated with agenda and appended to signed minutes).

Mr J Wallsgrove, Solicitor for Co-Operative, G Foley, Co-Operative Manager and Mr R Fenton, Objector were present and, with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED that the application for a premises licence in respect of Co-Operative, 195-197 Shirley Road, Southampton, S015 3FJ be granted , subject to the mandatory conditions contained within the Licensing Act 2003, the conditions consistent with the operating schedule and such conditions relating to the statutory licensing objectives as are deemed necessary, with the following additional conditions:-

- (i) CCTV shall be installed at the premises covering both internal and external areas and shall be of a standard and specification to be agreed in writing by the Police, prior to installation and the sale of alcohol at the premises. The location of the cameras, retention of images and access to the images shall form part of that agreement, with the system being maintained to that standard; and
- (ii) the holder of the premises licence will ensure that every individual who appears to be under 25 years of age, seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at or from the premises shall produce means of identification acceptable to the licensing authority, proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older. If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee considered the application for a premises licence and listened very closely to the resident's concerns regarding issues of nuisance and underage drinking in the area. The Sub-Committee gave due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance and the adopted Statement of Licensing. However, the Sub-Committee were of the opinion that the imposition of the above conditions would ensure that the premises did not add or contribute to those issues raised and residents should be reassured by the strict controls upon premises once a licence was granted.

The Sub-Committee accepted legal advice that commercial need or demand could not be taken into consideration whilst reaching its decision and likewise issues not related to the Licensing Objectives ie planning had been excluded.

Having considered all the above matters, it was felt that the decision would maintain a fair balance between the interests of the applicant and those of the residents.

71. <u>APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - CLOWNS</u> <u>WINE BAR, 112-118 BEVOIS VALLEY ROAD, SOUTHAMPTON, S014 OJZ</u>

The Sub-Committee noted that the above application had been adjourned to Thursday 21st April 2011, in order to allow all parties to receive the relevant documentation timeously and to enable the applicant to obtain legal representation.



Legal Implications

- The Licensing Act 2003 specifically restricts the grounds on which the Council, as Licensing Authority (LA), may refuse an application for a new Premises Licence, or impose conditions. Where relevant representations are made, the LA may refuse on the grounds that the licensing objectives are not met or the operating schedule is inadequate. Equally, conditions may be imposed where relevant and necessary. The LA may also refuse an application in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
- 2. The decision making committee, in considering an application, must have regard to the adopted Statement of Licensing Policy and any relevant representations made by those directly affected.
- 3. An applicant for a new Premises Licence whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court.
- 4. In considering this application the committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider applications in accordance with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, and amending secondary legislation and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the committee must makes its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching it's decision.

The committee must also have regard to:-

5. Crime and Disorder Act 1998

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the Council under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.

6. Human Rights Act 1998

The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the Council to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the Council that could have an effect upon another persons Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of Proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the Council which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matter set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

P Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e) (please read guidance note 9)

The premises are a general convenience shop, the applicant wishes to provide an off licence facility to responsible customers to compliment the goods already on offer. Since opening the applicant has received numerous requests to sell alcohol on an off licence basis. In the period 2nd February 2011 to 2nd March 2011 174 customers signed a document in the store indicating their support for an application for a licence to sell alcohol. The applicant has many years experience managing High Firs Stores and Post Office Sholing Southampton not only as post master (until the post office part was closed under the Government closure policy) but also as the designated premises supervisor, a similar operation which has successfully had an off license facility in an area with the same issues and challenges as the the area of the present premises and without any problems. The applicant, his brother and uncle (who have all substantially invested financially in this venture) together with his cousin all of whom are married and have children are engaged and work in the business. In addition to these family members a further one full time and two part-time staff will be employed. All concerned will ensure all four licensing objectives are adhered to and maintained.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Applicant:

(1) will communicate regularly with the Police (any other relevant agencies) and alert them to any potential trouble makers or individuals suspected of criminal behaviour in the area,make available to the Police CCTV recorded images,

(2) will train staff regularly in crime prevention measures appropriate to the premises, raise awareness of safe drinking, strictly enforce a policy to prevent under age sales (we will operate a policy of Challenge 25) and insist on production of proof of age cards,

(3) will maintain a log of crime and disorder occurances available for risk assessment and intelligence gathering process which will be reviewed by the applicant and premises supervisor at least weekly,

(4) will enforce all procedures for combatting violence and antisocial behaviour,

(5) will ensure intoxicating liquor is not sold to anyone where there are grounds to believe the sale would result in crime and disorder,

(6) will only use responsible drinks promotions e.g. set by "Premier" . Spirits located behind counter by tills, alcohol will be kept in chiller at rear righthand wall of the shop adjacent to the counter

(7) has an "EPOS" system on all tills which prompts to ask for ID on any restricted items then if refused it will print out a slip to allow applicant and his staff to record the details of the person they have refused. All staff have own ID's on the system so one can track who has made decisions

(8) has acquired a finger print system called "OKID", every customer will have to register with the database and every time they purchase alcohol their finger prints will be scanned and checked.

(9) will sell alcohol at above recommended retail price and not have cheap promotions or deals (in line Government recommendations).

(10) will keep alcohol against one wall half behind counter and other half immediately adjacent and at all times visible to members of staff.

(11)operates external and internal CCTV (16 cameras) constantly on and recording

(12) will operate specific labelling scheme (bottle stickers) to identify alcohol has been sold from the applicant's store

c) Public safety

The new layout of premises has been designed to ensure the safety of the public and staff ; all requirements of the Fire Authority are complied with. Regular safety checks with records kept to ensure all exit doors are easily openable; all fire doors maintained effectively, self-closing and are not held open other than by approved devices; fire resisting doors to ducts, service shafts and cupboards are kept locked shut; edges of treads of steps and stairways are maintained so as to be conspicuous and all maintainance and servicing in accordance with the authorities recommendations and best practice.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

The responsible sale of alcohol and the procedures described in paragraph b) above will achieve a major contribution to the prevention of public nuisance. The applicant will be always vigilant to ensure the operation of the business does not pose a risk of public nuisance on or in the vicinity of the premises

e) The protection of children from harm

The protection of children from harm is of paramount importance to the applicant. The applicant will operate a policy requiring individuals who appear to the responsible person (i.e. the designated premises supervisor, or holder of the premises licence, or individual aged 18 or over who is authorised and employed by the designated premises supervisor or holder of the premises licence) to be under the age of twenty-five years of age to produce on request before being sold alcohol identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and holographic mark (e.g. a photo card driving licence, a passport, a proof of age card bearing the PASS hologram). The applicant will regularly (at least every 3 months) have training for staff and ensure that the staff are made aware of the existence and content of the above policy. The applicant will display "Challenge 25" and other relevant signage. The strict operation of the procedures referred to at paragraph (b) above to control the sale of alcohol are repeated. The register of refusals which will be kept and reviewed weekly by the designated premises supervisor will be supported by evidence from the "EPOS" and "OKID" systems acquired and operated by the applicant.



On behalf of the Chief Officer of Police I am writing to lodge a representation of the above application on the following grounds:

- 1) The prevention of Crime and Disorder
- 2) Public Safety
- 3) The Prevention of Public Nuisance
- 4) Protection of Children from Harm

The police have concerns over the application. These concerns are outlined below:

The Premier Convenience Store is situated on Aldermoor Road on the end of a short parade of shops. Within this parade is a Ladbrokes (betting shop), a hairdressers, Cap n' cods (a Fish and Chip shop) and Best One Express (another convenience store). In April 2010 Best One Express applied for an alcohol licence at their premise which was successfully objected to due to the anti-social behaviour in the area. These premises are very close to a subway under Lordshill Way where youths tend to congregate. In the past the youths have caused numerous problems outside the parade of shops, and there has previously been an alcohol licence at this premise which was held by the CO-OP. There were numerous problems which resulted in the CO-OP closing the store in early December 2006 and finally surrendering their alcohol licence in February 2008.

The senior officer responsible for the area, Inspector Rachel Stokes, states that in her role in setting community priorities for the area that residents and police feel the main problem is anti-social behaviour by youths fuelled by alcohol. She also describes how there are other alcohol licences held in the area who report problems of alcohol thefts, problems with youths congregating around the store intimidating customers and trying to obtain alcohol. She feels that if the premise in Aldermoor Road does start selling alcohol the current level of disorder will increase dramatically.

One of the police officers responsible for policing that area, PC Christopher Pell, states that he is seeing alcohol related anti-social behaviour occurring in the area close to these shops involving youths gathering in groups intimidating those who attend the shops as well as those who actually work within the shop themselves.

These problems can be seen in a statistical report, which was created for Best One Express objection and although a year old is relevant as looks at the statistics for the area when there was an alcohol licence at the CO-OP between the 28th October 2002 and the 8th December 2006. A dip sample of anti-social reports during 2006 show 54 anti-social behaviour related calls were made in the area, 57% (34) of these reports related to youths congregating and causing problems outside of the shops. Due to

this it was deemed necessary to implement at Section 30 Dispersal Zone, this requires evidence of the anti-social nature of the problems to be presented to a superintendant and equivalent rank at the city council for approval. It gives police officers the power to give groups engaged or likely to engage in anti-social behaviour a requirement to leave, if they do not follow this requirement or return then there is a power of arrest. This dispersal Zone was authorised in the Aldermoor Road area to run from 20th May 2005 to 19th November 2005. During this time period there were 46 dispersals records recorded on our systems, the majority on Aldermoor Road, showing how frequently this power was used by officers. This resulted in the power being extend for a further six months until 19th May 2006.

The applicant has made numerous commitments under crime and disorder which includes CCTV, challenge 25, staff training and an incident book. He also states that he will enforce all procedures for combating violence and anti-social behaviour though does not state what these procedures are specifically. Then he goes on to state that he will ensure intoxicating liquor is not sold to anyone where there are grounds to believe the sale would result in crime and disorder. It is not described how the he intends to implement this. With regards to alcohol placement, if a licence is issued against our objection then we would like all alcohol to be kept behind the counter and in a closed cabinet to reduce the high risk of theft. Looking at incidents during 2006, which was the last year of trading for the CO-OP there were a number of alcohol thefts at the store by young people and often the CCTV not helpful in identifying the offenders as they wore hoods up or baseball caps. There were also a couple of incidents where people asked for ID under the challenge 25 scheme left the store with the alcohol without showing ID, one left money on the counter for the alcohol, another did not pay but both did not show the requested ID.

The final pledge that the applicant makes is not something that we have seen before in relation to alcohol licence applications, this is the OKID fingerprint scanner. I am curious as to whether the customers signing up for alcohol sales in store have had this system explained to them as often people bulk at having their fingerprints taken. The applicant makes reference to operating other stores in similar areas across the city but has this system been trailed or used in those areas and what has the response been.

Under public nuisance the applicant has added that he will always be vigilant to ensure that the operation of the business does not pose a risk of public nuisance on or in the vicinity of the premise. This does not explain how this will be done.

Hampshire Constabulary believe that were the premises granted an alcohol licence it is likely that staff would be targeted by youths to an even greater extent. These youths would attempt to steal alcohol, encouraging adults to buy it for them or intimidate the staff in an attempt to obtain alcohol. The granting of a licence would serve to exacerbate anti-social behaviour in the area to the detriment of local residents.

To Whom it May Concern

I am the Safer Neighbourhood Team Inspector for Shirley part of my role is to ensure that my staff are deployed in the right areas to tackle crime and anti social behaviour.

By far and away the biggest issue for both Police and members of the public is anti social behaviour which is fuelled by alcohol. This is supported by the numbers of incidents we have reported through the control room and through our engagement with members of the community.

We have various ways of tackling this problem which include the alteration of staff working hours and specifically targeted operations, including educating adults regarding the purchasing of alcohol for juveniles by placing Police Officers outside licensed premises, we also mark bottles within various licensed premises to identify where alcohol is being purchased that we seize from juveniles. There have been successes in this area and this can be measured but fewer calls received from members of the public regarding anti social behaviour.

We hold priority setting meetings across the Division and time and time again one of the main issues for those attending is anti social behaviour fuelled by alcohol among youths.

There are already several shops in this area with alcohol licences, and local residents are able to attend these other stores close by in order to purchase alcohol. All these stores regularly report alcohol thefts, and problems with youths congregating around the store, intimidating customers and trying to obtain alcohol. I feel that if the premises in Aldermoor Road does start selling alcohol, the current level of disorder which will increase dramatically.

Subject : Aldermoor Road Objection

To whom it may concern.

It is the intention of the local Police to object to request for an alcohol licence being made by the Premier store on Aldermoor Road.

The purpose of this brief report is to explain the reasoning behind this decision.

I would start by explaining that antisocial behaviour continues to be one of the biggest issues to all members of the community reported to Police. What can appear on the face of it to be only minor juvenile nuisance can in fact have a damaging effect on the quality of life of those it affects.

People who suffer at the hands of those responsible report that they can be left feeling intimidated to go to areas where they know they are likely to encounter an anti social behaviour. In more serious cases victims have reported feeling like prisoners in their own homes due to the behaviour of others and the fear it brings.

As Police officers we are regularly reminded of Fiona Pilkington, a lady who killed herself and her disabled daughter in 2007 having suffered years of anti social behaviour at her home address in Leicestershire, eventually feeling that she had no other choice but to end her life.

This particular case highlighted to the authorities the severe impact that anti social behaviour can have on vulnerable members of society and the need for all of those in a position to act to ensure that they do all they can to protect society from this type of behaviour.

Here in Hampshire, the Chief Constable takes a direct approach to the subject and over the past couple of years has encouraged all members of staff, including those who are office based, to spend at least one working day helping the safer neighbourhood teams to try and tackle the issue at peak times.

With this in mind the local safer neighbourhood Policing team would appose the granting of any further alcohol licences in the Aldermoor area of Southampton.

Our grounds for the objection are based on a belief that the granting of this licence will directly lead to an increase in antisocial behaviour in the Aldermoor Road area. At present we are seeing alcohol related antisocial behaviour occurring in the area close to these shops involving youths gathering in groups intimidating those who attend the shops as well as those who actually work within the shops themselves.

We are working to gather the names of those involved in order to deal with them on an individual basis and will consider the use of ABC's (Acceptable Behaviour Contracts) as well as ASBO's (Anti Social Behaviour Orders) in order to try and improve the quality of life of those in this locality.

As recently as 2006 we made use of a Section 30 Dispersal Order in order to deal with groups who conversed in the Aldermoor Road area. A Section 30 Dispersal Order is a piece of legislation available to

the Police which gives us power to remove and disperse groups in which ever particular area the order applied to.

In order to obtain the order Police are required a great deal of evidence of antisocial behaviour to show the need for it to be granted.

Extensive work was carried out to show that during this period there was a direct link between the anti social behaviour reported by the local residents and the fact that at that time an alcohol licence was in place within the shops on Aldermoor Road.

The closure of the particular premises at this time resulted in a reduction in the number of anti social events being reported to Police, something we are keen to continue.

Anti Social behaviour is exacerbated by alcohol with juveniles continuously attempting to obtain alcohol by soliciting adults to purchase it for them. The local safer neighbourhood teams have regularly carried out targeting operations for premises selling alcohol to educate adults and shop keeps of the dangers of supplying alcohol to juveniles and then enforce the law relating to this matter.

The local Police computer records show numerous recent stop checks of juveniles who have been found to be in possession of alcohol in the Aldermoor Road area as well as incidents of anti social behaviour involving drunken juveniles.

Whilst working to tackle this it is believed that our fight against this will be made harder should this licence be granted. The One Stop store on Coxford Road, Southampton is less than a third of a mile from the Aldermoor Road site and a walk of around 5 minutes. We do not believe that there is a need for 2 alcohol sales licences to be in place so close to one another and the effect on the community will not be unduly affected should this licence not be granted.

Police have spoken with those members of the public who have recently reported incidents of anti social behaviour in the Aldermoor Road area and they have expressed concern in relation to granting of this licence and were advised to contact the licensing authority themselves in order to register their objections.

In summary our fears are first, that the store will act despite the best intentions of staff as a focal point to draw in increased numbers of youths, resulting in increased crime and disorder and secondly that the added burden of crime and disorder will further stretch the limited resources of the local policing team, and undo the recent good work to reduce the anti-social behaviour of youths in the area.

Review of anti social behaviour and criminal damage in the surrounding area of Best One Express, Aldermoor Road

INTRODUCTION

This report has been commissioned to review anti-social behaviour (ASB) and criminal damage incidents for the surrounding area of Best One Newsagents, 247a Aldermoor Road, YN02 (see appendix 1).

Youth related nuisance linked to the consumption of alcohol will be reviewed including criminal damage incidents which are caused as a result of this nuisance. The data period of this review will cover 12 months from 15/05/09 to 14/05/10.

Areas subject to anti-social behaviour and criminal damage are found to be linked to alcohol misuse by underage youths, this further links to reports of graffiti, arson and vehicle damage¹.

Alcohol misuse and underage drinking is a priority for the city and various initiatives to reduce this have been implemented including:

- Alcohol seized from underage persons seen in a public place.
- An alcohol awareness DVD has been given to schools and young people who have had alcohol seized from them.
- Building an intelligence picture on off licences selling to underage persons and acting on this.
- Conducting test purchases and enforcement if licensees breach this.
- Campaign to raise awareness to persons over 18 to not purchase alcohol on behalf of underage persons.
- Youths referred to and managed at Community Tasking Co-ordination Group (CTCG).

METHODOLOGY

The data was extracted via the All Incidents and Strategic Assessment Criminal Damage Business Object Reports for the period of: 15/05/09 – 14/05/10. This data was mapped using MapInfo Professional and the data extracted for the defined area.

ANALYSIS

Within the defined area during this reporting period 84 ASB youth related calls were made. 19% (16) of these incidents were directly related to groups of local youths causing problems outside of the shops through drinking alcohol, kicking footballs against the shutters, throwing stones and bags of dog excrement and being abusive to customers and passers by. Youths are also reported to gather and drink alcohol in the subway on Aldermoor Road which intimidates members of the public and prevents them from using this walkway.

A high proportion (48%, 40) of the calls in this area related to underage youths drinking, smoking cannabis and being rowdy in the communal stairwells and hallways of flats on Purbrook Close. Upon leaving this premise youths were reported to throw and smash glass bottles and cause damage to parked vehicles. Further reports of

general ASB in this area include youths throwing stones, being abusive to residents and sitting and kicking vehicles. This ASB was particularly prominent over the weekends between 20:00 and 23:00.

A number of youths were identified as being responsible for this behaviour; 2 of these youths are due to shortly turn 18, however their group of associates includes youths aged 13-16 years. Therefore it is suspected these youths will purchase alcohol on behalf of their friends which will escalate anti-social behaviour in this area.

Criminal damage in this area is often caused as a consequence of this anti social behaviour. Over the past 12 months 20 criminal damage incidents were reported within the defined boundary, with further incidents likely not to have been reported. These damages often consisted of youths graffiting on the walls of the shops and flats, damaging garages behind the shops, smashing shop windows, and damaging vehicles through scratching bodywork, knocking off wing-mirrors and smashing windows. Suspects were not formally identified in the majority of these offences however a number of reports often stated local youths were seen committing this. Youths have also been reported to cause problems at The Rose Road Centre which is a respite centre for disabled children and is located near to the shops. Youths have previously gained access to the garden of this premise and caused damage to garden furniture.

Between the period of 28th October 2002 to 8th December 2006 Alldays (owned by Co-op) in this parade of shops had an alcohol license. The licence expired at the end of this period and no renewal application was submitted by the Co-op. To determine the anti-social problem in this area during the period this shop had an alcohol licence a dip sample of anti-social behaviour reports was taken for 2006 (01/01/06 to 31/12/06). During this period 54 ASB related calls were made within this boundary. This is a lower figure in comparison to 84 calls made in the 2009/10 reporting period, however, during 2006 the issue of youths congregating and causing problems outside of the shops escalated with 57% (31) of the 54 reports related to this type of nuisance.

During the period of Alldays having an alcohol licence a Section 30 Dispersal Zone was deemed necessary due to the anti-social behaviour figures in this area. This zone was successfully implemented from 20th May 2005 to 19th November 2006, (see Appendix 2 for the Section 30 boundary). Further, due to ongoing high levels of anti-social behaviour at the time of expiration of this s.30, an extension was granted to continue this for a further 6 months until 19th May 2006. During this Section 30 period 46 dispersal occurrences were recorded on RMS² involving the dispersal of youths causing anti-social problems within the defined boundary. The data is not available to define the extent of these problems, such as whether youths were in drink or not. However the majority of these occurrences took place on Aldermoor Road involving youths causing problems outside of and around the shops.

CONCLUSION

To conclude the above analysis displays that even without a local shop selling alcohol within the defined boundary, anti-social behaviour is prominent, particularly involving youths and alcohol. It is therefore inferred that in light of the existing ASB and criminal damage problem in this area, the availability of alcohol being sold at these shops would escalate the problem.



Roads within the defined boundary include: Aldermoor Road Waltham Crescent Purbrook Close Bransbury Close Cowdray Close Petworth Gardens



I notice in the Southern Daily Echo that an application for a licence to permit the selling of alcohol from the above store has been submitted to the City Council's Licensing Team.

Living locally in the area I feel that it is my duty to write in with my concerns to oppose this licence for issues involving Anti Social Behaviour in the area.

It is not the first time that a convenience store has tried to sell alcohol from this parade of shops. Previously there was a licensed Co-Operative Store. The issues that resulted from Alcohol sales forced the Police to get a 'Section 30' for the area to tackle the problem of anti social behaviour in the area. There was also the tragic death of Daniel Loader in April 2005 who was stabbed in the area and which the underage drinking of alcohol was a significant factor. The issues in the area eventually led for the alcohol licence to be withdrawn upon renewal which meant problems in the area did decrease considerably for a time. This 'Section 30' has now expired but, as a local resident, I do not want to experience this high level of anti-social behaviour in the area again.

Unfortunately instances of ASB have been slowly increasing over the last few years with the focus always tending to be the parade of shops in Aldermoor Road. The Police are still a very common sight in the area. There is still an issue with underage drinking in the area and should this licence be approved this can only make the situation worse. This is particularly worse on the weekends particularly Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

It is sad to report that Aldermoor has made the headlines recently for a number of incidents the most serious recently being the serious assault to a bus driver on Lordshill Way. Again alcohol was significant factor in the incident.

There are still a number of anti social behaviour issues that need to be address in this area of Aldermoor but I feel that if this licence is successful these problems will be exacerbated.

I hope that for these reasons that you will listen to residents concerns and decline the above licence.

Cllr Don Thomas has volunteered to be the spokesperson for local residents and I agree for him to raise my objections at any Licensing Panel on this issue.

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As a concerned local resident I feel that it is my duty to write in to oppose and object to this licence for a number of reasons.

1) Previous alcohol licence in the area

As I hope you would know, previously there was a Co-Operative Store in these same premises. Such was the issues caused by the alcohol sold in this establishment that the Police and Southampton City Council's Safer Neighbourhoods Team imposed a Section 30 Dispersal Notice which covered the shops in Aldermoor Road, Waltham Crescent, Purbrook & Bransbury Close. This happened after the tragic death of a local teenager in April 2005 in which the drinking of alcohol was a significant factor. The issues in the area eventually led for the alcohol licence to be withdrawn upon renewal which meant problems in the area did decrease considerably for a time. This 'Section 30' has now expired but local residents do not want to experience this high level of anti-social behaviour in the area again.

2) Public Safety and Protecting Children: Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) in the area.

For the past 2-3 years, instances of ASB have been slowly increasing with the focus tending to be on the parade of shops in Aldermoor Road, Waltham Crescent and Bransbury Close and the Police are still regularly in attendance in the area. During a Police Street Briefing back in the Summer of 2009, the Police confiscated a considerable amount of alcohol from underage children. I fear that to encourage more alcohol to be sold in the area will make this already significant problem far worse. There are groups of young people who can be seen drinking alcohol on the streets each weekend and unfortunately this area of Aldermoor have experienced some very serious assaults in the area that have been widely reported in the Southern Daily Echo.

3) Alcohol provision in the area.

I am aware that there are already a number of licensed premises in the area which sells alcohol. These include the Woodman Pub, One Stop Store in Coxford Road (no more that 150 yards from the Premier Convenience Store) and also Sainsburys in Lordshill. I feel that there is more than sufficient alcohol provision in the area and that residents' needs are already well catered for.

I hope that for these reasons that you will listen to residents concerns and decline the above licence.

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Unfortunately instances of ASB have been slowly increasing over the last few years with the focus always tending to be the parade of shops in Aldermoor Road. The Police are still a very common sight in the area. There is still an issue with underage drinking in the area and should this licence be approved this can only make the situation worse. This is particularly worse on the weekends particularly Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

It is sad to report that Aldermoor has made the headlines recently for a number of incidents the most serious recently being the serious assault to a bus driver on Lordshill Way. Again alcohol was significant factor in the incident.

There are still a number of anti social behaviour issues that need to be address in this area of Aldermoor but I feel that if this licence is successful these problems will be exacerbated.

I hope that for these reasons that you will listen to residents concerns and decline the above licence.

Cllr Don Thomas has volunteered to be the spokesperson for local residents and I agree for him to raise my objections at any Licensing Panel on this issue.

I have seen advertised in the above shop window that an application for a licence to permit the selling of alcohol from this store has been submitted to the City Council's Licensing Team.

As a concerned local resident I feel that it is my duty to write in to oppose and object to this licence for a number of reasons.

1) Previous alcohol licence in the area

As I hope you would know, previously there was a Co-Operative Store in these same premises. Such was the issues caused by the alcohol sold in this establishment that the Police and Southampton City Council's Safer Neighbourhoods Team imposed a Section 30 Dispersal Notice which covered the shops in Aldermoor Road, Waltham Crescent, Purbrook & Bransbury Close. This happened after the tragic death of a local teenager in April 2005 in which the drinking of alcohol was a significant factor. The issues in the area eventually led for the alcohol licence to be withdrawn upon renewal which meant problems in the area did decrease considerably for a time. This 'Section 30' has now expired but local residents do not want to experience this high level of anti-social behaviour in the area again.

2) Public Safety and Protecting Children: Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) in the area.

For the past 2-3 years, instances of ASB have been slowly increasing with the focus tending to be on the parade of shops in Aldermoor Road, Waltham Crescent and Bransbury Close and the Police are still regularly in attendance in the area. During a Police Street Briefing back in the Summer of 2009, the Police confiscated a considerable amount of alcohol from underage children. I fear that to encourage more alcohol to be sold in the area will make this already significant problem far worse. There are groups of young people who can be seen drinking alcohol on the streets each weekend and unfortunately this area of Aldermoor have experienced some very serious assaults in the area that have been widely reported in the Southern Daily Echo.

3) Alcohol provision in the area.

I am aware that there are already a number of licensed premises in the area which sells alcohol. These include the Woodman Pub, One Stop Store in Coxford Road (no more that 150 yards from the Premier Convenience Store) and also Sainsburys in Lordshill. I feel that there is more than sufficient alcohol provision in the area and that residents' needs are already well catered for.
