#### **CONDUCT OF MEETING**

#### **Terms of Reference**

#### Business to be discussed

The terms of reference are contained in the Council's Constitution.

Only those items listed on the attached agenda may be considered at this meeting.

#### **Rules of Procedure**

#### Quorum 3

The meeting is governed by the Council Procedure Rules as set out in Part 4 of the Constitution.

The minimum number of appointed Members required to be in attendance to hold the meeting is 3.

#### **Disclosure of Interests**

Members are required to disclose, in accordance with the Members' Code of Conduct, **both** the existence **and** nature of any "personal" or "prejudicial" interests they may have in relation to matters for consideration on this Agenda.

#### **Personal Interests**

A Member must regard himself or herself as having a personal interest in any matter

- (i) if the matter relates to an interest in the Member's register of interests; or
- (ii) if a decision upon a matter might reasonably be regarded as affecting to a greater extent than other Council Tax payers, ratepayers and inhabitants of the District, the wellbeing or financial position of himself or herself, a relative or a friend or:-
  - (a) any employment or business carried on by such person;
  - (b) any person who employs or has appointed such a person, any firm in which such a person is a partner, or any company of which such a person is a director:
  - (c) any corporate body in which such a person has a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £5,000; or
  - (d) any body listed in Article 14(a) to (e) in which such a person holds a position of general control or management.

A Member must disclose a personal interest.

#### **Prejudicial Interests**

Having identified a personal interest, a Member must consider whether a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably think that the interest was so significant and particular that it could prejudice that Member's judgement of the public interest. If that is the case, the interest must be regarded as "prejudicial" and the Member must disclose the interest and withdraw from the meeting room during discussion on the item.

It should be noted that a prejudicial interest may apply to part or the whole of an item.

Where there are a series of inter-related financial or resource matters, with a limited resource available, under consideration a prejudicial interest in one matter relating to that resource may lead to a member being excluded from considering the other matters relating to that same limited resource.

There are some limited exceptions.

<u>Note:</u> Members are encouraged to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer or his staff in Democratic Services if they have any problems or concerns in relation to the above.

#### **Principles of Decision Making**

All decisions of the Council will be made in accordance with the following principles:-

- proportionality (i.e. the action must be proportionate to the desired outcome);
- due consultation and the taking of professional advice from officers;
- respect for human rights;
- a presumption in favour of openness, accountability and transparency;
- setting out what options have been considered;
- setting out reasons for the decision; and
- clarity of aims and desired outcomes.

In exercising discretion, the decision maker must:

- understand the law that regulates the decision making power and gives effect to it. The decision-maker must direct itself properly in law;
- take into account all relevant matters (those matters which the law requires the authority as a matter of legal obligation to take into account);
- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);
- comply with the rule that local government finance is to be conducted on an annual basis.
   Save to the extent authorised by Parliament, 'live now, pay later' and forward funding are unlawful; and
- act with procedural propriety in accordance with the rules of fairness.



# Legal Implications

- 1. The Licensing Act 2003 specifically restricts the grounds on which the Council, as Licensing Authority (LA), may refuse an application for a major variation of a Premises Licence, or impose conditions. Where relevant representations are made, the LA may refuse on the grounds that the licensing objectives are not met or the operating schedule is inadequate. Equally, conditions may be imposed where relevant and necessary. The LA may also refuse an application in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
- The decision making committee, in considering an application, must have regard to the adopted Statement of Licensing Policy and any relevant representations made by those directly affected.
- 3. An applicant for a variation, whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court.
- 4. In considering this application the committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider applications in accordance with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, and amending secondary legislation and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the committee must makes its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching it's decision.

The committee must also have regard to:-

#### 5. Crime and Disorder Act 1998

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the Council under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.

#### 6. Human Rights Act 1998

The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the Council to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the Council that could have an effect upon another persons Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of Proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the Council which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matter set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

Re: Proposed changes to 57 - 59 Castle Way, Old Town, Southampton

I am very concerned to hear that the above premises have applied for a licence to allow live music and dancing between 19.00 and 01.00 hours every night of the week.

This would be highly undesirable for the following reasons:

Castle Way lies in a densely populated residential area. There is already noise and nuisance to local residents from people gathering outside the snooker club to smoke. There have been incidents of disturbance and aggressive behaviour.

There are many elderly and vulnerable people living in the immediate neighbourhood, particularly from the sheltered housing in streets adjoining Castle Way. Increased drinking, crowds and aggressive behaviour in the neighbourhood can be intimidating for anyone walking home in the evening.

There are already many clubs on the High Street. Further drinking establishments and clubs should be confined to this area where private security is provided and there is a greater police presence. Surrounding residential streets do not have the same level of policing, may therefore be less safe, and in the current climate of cuts it is unlikely that additional police resources could be made available to properly police Castle way, particularly at closing time.

In summary approval of this application would be highly detrimental to the surrounding community.

I am writing to object against the above, planned proposal.

I own and live with my family in the property opposite these premises. It is literally the width of a small road from my front door. When I moved to this house 10 years ago, there were two snooker clubs in operation at that venue, and they were 'genuine' Snooker Clubs, places where people would come to play snooker and return home quietly. The 'Academy Club' unfortunately has been a different matter. Twenty-four hour drinking, and no security or door staff, has caused

Twenty-four hour drinking, and no security or door staff, has caused countless complaints from me and other residents. I have called the Police, 101, Environmental Health and visited the Civic Centre.

There is often a noisy influx of partygoers looking for late night/early morning drinks, after other venues have closed for the night, all this within an area which is now, much more residential than it once was.

We are constantly being disturbed outside by patrons (members?) taxis idling, swearing, shouting, fighting and general nuisance. Anyone can wander in for a drink at any hour, although it is supposed to be a members only venue, I can provide evidence of this. The license for this property is already being violated so the extra addition of live music until 1am *is not* acceptable.

Also parking is limited, we have vehicles parked on the pavements, double yellows and in front of our entrance gate disabling access to our own vehicles.

Lastly I have observed intoxicated people congregating/smoking on the step in the mornings as children at St Johns Infant school, (150- 200m) make there way past, on the way to school.

We are all effected because of this club and I feel as a resident that the license should NOT be granted for a live music and dancing venue.

I have only just recently found out about the Academy Clubs application for a license to open a venue. I am extremely worried about the outcome of this license being granted. I have enough trouble and disruption in the night and day as it is already. There are several noisy men outside my window as I am typing this and I am already sick of the noise and rude comments made by the kind of people attending this venue.

On more than several occasions I have phoned the police (as the academy themselves are either rude or hang up the phone) at all hours of the morning to try and do something about the level of noise that is allowed to go on outside my window. The Academy are under strict instructions not to have people outside the front of the building smoking and yet they still do not abide by such instructions, allowing people out the front of the building at all hours making all levels of noise.

The club allows anyone through its doors and I have even been inside with friends from a completely different city without them even batting an eyelid.

I am already uncomfortable with drunken men shouting rude comments at me midday let alone having dozens more falling out of the doors into the street outside my house at all hours. It would be nice for once to get some sleep without drunken fights, taxis and general noise going on outside 24/7.

To whom it may concern,

We are writing to let you know our concerns regarding the proposal for a night club at 57 - 59 Castle Way (formerly The Academy, proposed to be the Biazz Club). We live at flat 8, 4 St Michael's Street and our flat backs onto the open area adjacent to 57 - 59 Castle Way.

We were very surprised to hear about this application via a note put through our door by another local resident. We have not received any official notice of this proposed change of license from The Council and are not aware of any official public notices in the locality. Because of this, we are concerned that many other residents that will be affected by this application have not been notified/consulted and we question whether or not the correct notification procedures have been followed.

The area behind and adjacent to the building at 57 - 59 Castle Street is enclosed by tall buildings and garages, which causes even normal-level voices to become amplified and echo. This is particularly noticeable at night when the ambient noise level is low. Our bedroom is at the back of the flat, so we get woken up reasonably regularly by users of the snooker club (The Academy) which is currently operating in the building 24 hours a day. Due to smoking laws, users of the snooker club (and the proposed new club) have to use the area outside the building to smoke (usually the area just outside the fire doors on the north and east sides). No matter which side of the building smokers use, this will cause nuisance noise to residents as there are residential buildings backing or fronting onto all sides of the building and open area adjacent to it.

We have double glazing and still get regularly woken up as things stand. I have no doubt that the new proposed club will not only attract more punters and therefore create more noise during the night; but will potentially involve music, which will certainly be disturbing.

We have reported noise disturbance from The Academy to 'nuisance control' (under environmental health services at the Council) on a number of occasions. We kept a noise diary for a month or so at the end of last year - but unfortunately didn't continue to pursue it after that as we went overseas for a couple of months. The noise generally occurs late at night (or very early in the morning) and involves people standing outside having loud conversations whilst smoking. This is very irritating and means that we are consistently getting woken up - but the noise rarely goes on for long enough for us to call out an environmental health officer (and this is a requirement within 3 months of lodging a complaint, otherwise the issue is disregarded).

We hope that you will take account of the concerns raised by us and other local residents and potentially consider re-advertising this application and re-consulting the affected residents. We look forward to hearing from you about your decision on this matter. Yours Faithfully,

**Importance:** High Dear Sir/Madam,

I understand that you are considering a nightclub license with regards to the above premises. I am somewhat surprised and perplexed as this appears to be happening without the correct procedures being put in place. There has been no consultation with residences that will be directly seriously adversely affected either by the licensing team or the owners of the premises. I have only found this out from my neighbours.

There is already a problem with the snooker club with drunk smokers making noise at night outside the snooker club and I am aware the police have been called several times. This is situation that exists when children are being taken to school. As the snooker club has a 24 hour license I understand membership is supposed to be strict  $\Box$  this is clearly not the case with the snooker club. This is going to be multiplied many times with a nightclub. This area of the town is actually generally very quiet and it is residential. The French Quarter  $\Box$ Linden $\Box$  development is immediately adjacent.

#### My major concerns are as follows:

- ? Noise levels in the vicinity of the proposed Biazz club at nighttime will be significantly higher than they are at present and my family (I have a 4 year old daughter) and neighbours will be disrupted at unsocial hours. How is this going to be dealt with from a perspective of the noise from the building itself and persons using it. The normal situation with regards to planning is that the background noise level (BNL) shall not be higher than the present levels. This means that the noise level of the club and its users need to be 10 dB lower than the BNL.
- ? The entire building has only ever been a snooker club (2 clubs at one point) 

  the area of the building being considered for a nighclub has not been operational for several years and there have been significant residential development in that time all with Planning Permission from Southampton City Council.
- ? There has been no consultation process and it appears to be in the process of being rushed through without due process or consultation.
- ? When there were 2 snooker clubs operating there were often issues with parking in fact there are still issues with parking sometimes. This includes the controlled gates to Castle Mews being blocked indiscriminately. Parking on double yellow lines and in the worst cases double parking.
- ? I also understand that the nighclub is to be linked by a staircase to the snooker club □ this was never the case previously □ this will lead to persons moving from the nightclub to the snooker after the nightclub is closed and continuing drinking and leaving later from the building with the noise impact both people and traffic.

I require this issue to be carefully considered to ensure that myself, my family and my neighbours are not inconvenienced in any way by this proposal and quite frankly I cannot see how this can be done.

I write concerning a license application which I understand has been approved in order to request some more information from you regarding the implications.

The license application number is 2012/00813/01SPRTand this has been made in respect of 57-59 Castle Way, Southampton. I live in the block of flats directly adjacent to this plot: Polymond House at 61 Castle Way. I understand that this commercial premise has applied for and been granted an extended license to convert to a nightclub, play music until 1 a.m. and 'provide late night refreshment' until 5 a.m. every day of the week. I and my fellow residents are concerned about what effect this will have on our day to day lives as this is a quiet residential area with numerous surrounding flats and houses, many of which house children or professionals who work long hours.

I am concerned that residents were not notified of the prospective change in writing in order to give us recourse to make clear our point of view when the approval would have such a detrimental effect. I believe this is the case with planning applications which would create a significant change in a residential area and thought it would be the same with licensing, the aim surely being not to potentially destroy the quality of life of a whole community. I see that a notice has been pinned to the door of the club but one would not see this unless one frequented the club, which seems to be closed at the moment anyway. Furthermore, I believe that the residents have until 14<sup>th</sup> May to lodge an appeal, but it appears as though the application has been granted? Please forgive my ignorance but I have no understanding of licensing legislation and hope you can enlighten me on this.

I am extremely anxious that everyone who lives in these flats is going to be subjected to loud music in to the early hours of the morning every night and particularly at weekends and that the presence of large numbers of drunk and unruly people will mean not only will I never be at peace in my home but the quality of the area will deteriorate. I cannot possibly believe that the decision has been made to let the club owners do whatever they please and no thought has been taken as to the use of the surrounding area (residential).

I'm sure that Southampton City Council takes the wellbeing of its citizens seriously and would not take a decision which would affect a residential area in so damaging a way lightly. I would therefore be grateful if you could advise me a) what factors are taken in to consideration when processing such an application, b) what, in layman's terms, the application is actually allowing the club owners to do (is there a volume limit?) and c) what action can be taken by residents if the effect is so detrimental to us.

We wish to register our objection to the licensing application for The Academy Club (also to be renamed The Baizz Club), 57-59 Castle Way, to open a club allowing for the performance of recorded and live music until 1 am.

Castle Way  $\square$ s character has changed greatly over the last decade with the French Quarter development to the south of the club, as well as the conversion of former office buildings to flats in St Michael  $\square$ s Street to the north, which, with the established properties opposite to the west (where we live), makes this area more residential than commercial. And ever since we moved here in 1999 it has been a pleasingly quiet area, surprisingly so when one considers the proximity of the High Street.

Further, we are concerned of the effect that the noise and disturbance on weeknights will have on the schoolchildren and workers who live in the area. Allowing live music to the early hours, with the inevitable groups of people smoking outside, will change the nature of the area significantly, and would be detrimental to the quality of life currently enjoyed by those of us who live in the area.

Finally, we are greatly concerned that the local residents were not made aware of this licensing application (nor can we examine it on your website since there are no documents posted). The notice on the door of the Academy Club is not something past which we stop by to read, particularly as there are usually at least one or two persons from the 24 hour club smoking there. We were only made aware of it by a neighbour yesterday, so we feel we are most fortunate to even have a chance to register our objections for this proposed change.

I am writing to say that I strongly oppose the license for The Baizz Club at 57-59 Castle Way, formerly The Academy.

I have only just found out about the proposed opening of this club above the already 24/7 snooker club and am totally against it. I'm not even sure the application has been properly advertised. You normally see signs up along the street when there are proposed developments so I would have assumed the same would apply to a potential club opening. I only found out myself from another resident of the area putting a sign up in our block of flats.

I live in the flats right next to the snooker club and any noise from there is amplified around our parking yard, which we are directly above. There is often noise from people who are drunk or from the occasional fight. This is tolerable, but if a club is opened I dread to think how noisy it will be. We can already clearly hear the noise from the karaoke at the establishment that was called NV, and that is twice the distance away! It's not like we don't already have enough clubs in the town centre, and this end of town is rather out of the way for clubgoers anyway.

I've never complained about something like this in my life but I feel that it will greatly disturb those of us who live nearby. I can only hope that I am not the only one to write to you and that you will perhaps reconsider granting the license.
