Terms of Reference

The Sub-Committee deals with licences for which the Council is responsible under the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005, including:-

- Determination of applications for review of premises licences and club premises certificates;
- Determination of representations to applications for premises licences and club premises certificates, variations and various permits;
- Determination of police objections to applications for:
 - Variation of designated premises supervisors
 - Transfer of premises licences
 - Personal licences for the sale of alcohol
- Determination of objections to temporary event notices.

Relevant Representations

Those who have made relevant representations may address the meeting about the matter in which they have an interest. New matters, not raised within a written representation, can not be relied upon at the hearing. When dealing with Licensing Act matters the Sub-Committee must only take into account the following statutory Licensing Objectives:-

- prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

Likewise, when dealing with Gambling Act matters the Sub Committee must only take into account the statutory Licensing Objectives below:-

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way, and
- Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling

DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS

A Member must regard himself or herself as having a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in any matter that they or their spouse, partner, a person they are living with as husband or wife, or a person with whom they are living as if they were a civil partner in relation to:

- (i) Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
- (ii) Sponsorship:

Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from Southampton City Council) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expense incurred by you in carrying out duties as a member, or towards your election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.

- (iii) Any contract which is made between you / your spouse etc (or a body in which the you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest) and Southampton City Council under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed, and which has not been fully discharged.
- (iv) Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of Southampton.
- (v) Any license (held alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of Southampton for a month or longer.
- (vi) Any tenancy where (to your knowledge) the landlord is Southampton City Council and the tenant is a body in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interests.
- (vii) Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of Southampton, and either:
 - a) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body, or
 - b) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest that exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

A Member must regard himself or herself as having an 'Other Interest' in any membership of, or occupation of a position of general control or management in:

Any body to which they have been appointed or nominated by Southampton City Council Any public authority or body exercising functions of a public nature

Principles of Decision Making

All decisions of the Council will be made in accordance with the following principles:-

- proportionality (i.e. the action must be proportionate to the desired outcome);
- due consultation and the taking of professional advice from officers;
- respect for human rights;
- a presumption in favour of openness, accountability and transparency;
- setting out what options have been considered;
- · setting out reasons for the decision; and
- clarity of aims and desired outcomes.

In exercising discretion, the decision maker must:

- understand the law that regulates the decision making power and gives effect to it.
 The decision-maker must direct itself properly in law;
- take into account all relevant matters (those matters which the law requires the authority as a matter of legal obligation to take into account);
- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);
- comply with the rule that local government finance is to be conducted on an annual basis. Save to the extent authorised by Parliament, 'live now, pay later' and forward funding are unlawful; and
- act with procedural propriety in accordance with the rules of fairness.

40. <u>APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENSE - JD WETHERSPOON, 448 BITTERNE</u> ROAD PRECINCT, SOUTHAMPTON SO18 5EF

The Sub-Committee considered an application for a premises licence in respect of JD Weatherspoon, 448 Bitterne Road Precinct, Southampton SO18 5EF.

Chris Relch, Nigel Connor (Applicant) and Mr Lawrence (speaking on behalf of Mrs Lawrence, Objector) were present and with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED that the application for a premises licence be granted.

After private deliberation the Sub-Committee reconvened and the Chair read the following decision:-

All parties will receive formal written confirmation of the decision and reasons.

The Sub-Committee has considered very carefully the application for a premises licence at JD Weatherspoon, 448 Bitterne Road Precinct, Southampton SO18 5EF. It has given due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance and the adopted statement of Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee considered the representations, both written and given orally today, by all parties. Human rights legislation has been borne in mind whilst making the decision.

Although the residential objector was unable to attend, by agreement of all parties she was represented by her brother, Mr Lawrence.

As a result, and in consideration of all the above, the Sub-Committee has determined that the application should be approved, as amended and in accordance with the conditions agreed with Hampshire Constabulary.

Reasons

The Sub-Committee noted that no representation had been received from any of the responsible authorities. The police had agreed conditions to be added to the operating schedule and a change to the hours for supply of alcohol, late night refreshment and the opening hours. Those additional conditions related to: CCTV, incident book, refusals register, proof of age, door staff and dispersal policy.

The Committee considered the residential objection, however this fails to show any evidential link between the concerns raised and this premises. The Sub-Committee is only able to consider objections raised on the application and on this occasion this amounted to one resident.

However, local residents can be reassured that in the event that the grant of the licence does in fact lead to issues of concern, relevant to the licensing objectives, a review may be initiated where evidence of the same can be considered and may result in appropriate steps being taken to address them. This can be done by a local resident or a ward Councillor as well as any of the responsible authorities.

There is a right of appeal for all parties to the Magistrates' Court. Formal notification of the decision will set out that right in full.

The application to review relates to the following licensing objectives 1) The prevention of crime and disorder, 2) Public Safety, 3) The prevention of public nuisance.

Legal Implications

- 1. Part 3 of the Licensing Act 2003 provides that a responsible authority or any other person may apply for review of a premises licence.
- 2. In such circumstances, the applicant for the review must serve a copy of the review application on the holder of the premises licences, the licensing authority and each of the responsible authorities.

- 3. On receipt of an application for review, officers will consider its validity under delegated powers. Reasons for rejection, in whole or in part, include:
 - that the grounds for review are not relevant to one of more of the licensing objectives and:
 - that the application is frivolous, vexatious or repetitious, unless it is made by a responsible authority.
- 4. The licensing authority must display a prescribed notice of the review application on the outside or adjacent the premises, on the authority's website and at the Civic Centre; the notice must remain on display for 28 days and any interested party or the responsible authorities may make representations in that period.
- 5. The licensing authority is then required to hold a hearing to consider the review.
- 6. In doing so the sub-committee must give appropriate weight to:
 - the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives; the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
 - · its own statement of licensing policy
 - the Statutory Guidance
- 7. In determining an application for review, the legislation provides that the sub-committee may take any (or none) of the following steps, as it considers necessary:
 - modify the conditions of the licence;
 - exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence
 - remove the designated premises supervisor;
 - suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months
 - revoke the licence.
- 8. The Licensing Act 2003 provides for appeal to the Magistrates' Court against the subcommittee's decision in relation to an application for review by the premises licence holder and any other party who made a representation to the application.
- 9. In considering this application the sub-committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider the application in accordance, in particular, with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (as amended) and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the sub-committee must makes its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.
- 10. The sub-committee must also have regard to:
 - The Crime and Disorder Act 1998

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the sub-committee under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.

• The Human Rights Act 1998

The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the sub-committee to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the sub-committee that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the

principle of proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the sub-committee which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matters set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions

- 1 No supply of alcohol shall be made under the premises licence:
- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor for the premises does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2 Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3 (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise antisocial behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 4 The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 6 The responsible person must ensure that
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- 7 1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 —
- (a) 'duty' is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) 'permitted price' is the price found by applying the formula —

 $P = D + (D \times V)$

where-

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) 'relevant person' means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence —
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) 'relevant person' means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) 'value added tax' means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ('the first day') would be different from the permitted price on the next day ('the second day') as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

1 Conditions Transferred From The Public Music And Dancing Licence

a) Capacity

No more than 550 (five hundred and fifty) persons shall be present in the ground floor part of the premises at any one time (staff and customers), and no more than 150 (one hundred and fifty) persons shall be present in the basement part of the premises at any one time.

b) Admission

No admission to the premises after 03.00

c) REFUSE

No refuse, rubbish or waste paper shall be permitted to accumulate in any part of the place licensed.

d) VENTILATION

All parts of the place licensed shall be suitably and sufficiently ventilated by natural or mechanical means to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority.

2 Non Standard Timings

- (a) On New Year's Eve the supply of alcohol is from 10:00 until 03:30 on 2nd January. All other licensable activities on New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day.
- (b) Additional hour on change from GMT to BST.
- 3 Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- (a) Door Staff
- i Door staff shall be on duty at all times that the premises are open to customers.
- ii All areas of the premises will be checked at the end of each evening to ensure all customers have left safely.
- iii At the close of business each evening there shall be at least 2 door staff patrolling the area immediately outside the premises for a minimum of 30 minutes thereafter to assist in the orderly dispersal of customers from the premises.
- (b) Taxis
- i Details of local taxi operators will be kept in the reception area.
- ii All staff will arrange for taxi's for customers when requested.
- 4 Prevention of Public Nuisance
- (a) Signs asking patrons to leave the premises quietly shall be displayed in prominent positions on or adjacent to doors used for egress from the premises.
- (b) Door staff will ensure that any queues are maintained in an orderly manner and do not cause any disturbances or obstructions.
- 5 Public Safety
- (a) Door staff will ensure that capacity numbers on the two floors are restricted to the maximum number by the use of "counters".
- (b) Door staff will safely control the dispersal of persons between the two floors.
- 6 1) The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas within reason and to cover any areas outside including but not limited to those used for smoking areas, queuing or other activities associated with the premises. The system should be able to cope with all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff available during operating hours to be able to provide copies at the request of the police or authorised officer.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

Recordings to be kept for a minimum of 28 days.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected

Recording equipment is to be housed in a secure place restricting access to authorised persons. (This can be on a computer which is password protected.)

All systems, signage, hardware and procedures are to be installed / implemented to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary and approved in writing.

- 2) The provision, maintenance and use of ID Scan equipment upon entry to the premises combined with the Challenge 25 policy to the reasonable satisfaction of the Hampshire Constabulary and Licensing Authority
- 3) An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises and there will be a daily debrief of door staff at the close of business to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary and Southampton City Council Licensing Authority.
- 4) All glasses used at the premises will be polycarbonate and the contents of all glass bottles will be decanted into polycarbonate glasses with the exception of Glass champagne, wine or spirit bottles which may be served in the VIP area but only with waitress service and controlled by a door supervisor'. For the avoidance of doubt bottles of beer, lager and alcohol pops will always be decanted into polycarbonate glasses where they are not available in PET or aluminium bottles or cans.
- 5) To provide adequate door staff to cover fire exits points and smoking area to ensure that unauthorised entry is restricted to the premise to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary

7 8 Training

All staff must receive comprehensive training in relation to age restricted products and the sale of alcohol. No member of staff shall be permitted to sell alcohol until such time as they have successfully completed this training. Training shall cover:

- a) Sale of alcohol to persons under 18
- b) Challenge 25 and acceptable forms of Identification
- c) Signs of drunkenness
- d) Refusal register and when/how to use
- e) The Licensing Objectives

This training shall be documented and records kept on the premises. Police and the Licensing Authority shall have access to an individual's training records upon request.

9 Challenge 25

Any person appearing to those engaged in selling or supplying to be under the age of 25 and who is attempting to buy alcohol will be required to produce satisfactory photographic identification as proof of age. Acceptable ID shall be as per the latest Home Office guidance.

10 Refusal Book

A refusals log in a paper or digital format shall be kept and maintained at the premises. The register shall be made available for inspection upon request by an authorised officer of the Police and Local Authority.






Annex 4 - Plans

Please state the grounds for review which must be based on one or more of the licensing objectives together with supporting information:

On behalf of the Chief Officer of Hampshire Constabulary, the Licensing Department initiates a premises licence review of Junk Club, 55 London Road, Southampton. The review is requested to consider the revocation of this licence under the Licensing Objectives, the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

Junk is a licensed premises (Annex 1) and could be classified as a nightclub located within one of the busiest cumulative impact areas in Southampton City Centre (Annex 2) known as the Bedford Place cumulative impact zone as identified in Southampton City Council's statement of licensing policy. In fact, this premises is the latest opening licensed premises in this impact area. This premises opens until 0400hrs 7 days a week.

Operators are expected to maintain a safe and vibrant environment for their customers at all times and also show consideration for others who may be affected by their operation. This is even more pertinent within a cumulative impact area.

The premises cater for younger clientele and identifies as an 'underground focused music venue'. (Annex 3) The type of music and artists they actively promote attracts different custom from further afield outside of Southampton who seek out this style of music. (Annex 4)

The review is brought following a serious incident at the premises in the early hours of Friday 22nd January 2016.

A number of concerns were identified and Hampshire Constabulary are looking for the local authority to determine whether this premises is a suitable establishment for the area considering the type of venue and the attraction to the genre of music as well as the day to day operation, management and security. We also ask the local authority to consider the cumulative impact policy when determining the outcome of the review.

The 3 licensing objectives concerning this review are:

- 1. The prevention of Crime and Disorder
- 2. Public safety



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- The prevention of public nuisanceThe main points surrounding the initial incident and the process that preceded this review application are as follows.
- •On Thursday 21st January 2016, Junk night club held an event named 'Rum & Coke The whine up refreshers tour hosting music genres including 'bashment', Carnival, Dancehall, R&B and Hip Hop from 2200 hours running until 0400 hours. The premises were not operating under a temporary event notice and were operating under their normal premises licence authorisation.
- •At approximately 0355 hours on Friday 22nd January 2016, Hampshire Constabulary was alerted by Southampton City Council CCTV operators to a large fight at the premises.
- •Upon attendance at the scene, officers located 3 individuals in the vicinity of the premises with severe injuries, 2 of which had clearly been stabbed. The offenders had left the area and their identities and whereabouts were unknown.
- •Victim One was hit around the head with a belt and received puncture wounds to the stomach and left arm which required surgery. Victim One had been a customer of Junk, he had exited and was hanging around outside in the vicinity of the premises when he was stabbed by the offender. (Annex 5)
- •Victim Two received five separate puncture wounds to his right upper thigh and buttocks. Victim Two has also sustained a puncture wound to the head, which was assessed as being close to the spinal cord. There are no evidential photo's for this victim as he has refused to engage with our Investigation Department.
- •Victim Three received a wound to his head. Victim Three has provided an initial account to police that he was inside Junk when he was assaulted. Victim Three received these injuries at the back bar, although there is no actual footage showing the assault there is evidence of substantial blood loss on the floor in front of the bar. The injury to his head, on the left side temple was glued. (Annex 6)
- •A vehicle was seen to drive away from the area and this was located by Hampshire Constabulary traffic officers heading northbound on the M3 motorway. Upon illumination of the emergency blue lights of the police vehicles, the subject vehicle stopped. As officers approached it, it then attempted to drive off colliding with another police vehicle causing damage before coming to a complete stop. A male was arrested in the vehicle this male is suspected of being a customer of Junk from that evening. The other people involved in the incident still remained at large. The police vehicle had to be placed out of action from emergency duties.
- •There was also a further allegation of Rape within the premises not linked to this incident. It was identified that a female had been in the smoking area when a male said "he was gonna fuck me for a fag", she said she didn't want to. The female then states that he just dragged her upstairs, and into the gents toilets into a cubicle where the act of sex took place. A door staff member then enters the toilets and challenges her, she states she told him that this



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male had just dragged her to the toilets and the door staff member apparently just kicked her out of the premises. This whole incident took approx 20 mins. This rape allegation was later found to be unsubstantiated following an investigation, however, it is another serious incident linked to the venue which demonstrates poor management.

Hampshire Constabulary considered all options to promote the 4 licensing objectives;

- Preventing crime and disorder
- Preventing public nuisance
- Promoting public safety
- Protecting children from harm
- •Owing to these serious incidents linked to the premises and a consideration of the 4 licensing objectives Inspector Roberts of Hampshire Constabulary applied a 24 hour closure notice from Friday 22nd January 16:43 hours until Saturday 23rd January 16:42 hours as a result of a fear that it could attract further disorder and be a source of repercussions. (Annex 7)
- •Following this closure notice, Hampshire Constabulary applied to Southampton Magistrates Court for a closure order and had the case heard on Saturday 23rd January 2016.
- •The application was refused and the premises was permitted to re-open later that day. (Annex 8) is a copy of the decision notice from the Magistrates courts in respect of the application for the closure notice.

Following the decision of Southampton Magistrates court, the investigation continued and a number of new matters have now been established.

- •At approximately 0345 hours, disorder broke out at the 'back bar' area of the premises which involved 20-30 people pushing and shoving. This resulted in victim 3 received actual bodily harm injuries to his head.
- •Parties were dispersed and ushered outside by door staff where further disorder broke out resulting in 1 male being stabbed outside the premises and another male being stabbed nearby.
- •The identity of one male offender who wore a red hooded jacket was obtained following close work with 'The Metropolitan Police Westminster Gangs Unit'.
- •This same male "red hooded jacket" had initially arrived at Junk night club on Thursday 21st January 2016 around 2300hrs. He attended with two other associates, they were met at the entrance by a member of management Louis Cool and entered the premises unchallenged for any ID, they were not 'ID scanned' or searched by security upon entry to the premises.
- •"Red hooded jacket" spent the evening at Junk with others, regularly using the smoking area and surrounding areas outside the premises.



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- •"Red hooded jacket" at the end of the evening went on to stab victim one outside the premises after both had recently exited.
- •Another male offender was also identified by 'The Metropolitan Police Westminster Gangs Unit'. This male is understood to be responsible for causing actual bodily harm on victim 1 by striking him with a belt with a gold buckle outside the premises.
- •There was a further incident where a 2nd male was stabbed outside the premises (victim 2). It is not known whether he is a customer of junk and he has refused to engage with Police.

Hampshire Constabulary Licensing officers met with the Designated Premises Supervisor Mr Leigh later that night at the premises following the magistrates decision and discussed measures that had been agreed at the court hearing earlier that day. He confirmed 100% of customers were being ID Scanned and customers were being searched on entry. It was also confirmed tickets were being checked against booking records. Unfortunately a female member of door staff was not present as agreed and as such we requested this be rectified. One hour later the DPS telephoned PC Boucouvalas and confirmed that this was corrected.

A further meeting was held at the premises on the 28th January 2016 with the DPS Mr Leigh. A number of recommended operating measures were proposed whilst the investigation was ongoing and a decision on the future of the premises was made.

PCs Cherry and Boucouvalas advised the DPS that their current systems and procedures need to be tightened.

Dispersal was discussed and DPS advised that presently dispersal from their premises was especially poor. DPS advised that the CCTV they provided displays the poor dispersal, it also raises concerns over the lack of ID scanning at some periods resulting in unknown customers entering the premises without being challenged which previously the DPS had advised didn't happen.

PC Boucouvalas advised during this meeting that he was able to observe a problem affecting the CCTV quality on their current system.

A letter was sent following the meeting covering matters discussed. (Annex 9)

Premises visited by PC Conway and PC Cherry on Friday 5th February 2016.

All customers were being searched and 100% ID scanning was in operation. The metal detecting wand policy had relaxed and this was used randomly, however the SIA door supervisor completed searches on the outside clothing with his own hands. Everything else was in order at the time of this visit.

Upon receipt of the letter, the licence holder Steven McKinley (on behalf of McKinley Holdings) requested a meeting with PC Cherry and Boucouvalas. This was held at Southampton Central Police Station on the 9th February 2016.



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The licence holder agreed that the following measures were to be implemented.

- •SIA door supervisor commitment for 1 door supervisor per 80 customers at the premises.
- Risk assessments for extra SIA staff.
- •SIA to wear high visibility jackets as well as being more pro-active with dispersal at the end of the evening.
- •Glass collectors to wear high-visibility tops to identify them as staff.
- •CCTV, they will have approx 32 camera's covering all blind spots within the premises, additional camera's on the main door, dance floor and foyer. A commitment to work with Hampshire Constabulary's CCTV expert advisor.
- •To sell discounted bottled water at the end of the evening to customers.
- ·Provide free water in cups if required on dispersal.
- •Purchase and utilise a metal detecting arch which will supersede the use of metal detecting wands (if Hampshire Constabulary requests); however should there be a failure with the arch then to revert back to using wands
- •100% ID scanning of all customers during licensable activities.
- •Completely polycarbonate glassware with the exception of Champagne which will be served in a designated area with a SIA member and waitress supervision.
- •Door supervisor permanently positioned on the back door to stop any unauthorised entries; this is following a 17 year old gaining access by this means thus circumventing any challenges on the main entrance.

The Constabulary was disappointed that during the mediation periods with the licence holder, he appeared to attempt to deflect responsibility for this incident onto another venue. Although he accepted that the offender had come from his premises, he felt that the initial crowd wouldn't have been in Southampton if it wasn't for another venue having a particular event that evening drawing this type of customer to the location.

The licence holder advised that it was another venue's customers that had drifted into the dispersal of Junk customers. Within a cumulative impact area the premises customers should disperse without affecting others within the area. This being the case, the other venue in question had closed at least an hour earlier and had not had any issues with any of these customers whilst they had been in their venue or during their dispersal from their immediate area. Hampshire Constabulary believes that it was the lack of structured dispersal by door supervisors at the premises that may have been a contributing factor in the matter.

The investigation into the crimes committed are still ongoing in an attempt to bring offenders



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to justice.

Separate to this incident Hampshire Constabulary Licensing have attached details of other incidents linked to these premises over the past year. This is to demonstrate the type of incidents that are generally attributed to this venue.

(Annex 10) is an incident summary which encompasses all incidents documented at the premises for the past year, from 1/1/15-04/03/16.

The following details the different offences and amount of incidents attributed to the venue during this period (there are approx 8 incidents included within the total amount that demonstrates positive work by doorstaff)

Assaults = 23
Public Order = 6
ASB = 13
Criminal damage = 1
Sex offence = 1
Drugs = 4
Total incidents = 48

(Annex 11) is an additional graph which depicts times these incidents have occurred. It also high lights the risk times associated with these premises. (this information has been used to provide the evidence against reducing the venues opening hours)

At the time of presenting this information, Hampshire Constabulary would seek the revocation of this premises on the evidence provided to date.

Should the committee decide that there is sufficient evidence to allow these premises to continue their licensable activities after reviewing this paperwork, we would recommend the following changes to be applied immediately to the premises.

- 1. Renewal of the whole management team as the current team doesn't evoke confidence in the way they operate the premises
- 2. DPS removal, these premises demand that a strong and competent DPS is available at all key times
- 3. Reducement of opening hours, bring the closing time back from 0400 to 0200 in line with other venues immediately around this vicinity
- 4. To employ an approved SIA door team

In addition we would ask that the following conditions also be added to the premises licence, with some existing conditions being replaced with more appropriate wording.

Conditions to be added to the premises licence in addition to the above requests:



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1) CCTV

- 1.a The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.
- 1.b CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.
- 1.c The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.
- 1.d The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.
- 1.e Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.
- 1.f The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.
- 1.g There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format downloaded onto a disc. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.
- 1.h In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Western Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.
- 2) Incident book
- 2.a An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.
- 2.b Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.
- 2.c If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.
- 2.d At the close of business on each day the incident book will be checked by the manager on duty where any entries will be reviewed and signed. If incidents have occurred the duty manager will de-brief door staff at the close of business. Should there be no



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incidents then this will also be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

3) Refusals book

- 3.a A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager/manageress.
- 3.b The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.
- 3.c The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.

4) Challenge 25

- 4.a There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.
- 4.b Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the persons date of birth.
- 4.c If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.
- 4.d 'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

5) Training

- 5.a Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.
- 5.b All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.
- 5.c In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.
- 5.d All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire



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Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

6) ID SCANNER

- 6.a Electronic Identification Scanning must be in operation during licensable activities. The premises will carry out 100% ID scanning on all customers upon entry. Customers who do not agree to this will be refused entry.
- 6.b Accepted forms of identification will be passport, photo driving licence, or Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS), HM Forces ID card or other forms of identification agreed by Hampshire Constabulary in writing.
- 6.c If a fault develops with the ID scan during operating hours, police licensing team must be notified immediately either by e mail or orally to a licensing officer or by telephone leaving a message for the licensing department.
- 6.d If the fault occurs during opening hours the name, address and time of entry will be recorded of those persons who appear aged 25 years and under. Identification will be requested as proof of identification. If identification is not produced and the person concerned appears 25 years old or younger entry will be refused.
- 6.f The fault will be rectified within 24 hours of malfunction or a replacement ID scan machine will need to be loaned/ purchases in its place.

7) Polycarbonate

7.a No drinks can be supplied in glass vessels, all glass bottles will be decanted at the point of sale ie at the bar.

8) Toilet Checks

- 8.a The public toilets within the premise shall be checked every 30 minutes when the premises are open for a licensable activity. A record shall be kept by the premise and presented on request by Hampshire constabulary.
- 8.b Toilet check records shall be kept for a minimum period of 3 months.

9) SIA Doorstaff

9.a On all days the venue is open for licensable activities there will be sufficient ration of SIA doorstaff on duty (1-80) from when the venue opens to at least 30 mins past closing. This will assist with dispersal from the immediate area.

10) Metal wands/Arch

10.a Metal detecting wand checks – 100% of customers in attendance to be scanned with a metal detecting wand. You may wish to consider the implementation of a metal detecting arch as an alternative method to assist searching of customers.

11) Dispersal Policy



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11.a It is recommended the premises implements a new dispersal policy to reduce the risk of incidents at closing time. The Constabulary will assist in determining a suitable policy.

12) Crime mapping

12.a To provide crime mapping records on a monthly basis, highlighting areas of disorder within the premises and thereby assisting both the management and the door supervisors in the safe management of the premise to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary. This must remain on the premises at all times and be accessible to police upon request.

13) Hostesses

- 13.a There will be 1 dedicated member of staff who will be employed solely in the role of an hostess. Their responsibilities will be to patrol the venue and monitor customers for signs and/or symptoms of excess alcohol consumption. Anyone suspected of consuming excess amounts of alcohol will be taken to a welfare/first aid room.
- 13.b The welfare/first aid room shall be a room to be identified upon a plan produced to the police and licensing authority and shall be open for inspection, by the police or licensing authority during hours licensable activities are taking place.
- 13.c The hostess will monitor persons purchasing alcohol to check they are not mixing multiple shots or measures together to ensure responsible alcohol consumption. A record will be maintained providing details of persons attended to, date, time along with the member/s of staff involved.

14) Welfare/first aid room

14.a A room will be provided by the venue for the purpose of administering first aid. A first aid treatment box will be available and kept maintained. Persons identified as vulnerable shall be taken to the room where enquiries can be conducted to ensure their safety. This room will be covered at all times by cctv when the premises are open for licensable activities.

15) Last Entry

15.a Last entry of customers to the premises on any evening will now be prohibited to 0030hrs on any day the premises is operating licensable activities.

16) Drinks Outside

16.a Taking open vessels of drinks outside the premises is prohibited

To summarise:

- •A 24hr closure notice had to be served on Junk owing to a serious GBH incident that occurred in and around their venue which involved several customers being stabbed
- A rape allegation was raised within the venue which although unsubstantiated demonstrated poor management
- ·A magistrates hearing was held, the closure order was not obtained and the venue was



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allowed to continue operating

- ·Management has come under scrutiny owing to failures in their operating practices
- •SIA doorstaff have come under scrutiny through the lack of dispersal procedures.

In essence, this is a venue which requires strong management and tight conditions.

With regard to the CIP implications, the national guidance sets its face against the culling of licensed premises based on cumulative impact and that it is wrong to call in individual licenses' for review when the issue is cumulative. Nevertheless, there is case law (La Brea Ltd v London Borough of Hackney, 2015) that states there is an argument that it is entirely legitimate to take cumulative impact into account in the case of a "misbehaving licensee". The rationale is that one should not be able to attain through unlawful action that which would never have been (and was not) granted through applications for variation, and that the consequences of such behaviour are more serious in cumulative impact areas than in areas not suffering from stress.

Hampshire Constabulary believe that from the evidence provided, with the venue currently operating under the present management, within an extremely busy Cumulative Impact area, the management are not strong enough, therefore Hampshire Constabulary seek revocation of this premises licence.



- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor for the premises does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3 (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise antisocial behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 4 The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 6 The responsible person must ensure that
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

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- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

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- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- 7 1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 —

(a) 'duty' is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) 'permitted price' is the price found by applying the formula —

 $P = D + (D \times V)$

where-

(i) P is the permitted price,

- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) 'relevant person' means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence —
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) 'relevant person' means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) 'value added tax' means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

(1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ('the first day') would be different from the permitted price on the next day ('the second day') as a

result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

1 Conditions Transferred From The Public Music And Dancing Licence

a) Capacity

No more than 550 (five hundred and fifty) persons shall be present in the ground floor part of the premises at any one time (staff and customers), and no more than 150 (one hundred and fifty) persons shall be present in the basement part of the premises at any one time.

b) Admission

No admission to the premises after 03.00

c) REFUSE

No refuse, rubbish or waste paper shall be permitted to accumulate in any part of the place licensed.

d) VENTILATION

All parts of the place licensed shall be suitably and sufficiently ventilated by natural or mechanical means to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority.

2 Non Standard Timings

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- (a) On New Year's Eve the supply of alcohol is from 10:00 until 03:30 on 2nd January. All other licensable activities on New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day.
- (b) Additional hour on change from GMT to BST.
- 3 Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- (a) Door Staff
- i Door staff shall be on duty at all times that the premises are open to customers.
- ii All areas of the premises will be checked at the end of each evening to ensure all customers have left safely.
- iii At the close of business each evening there shall be at least 2 door staff patrolling the area immediately outside the premises for a minimum of 30 minutes thereafter to assist in the orderly dispersal of customers from the premises.
- (b) Taxis
- i Details of local taxi operators will be kept in the reception area.
- ii All staff will arrange for taxi's for customers when requested.
- 4 Prevention of Public Nuisance
- (a) Signs asking patrons to leave the premises quietly shall be displayed in prominent positions on or adjacent to doors used for egress from the premises.
- (b) Door staff will ensure that any queues are maintained in an orderly manner and do not cause any disturbances or obstructions.
- 5 Public Safety
- (a) Door staff will ensure that capacity numbers on the two floors are restricted to the maximum number by the use of "counters".
- (b) Door staff will safely control the dispersal of persons between the two floors.
- 6 1) The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas within reason and to cover any areas outside including but not limited to those used for smoking areas, queuing or other activities associated with the premises. The system should be able to cope with all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff available during operating hours to be able to provide copies at the request of the police or authorised officer.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

Recordings to be kept for a minimum of 28 days.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected

Recording equipment is to be housed in a secure place restricting access to authorised persons. (This can be on a computer which is password protected.)

All systems, signage, hardware and procedures are to be installed / implemented to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary and approved in writing.

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- The provision, maintenance and use of ID Scan equipment upon entry to the premises combined with the Challenge 25 policy to the reasonable satisfaction of the Hampshire Constabulary and Licensing Authority
- 3) An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises and there will be a daily debrief of door staff at the close of business to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary and Southampton City Council Licensing Authority.
- 4) All glasses used at the premises will be polycarbonate and the contents of all glass bottles will be decanted into polycarbonate glasses with the exception of Glass champagne, wine or spirit bottles which may be served in the VIP area but only with waitress service and controlled by a door supervisor'. For the avoidance of doubt bottles of beer, lager and alcohol pops will always be decanted into polycarbonate glasses where they are not available in PET or aluminium bottles or cans.
- 5) To provide adequate door staff to cover fire exits points and smoking area to ensure that unauthorised entry is restricted to the premise to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary

7 8 Training

All staff must receive comprehensive training in relation to age restricted products and the sale of alcohol. No member of staff shall be permitted to sell alcohol until such time as they have successfully completed this training. Training shall cover:

a) Sale of alcohol to persons under 18

- b) Challenge 25 and acceptable forms of Identification
- c) Signs of drunkenness
- d) Refusal register and when/how to use
- e) The Licensing Objectives

This training shall be documented and records kept on the premises. Police and the Licensing Authority shall have access to an individual's training records upon request.

9 Challenge 25

Any person appearing to those engaged in selling or supplying to be under the age of 25 and who is attempting to buy alcohol will be required to produce satisfactory photographic identification as proof of age. Acceptable ID shall be as per the latest Home Office guidance.

10 Refusal Book



Closure of Premises Notice Section 76 and 77 Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014

IN THE COUNTY OF HAMPSHIRE LOCAL JUSTICE AREA OF WEST HAMPSHIRE

Justices' Reasons for decision in the matter of an application for closure of premises under the Antisocial Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014

In the matter of the application dated 22 January 2016 for Closure of Junk Nightclub 55 London Road Southampton SO15 2AD:

We have read the bundle provided for today's hearing. We heard evidence from PC Conway, Inspector Roberts, PC Rackham, Mr. McKinlay, Mr. Leigh, Mr. Cool, and Mr. Nixon. We heard representations on behalf of both parties.

We reject the application for a Closure Order in respect of Junk Night Club as requested today.

Our reasons are that although we accept that there has been disorder near these premises in accordance with Section 80(5)(c) of the Act, we do not accept that a Closure Order is necessary to prevent the disorder continuing recurring or occurring:

- (a) We gauged the potential risks outlined by PC Conway and Inspector Roberts and do not accept that it has been made out that the suspects in the violent disorder on 22 January 2016 are regular customers at Junk Nightclub or that they are likely to return to this club. They may return to Southampton but Closure of this club will not prevent that happening.
- (b) The matter of two victims not engaging with police will not prevent further disorder by the Closure of this club.
- (c) Mention is made that people involved in the affray of 22 January 2016 are both local and from outside Hampshire. It is not proportionate to close this club to prevent this range of persons from attending Southampton.

And we recognise that the police have made the club aware of their concerns and accordingly the club has agreed that they will strengthen the security entry procedures (although we note that their licence does not require 100% ID scanning) and will ensure that additional staff are on duty.

We therefore do not grant a Closure Order today.

Dear Westley Leigh,

Thank you for meeting with PC Cherry and I at the premises on the 28th January 2016.

Following a serious incident at the premises on the 22nd January 2016, the Constabulary met with you as a representative for the premises licence holder McKinley Holdings Ltd.

The Constabulary was concerned about the continuation of disorder at the premises and therefore called the meeting to recommend the implementation of certain measures to reduce any risks of crime and disorder and harm to the public.

I have summarised our meeting below.

The organised student/young person event 'Big Night Out' being held later that night was discussed:

You advised that you had received a letter from Police Licensing detailing the minimum that was expected from the premises and what you had put in place following this advice.

- A dedicated 'club nanny' to identify vulnerability wearing a clearly identifiable t-shirt
- 100% ID Scanning of customers in attendance
- Polycarbonate drink vessels
- CCTV being monitored
- 6 door staff, 1 of which will be female
- Male toilets will be supervised by an attendant.
- Female toilets to be checked at intervals by door staff and bar staff
- A minimum alcoholic drinks price of £3.00

Further to this, the prospect of ID Scanning of customers was discussed. PC Boucouvalas queried whether the ID scanner is linked to other premises' ID scanners. DPS confirmed this ID scanning system is linked to others, however he understands that it is not the same system as others in the city centre therefore it cannot share data between one another. PC Boucouvalas requests that the DPS considers changing the system to facilitate communication with other ID Scanners in the city. PC Boucouvalas explained that this is to receive data about patrons who have caused issues in neighbouring premises. DPS explained that he manually inputs the local pub watch scheme banned individuals onto their ID scanner. DPS also stated the premises is considering a second ID Scanner one

that incorporates finger printing so that it speeds up the process, however he felt that this could be costly.

Temporary Event Notice - 30/01/16 Saturday (extension of hours)

DPS confirmed that the following measures were going to be adhered to during the licensable opening hours of the premises:

100% ID Scanning, you were not totally convinced with this as you felt that it may cause more problems with the queue, PC Cherry advised that following the recent incident this was a recommendation that Hampshire Constabulary felt they should adhere to.

Toilet attendants. DPS confirmed there is a male toilet attendant on Friday's and Saturday's, he is paid an hourly fee, he is there the whole time the premises is open and he makes up his money by receiving tips from customers. The female toilets will not be covered by an attendant but will be checked regularly, every 30 mins and these checks are recorded,

Challenge 25 will be operational

Metal detecting wands will be in use. The premises currently have a couple of loaned units from Hampshire Constabulary. The premises have 2 of their own, however 1 wand was broken during a separate incident the same night of the serious incident.

General measures at the premises

A metal detecting arch has been researched by the DPS. PC Boucouvalas confirmed the Constabulary does not have one to loan the premises. PC Boucouvalas recommended it best if the premises purchased one for their own benefit. The DPS advised that they use the metal wand on their customers. PC Cherry advised that this needs to be continued on a permanent basis for all of their customers.

DPS mentioned that they currently removed drugs from customers and dispose of them themselves rather than put them into the safe. PC Cherry advised that in future the premises should still record the details in the incident book but now put the seized drugs into exhibit bags, stored securely into a safe. The Constabulary could be contacted when necessary to arrange to pick up and dispose of these drugs at a convenient time to both the premises and Constabulary.

DPS advised that the premises are currently looking to add a further 16 camera's to the systems in place. This will then ensure that all public areas are covered and that there shouldn't be any blind spots. PC Boucouvalas pointed out to the DPS that he felt that the current CCTV was suffering a power voltage issue as there was a continuous rolling of lines through the cameras on the screen and that fault maintenance is required.

The Constabulary recommended that regardless of how many door staff they employ when open for licensable activities, they must always have 1 female SIA door staff on duty at all times.

DPS advised that they currently carry out random searches on their customers. The Constabulary recommends that this is carried out on all customers. The DPS felt that random checks was sufficient and still a deterrent.

DPS advised that all SIA staff members have access to the radio, all are linked to the managers, Duncan, Wes (DPS), Louis and there is an additional radio behind the bar for use if required. The bar staff have their own radio channel which Duncan has access to via a 2nd radio. This is to prevent the bar staff using the main channel to ask for money etc at the bar and preventing the door staff rushing to assistance every time the bar personnel come on the line.

The meeting concluded and the following measures were reiterated as urgent recommended implementations we would like the premises to adopt.

CCTV – The system should be upgraded with additional cameras. Following the recent serious incident, there are certainly blind spots that need attention. The quality of cctv images could be improved. The system requires maintenance as some cameras are flickering on and off, and there are power voltage issues causing lines to cross the footage.

Training - licensing refresher training to be conducted with staff.

ID Scanning – the premises should implement a policy of 100% Id Scanning of all customers. A photograph of customers in attendance is an additional measure which could be taken that can assist with the investigation of crime and disorder should it occur on the premises. We understand the ID Scanner may already have this facility. It would be highly beneficial to implement a system which could communicate with neighbouring premises ID scanning equipment where possible. This is to ensure you are equipped with information to refuse problematic patrons.

Challenge 25 - Operate a challenge 25 policy of all customers at the bar.

SIA Security – Increase the number of SIA Security officers on duty to 1 member of staff per 50 customers in attendance. We recommend a female member of security is on duty at all times as this can assist with the searching female customers. Door staff to wear high visibility jackets at all times to be clearly identifiable.

Toilet attendants - toilet attendants supervising lavatories in both the Gents and Ladies toilets at all times.

Metal detecting wand checks – 100% of customers in attendance to be scanned with a metal detecting wand. You may wish to consider the implementation of a metal detecting arch as an alternative method to assist searching of customers.

Dispersal Policy – It is recommended the premises implements a new dispersal policy to reduce the risk of incidents at closing time. The Constabulary will assist in determining a suitable policy.

I must stress this list is not exhaustive and the Constabulary is still investigating the incident. In the mean time, please contact the team with any questions or concerns.



Review of Junk, 55 London Road, Southampton.

I am writing on behalf of the Licensing Authority, as a Responsible Authority, to make a representation on the review application for the above premises in support of the police application.

I have read through the reports for the review application for the above. I note the police evidence and in particular the meeting on 9th February 2016 between the police and Mr McKinley where he agreed to a number of conditions. I appreciate the intention was to address the licensing objectives at this premises however there needs to be an appreciation of the wider impact of such measures.

The Statement of Licensing Policy adopted in January 2016 that has a vision statement as follows:

To create an environment that attracts a diverse range of well managed premises, able to flourish and grow, offering a range of entertainment to satisfy the needs of the city. To ensure Southampton is a safe and pleasant city to live, work and visit.

If a premises is managed in such a manner it is considered necessary to purchase and use a metal detecting arch to keep people safe and prevent crime then it raises serious doubts if other aspects of management of the premises are promoting the licensing objectives.

The police report lists a catalogue of offences at the premises that already has conditions with regards door staff, queue management, CCTV, an ID scanner linked with challenge 25 and use of polycarbonate glasses amongst other conditions. This suggests the clientele attracted to this premises are a risk and if attracted into the nightlife of Southampton are a risk to public.

I ask you to consider if a premises that is managed in such manner it attracts a clientele that requires such stringent measures is it truly promoting the licensing objectives of:

- Prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety

There is a tipping point with a premises licence where the application of conditions has little to no effect and raises doubt the premises should be licensed at all.

It is my strong opinion that renewal and continued late hours would be contrary to Licensing Objectives Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Nuisance and compromise Public Safety.

Having suffered the consequences of the night time economy use since the early 1990s, the drunken behaviour and criminal damage, noise nuisance etc I state that the very long hours of trading at JUNK could cause patrons to become very drunk, more so than at places that close earlier, unable to control their behaviour or bladders, for instance on Sunday morning there were puddles of urine in Henstead Road, Carlton Place and Vernon Walk and more to-day in Harborough, Kenilworth, Henstead Roads and Vernon Walk. There no huge dogs puddling in the area and it is not petrol, diesel, sump oil or spilled drinks, the smell is of urine.

I present a diary of suffering over the past three years, showing the night time dangers in this crime ridden area ,although some of the nuisance is at houses, often it occurs because the noise makers are drunk, as they explain that some of them have just got back from clubbing and are too drunk to know what they are doing.

The location of the club ,close to residential flats make it unsuitable for the present use and as more buildings are converted into homes in London Road that factor will be accentuated.

From my experience as a Polygon resident since 1985 I maintain that the long licensing hours at Junk do encourage patrons to become very drunk and get involved in violent action or become victims of that in the vicinity.

After leaving they could hang around and then obtain more alcohol in the off licences in Bedford Place on their way home.

The Junk hours should be cut back to 2 a.m. or 3 a.m. if not refused altogether.

In fact at one licensing hearing a Councillor actually said that nearby Carlton Place was at night the most dangerous street in Southampton. Therefore a continued grant would be contrary to the prevention of crime and disorder, public nuisance and it would compromise public safety.

The licensing department know that I have permission from the Daily Echo editor to copy and paste the articles, although this is only just a few of those in my collection.

Southampton footballer Dan Seaborne has suffered serious head injuries in an attack outside a nightclub in the city.

• Students are being warned after a series of sex attacks on young women walking alone in Southampton.

In 12 cases similar descriptions have been given of the attacker and detectives are keeping an open mind over whether some of them are linked.

The latest victim, 20, was sexually assaulted. Days earlier, three other women were attacked in nine-hours.

Southampton University is encouraging female students to join a scheme which provides taxis paid for on account.

The most recent attack took place in St Denys Road on 8 March.

The victim was grabbed from behind and pushed to the ground by a man in an alleyway. He threatened her saying he had a knife, then sexually assaulted her before fleeing as he heard voices approaching.

'Severely traumatised'

The victim described her attacker as 5ft 8in but said his face was covered. He spoke with, what is described as a foreign accent and was wearing a leather or hard material black jacket.

Det Sgt Tom Orchard said: "This is a distressing offence for anyone to endure and has, understandably, left this woman severely traumatised.

"We would also like to remind anyone walking alone, especially at night, to be constantly aware of their surroundings and to contact us immediately to report anything or anyone they consider to be suspicious."

Three lone women were indecently assaulted as they walked in the city between 22:00 GMT on 28 February and 07:00 on 29 February.

The assaults occurred in Banister Road, Governor Road, and in the city centre close to the Matalan store.

All three victims gave similar descriptions.

The woman who was assaulted in Banister Road believes her attacker held a knife against her.

'Personal safety'

A number of attacks occurred between late Tuesday evening and early Wednesday morning, which is one of the city's most popular student nights, but police have not confirmed the same person is responsible.

Speaking after the attack on 8 March, Det Sgt Tom Orchard added: "We are keeping an open mind about this assault and are unable to say whether it is linked to other recent incidents of indecent assault against women in Southampton."

A University of Southampton spokesman said all issues regarding student safety are treated with "utmost importance" so students are being reminded of appropriate measures to ensure their safety.

"In light of recent incidents which have occurred within the city, we have taken proactive steps to remind students about personal safety issues through a variety of means," he said.

A Southampton Rape Crisis spokeswoman said: "We understand that when there are reports of this nature within our local community it can cause increased anxiety.

"We would want to encourage people to give thought, as much as they can, to how they might take care of themselves and each other.

"For example, when planning nights out, having arrangements for how to get home, sticking with a trusted group of friends and keeping alcohol intake low can help keep people safer."

IT would have struck fear through the heart of any drug dealer, burglar, vandal or mugger.

A convoy of police vehicles sweeping its way through Southampton yesterday, backed up with teams of officers on bicycles and on foot, flooding the streets, estates and parks.

The convoy – featuring four cars and two vans – marked the launch of Operation Deluge, targeting antisocial behaviour, drug dealing, burglary and other crimes in the city's central and western neighbourhoods.

The operation involves drafting personnel from a wide range of backgrounds, including PCSOs, neighbourhood specialists, dog units and custody investigation teams, into a high visibility taskforce targeting carefully chosen hotspot areas.

On the beat It is based on tactics used by forces in New York, and Chief Inspector Craig Dibdin said: "The public want to see more officers on the beat but we never have enough police officers available to put where we need them all the time.

"But this way we are using our resources more imaginatively and effectively creating a movable unit which can be redeployed to different areas when needed."

The Daily Echo accompanied some of yesterday's 22-strong team to the Polygon and Bedford Place areas – focusing on burglary, drug dealing and shoplifting – where they patrolled streets, car parks and alleyways and spoke to businesses and shoppers.

Later they visited Millbrook and Shirley, including Windrush Road and the Redbridge Hill areas, plus Green Park and Mansfield Park to crack down on antisocial behaviour, drugs and vandalism. One man was arrested on suspicion of theft in Redbridge Hill, Millbrook, and there were 20 stop and searches — mainly on suspicion of drugs — plus a cannabis warning for a man stopped in Winchester Street.

The scheme will involve two more operations this month at alternative locations and times of the day to assess its success.

Chief Insp Dibdin stressed that the initiative prevented too many staff being drafted away from frontline patrols, and that it relies heavily on specific analysis to anticipate crimes in certain areas. He said: "We can predict where Crime is going to happen and put policing presence in those areas."

PC Gail Clarence said: "The high visibility is a win-win for us – people notice we are out and about and we can prevent crime while putting career criminals on the back foot."

Dear Mr Jeffrey

I am writing to you both on my own behalf and that of the 4 other tenants of Conroy Court, 65A London Road, Southampton, SO15 2AB in my capacity as the appointed Manager of Conroy Court Residents Association RTM concerning the licensing review for Junk Club, 85 London Road, Southampton SO15 2AD as detailed on the notice currently displayed outside the premises.

On behalf of all the residents of 65A London Road, I object to the continuing licence for Junk Club in the strongest possible terms.

65A London Road is located a very short distance from Junk of approximately 100 metres with our porch entrance and two of the 5 flats fronting London Road. It came as no real surprise to us that the dreadful incident of stabbings and assault took place in January earlier this year. The flats are privately owned and in addition to the 10 adults, two of the flats are owned by families with young children.

We regularly witness extremes of behaviour into the early hours of the morning in London Road and often directly in front of our homes. Myself, my young daughter and other residents have experienced abuse when coming into our building especially after midnight and I was once threatened with a physical assault by someone using the porch as a toilet.

Our porch entrance is frequently used as a toilet for both bodily functions and also as a vomiting receptacle, normally by young people who have almost certainly come from Junk and are clearly under the extreme influence of alcohol and I would also suspect drugs. This unpleasant behaviour has continued unabated even since the closure of The Varsity in early December and in any event that particular bar closed relatively early and caused few problems to us in spite of being next door thus confirming our strongly held belief that the offenders are from Junk. Once people have left Junk and whatever their condition, the door supervisors have both no control and certainly no interest.

I have also witnessed from my lounge window young people including girls relieving themselves in the main London Road at well past 3am and at times vomiting anywhere they chose. I have seen young people literally barely able to walk as they leave Junk and it must beg the licensing question 'never knowingly serve anyone when in your opinion they have already had too much alcohol to drink' – a licensing offence I believe! On one occasion, I witnessed students selling tickets for an event in Junk on a Tuesday night directly outside the front door. On the night of the event the queue stretched from Junk to underneath our flats in 65A London Road and the noise level from the young crowd was extreme and all this in the early hours.

London Road is the main entry road into our fine city leading directly from the Avenue but on Fridays, Saturdays and many Tuesdays the road more resembles a war zone! I have attached just a sample of the several images I have of smashed windows

affecting commercial premises in London Road which we suspect were caused by person or persons exiting Junk in the early hours.

I have also attached pictures of the ridiculous taxi situation directly opposite 65A London Road. On this occasion I was able to photograph what was a quite dangerous situation and one I see frequently from my windows. As you can see, the taxi at the end and literally on the corner of Belleview Road caused absolute mayhem when cars tried to exit Belleview Road and Carlton Crescent, especially with the arrival of a bus! The taxi rank is clearly marked but means absolutely nothing and I have to tolerate the banging of cab doors and the attended loud shouting of the people who often stagger out of them literally opposite my windows and those of Flat 2. When I attended the 'bus' in London Road when I could see for myself the proposed 'alterations and improvements' to this very important road, I was assured that the taxi rank would be some way from our flats and primarily opposite Junk. It actually is, but taxis queue up to the corner and some way down Belleview Road clearly evidenced from my photographs.

I bought my flat 12 years ago when there were virtually no extreme late opening times in the London Road/Bedford Place area and the subsequent granting of late licenses appears to pay no regard whatever to the welfare and quality of life of the long term residents who live here.

I feel it worth noting that Junk are actively promoting on facebook an event they call 'Save Junk' and have described it as 'We're throwing a massive #savejunk party on the 23rd April' celebrating 11 years! Apart from alarming us as residents, it is in itself a complete misnomer as everyone is aware that Junk has closed and re-opened performing a Phoenix rising more than once.

I will close by repeating my earlier comment, the residents of 65A London Road object in the strongest possible terms to the continuing licence for Junk I look forward to your kind acknowledgement of this communication



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




Good morning,

I am writing in response to the above licence application, as per your letter dated 15th March 2016.

I would like to add my support to the police report detailing their view that the licence for the above venue should be reviewed. As a local resident of Bellevue Road we regularly suffer the consequences of the late night opening hours of Junk. Although I am obviously unable to specifically site the actions of members of the public who have spent the evening at The Junk Club the particularly late opening hours of this club undoubtedly contribute heavily to the antisocial behaviour we suffer in the very early hours of the morning (i.e. after other local venues in the Bedford Place area have closed). This is obviously no doubt exacerbated by the fact that management are not able to control the behaviour of their clientele as they are leaving the venue and walking through residential roads.

This club is located within what is almost entirely a residential area, with young families and professionals living in the very near vicinity. It is in a completely unsuitable location and has a detrimental effect on the living environment of many people, especially when combined with other late night venues, creating a recognised area of concern within the Bedford Place/London Road locality. From my understanding the council is attempting to encourage families and homeowners back into the high proportion of rented properties within the city and the long term plan is that the Bedford Place venues will, in the future have earlier closing hours of midnight. This will obviously be of huge benefit to local residents who suffer from the consequences of late night antisocial behaviour caused by these venues, The Junk Club in particular, and I hope that by reviewing the licence for what is obviously a very problematic venue the council will demonstrate the beginning of its attempt to both encourage residents back into city properties, as well as showing consideration and concern for those residents currently living in the near vicinity of the Bedford Place area.

A venue that has dealt so poorly with such a high number of incidents in recent months and is clearly of great concern to the local police, who are spending a large number of hours dealing

with the consequences of this club should surely be reassessed in its right to continue to operate under the existing conditions that have allowed the current situation to evolve.

I hope consideration will be shown to local residents and the justifiable concerns of local police and the incidents they regularly deal with.
