### **Terms of Reference**

The Sub-Committee deals with licences for which the Council is responsible under the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005, including:-

- Determination of applications for review of premises licences and club premises certificates;
- Determination of representations to applications for premises licences and club premises certificates, variations and various permits;
- Determination of police objections to applications for:
  - Variation of designated premises supervisors
  - Transfer of premises licences
  - Personal licences for the sale of alcohol
- Determination of objections to temporary event notices.

#### **Relevant Representations**

Those who have made relevant representations may address the meeting about the matter in which they have an interest. New matters, not raised within a written representation, can not be relied upon at the hearing. When dealing with Licensing Act matters the Sub-Committee must only take into account the following statutory Licensing Objectives:-

- prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

### Likewise, when dealing with Gambling Act matters the Sub Committee must only take into account the statutory Licensing Objectives below:-

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way, and
- Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling

This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.

- (iii) Any contract which is made between you / your spouse etc (or a body in which the you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest) and Southampton City Council under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed, and which has not been fully discharged.
- (iv) Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of Southampton.
- (v) Any license (held alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of Southampton for a month or longer.
- (vi) Any tenancy where (to your knowledge) the landlord is Southampton City Council and the tenant is a body in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interests.
- (vii) Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of Southampton, and either:
  - a) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body, or
  - b) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest that exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);

**RESOLVED** that Councillor Blatchford be elected as Chair for the purposes of this meeting.

### 6. <u>MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING (INCLUDING MATTERS ARISING)</u>

**RESOLVED** that the minutes of the meeting held on 26 May 2016 be approved and signed as a correct record.

### 7. **EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC**

**RESOLVED** that in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 that the parties to the hearing, press and public be excluded at a predetermined point whilst the Sub-Committee reaches its decision.

# 8. <u>APPLICATION FOR VARIATION OF A PREMISES LICENCE - SCOOZI BAR & GRILL, 37A OXFORD STREET, SOUTHAMPTON SO14 3DP</u>

The Sub-Committee considered the application for variation of a Premises Licence in respect of Scoozi Bar and Grill, 37A Oxford Street, Southampton SO14 3DP.

Mr Gray (Solicitor for Applicant), Ferit Ndoci (Applicant), Judith Williams and Reece Bridges, as witness (Local Residents) were present and with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

**RESOLVED** that the variation for the premises licence be granted as applied for and subject to a recommendation.

After private deliberation the Sub-Committee reconvened and the Chair read out the following decision:-

All parties will receive formal written confirmation of the decision and reasons.

The Sub-Committee has considered very carefully the application for variation of a premises licence at Scoozi Bar & Grill, 37A Oxford Street, Southampton SO14 3DP. It has given due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance and the adopted statement of Licensing Policy. Human Rights legislation was borne in mind whilst making the decision.

The Sub-Committee heard concerns regarding the display of notices on site. Further information was provided confirming that licensing enforcement officers had visited the premises, unannounced, and taken photographs of notices on display.

The Sub-Committee noted that the applicant had agreed conditions with the Police relating to:

- CCTV
- Challenge 25
- Incident and refusals log
- Training
- Security officers
- Polycarbonate glassware
- Signage
- Toilet checks
- Last entry

The Sub-Committee noted representations made by two residents in relation to the application and heard oral evidence from one resident and her witness.

In consideration of all of the above the Sub-Committee has determined to approve the application as applied for and subject to a recommendation.

### Reasons

The Sub-Committee considered very carefully the residents' representations and in particular noted the following issues raised:

- That sound travels from the area containing most licensed premises uphill towards the residential area;
- That the number of premises creates a cumulative impact and that additional hours or an increase in licensable activities will further add to those issues;
- An unofficial taxi rank forms encouraging patrons towards the residential area;
- That customers are drawn away from the licenced premises towards the residential areas for parking;
- That customers cause criminal damage, noise nuisance and commit offences including urinating in public places and drug taking;
- The Human Rights Act requires a balancing exercise; and
- A general lack of police presence.

The Sub-Committee did very carefully consider all these points, however accepted the point raised by the solicitor for the applicant relating to the causal link between these issues and the applicant's premises in particular, as well as other licensed premises. It is also noted that the resident mentioned nuisance arising from other premises providing other forms of entertainment including live and amplified music. The Sub-Committee was mindful of the fact that the applicant's premises are food led being mainly of restaurant use and with bar provision being ancillary to food. The Sub-Committee did not accept assertions that the nature of the premises would necessarily change by the granting of an additional hour.

The Sub-Committee considered carefully the argument that a cumulative impact arises due to the number of premises in the locality. Whilst, in accordance with the Licensing Authorities policy, the Sub-Committee can consider such an impact, it is noted that the premises is not located within an area already identified as a result of police evidence

as suffering from undue levels of stress (and where the rebuttable presumption applies). In the alternative, the Licensing Authority is presented with an application where the police have agreed conditions, which the Sub-Committee is bound to infer satisfies any concerns they may have. The list of conditions is a lengthy one and the conditions are detailed. The Sub-Committee also notes in particular that there is a lack of representation from Environmental Health in relation to noise complaint from the premises.

The Sub-Committee was invited to accept that the limited representation for the residential objectors was not indicative of the level of concern. However, the Sub-Committee is bound to make a decision on the basis of the evidence that is presented to it and accordingly cannot make assumptions or predictions in this regard.

The Sub-Committee heard the very eloquent evidence from the residential objector and her witness and held some sympathy for the issues faced by them. However, the Sub-Committee heard from the applicant that the intention was to retain customers that had eaten a meal rather than attract large number of "new customers" after the provision of food has ceased. Making predictions on this point is somewhat speculative at this stage and as a result the Sub-Committee is minded to grant the applicant the benefit of the doubt in this instance.

However, local residents can be reassured that in the event that the grant of the licence does in fact lead to issues of concern, relevant to the licensing objectives, a review may be initiated where evidence of the same can be considered. This may result in appropriate steps being taken to address them. This can be done by a local resident or a ward Councillor as well as any of the responsible authorities.

The Sub-Committee did very carefully consider all of the evidence but ultimately came to the conclusion that at this point in time the balance of evidence did not justify refusing the additional hour sought and the inclusion of outdoor space, and that the grant of the licence was the appropriate and proportionate step at this time.

### Recommendation

The Sub-Committee considered carefully whether it should condition the use of the outside area to protect the interests of local residents. In light of all the evidence the Sub-Committee had heard it was not deemed necessary to impose a condition. However, the Sub-Committee does strongly recommend that the outside area is cleared of customers by 12 midnight Sunday to Thursday and before 01:00 hours Friday to Saturday.

There is a right of appeal for all parties to the Magistrates' Court. Formal notification of the decision will set out that right in full.

### **Legal Implications**

- 1. The legislation specifically restricts the grounds on which the sub-committee may refuse an application for grant of a premises licence, or impose conditions. The legislation provides for a presumption of grant of an application for a premises licence, subject to the determination of the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. In doing so the sub-committee must give appropriate weight to:
  - the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
  - the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
  - its own statement of licensing policy
  - the Statutory Guidance
- 2. An application may be refused in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
- 3. An applicant for grant of a premises licence whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Any other person, who made a valid representation, may appeal to the Magistrates' Court against the decision to grant the application or against any conditions imposed.
- 4. In considering this application the sub-committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider the application in accordance, in particular, with both the Licensing Act 2003

(Hearings) Regulations 2005 (as amended) and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the sub-committee must make its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.

- 5. The sub-committee must also have regard to:
  - The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the sub-committee under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.
  - The Human Rights Act 1998
    The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the sub-committee to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the sub-committee that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of proportionality the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the sub-committee which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matters set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.



## **Appendix**

#### 1. CCTV

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity.

All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format downloaded onto a disc. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Western Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.

#### 2. Incident book

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.

If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.

The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the incident log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the manager. Should there be no incidents then this will be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

#### 3. Refusals book

The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager. A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol.

The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.

The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.

#### 4. Challenge 25

There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.

Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the person's date of birth.

If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

#### 5. Training

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.

All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

#### 6. Toilet Checks

The public toilets within the premise shall be checked every 30 minutes when the premises are open for a licensable activity. A record shall be kept by the premise and presented on request by Hampshire constabulary. Toilet check records shall be kept for a minimum period of 3 months.

#### 7. Dispersal Policy

A dispersal procedure will be adopted during the last trading hour to ensure minimal disturbance to neighbours and to tackle the problem of anti-social behaviour and crime. This will include:

During the last 30 minutes of trading the service points at the bar will be reduced and certain staff reallocated to collect glasses

Music volume will be reduced during the last 30 minutes of trading.

All areas of the premises will be checked at the end of each evening to ensure all customers have left safely and a signed record of these checks to be kept on the premises at all times and to be made available to the Police upon request.

Notices will be displayed in prominent positions at the exit of the premises requesting customers to leave quickly and quietly.

### 8. Authorisation of supply of alcohol in absence of DPS

A record will be kept at the premise of any persons that the DPS has authorised to supply alcohol. Further to this when the DPS is absent from the premise a list will be made available stating who will be managing the venue.

#### 9. Sample door staff conditions

SIA Registered Door Staff

At all times when the premises is open for licensable activities there shall be a risk assessment conducted as to whether it is necessary to employ SIA staff. Records of the risk assessments made will be kept for a minimum of 12 months.

#### 10. External Areas

No licensable activities or consumption of alcohol or food will take place externally after 00:00hrs.

#### 11. Fire Safety Law

All staff should understand the relevant fire safety legislation.

Have an understanding of fire development and the behaviour of people in fire.

Understand the fire hazards, fire risks and relevant factors associated with occupants at special risk within the building.







We are writing to oppose this application, and in particular the late opening until 12 midnight, for the following reasons:-

- (1) Portswood District Centre (DC) is situated within a densely populated residential area. It comprises a single row of retail outlets on either side of the Portswood Broadway, which as defined is approximately 200 metres in length.
- (2) This proposal would further increase the already excessive number of outlets providing alcohol to 20 in number over a length of 200 metres, namely on average one every 10 metres.
- (3) Of especial concern are the long hours of provision, particlarly late a night until 12 midnight, every night of the week. The applicant's title, Tram Stop Bar, indicates that a major part of the trade will be from the planned over-sized bar which will provide take-away food together with alcohol.
- (4) The increasing number of alcohol outlets concentrated into a restricted area,together with the late night opening will be much greater than required for the local community. They will act as a magnet to attract large number of patrons from other parts of the city.

- 1) Portswood District Centre (DC) is situated within a densely populated residential area. It comprises solely a single row of retail premises on either side of Portswood Broadway, which as defined is approximately no more than 200 metres in length.
- 2) This is a proposed increase in the already excessive number of outlets providing alcohol. If granted there will be 20 premises licenses for alcohol sale within the 200m. length of the DC one every 10 metres, with a further 5 premises within 100 metres outside the DC.
- 3) The present application until 12 midnight prolongs drinking time and off license sales until too late at night. This is especially so for the the applicant is Tram stop BAR

which indicates that its planned outsize bar will dominate trade.

Further my email dated 26.5.2016 objecting to this application, this re-application now includes the provision of live music 11 am till 2300 pm every day Monday to Sunday and recorded music 9 am till 23.00 pm every day Monday to Sunday 10pm.

The reasons for objection stated in my email (1) –(7) still apply, but the provision of live music in particular will have additional deleterious effects on the District Centre and neighbouring residents.

In particular (a) The disproportionately long bar and associated large bar area accessed directly from the street with the restaurant area situated towards the rear will in effect mean the proposal will act in the manner of a public house – it will be a "micro-pub". This will result in an excessive increased concentration of three pubs within the 200 metre long DC, with a further two (The Richmond & Gordon Arms) only 30 metres away outside the DC.

I should like to object to this application by Tramstop Bar for yet another premises licence to sell alcohol in the District Centre. (DC). The premises already have planning permission for a restaurant/cafe and take- away. The plans for this premises licence suggest that the bar element would be a major feature.

My concerns are that the hours sought by this licence would extend beyond the opening hours granted by the planning permission for the change of use from the doctors surgery to restaurant/café/T/A in 2014,-which were limited to 10am-11pm Monday to Saturday and 10am-9.30pm on Sunday, to protect nearby residential amenity.

There are already enough outlets selling alcohol in the District Centre. Portswood DC is a small shopping centre- only 200 metres long- in the middle of a densely populated residential area. There are already 20 Licensed premises in the DC (including 2 public houses- The Mitre and Wild Lime), plus 2 public houses (the Gordon Arms and The Richmond) and 3 other licensed premises just outside it, at the southern end. An increase in the number of outlets selling alcohol in the DC would increase the danger of drunkenness and rowdiness in the DC.

This increases the probability of noise, disturbance and anti-social behaviour especially in the evenings and at night-time. Our house already suffers from noise from events at the Mitre and from revellers passing through the area, and it lies directly behind the Library and is therefore likely to be affected by customers and events from Tram Stop, especially as the place is to feature live music.

We already have to put up with litter from eaters and drinkers, and another outlet would merely add to this.c) Litter (cans and bottles)- we already suffer from this- and

Re the above application - I am aware that others have raised very valid points in relation to this but I wish to add the further considerations - alcohol leads to totally unacceptable behaviour as we all know - living in Brookvale Road (NO. 18) we have noise from rowdy and raucous out of control individuals- we have their litter in our garden, and their vomit, urination and defaecation - presumably not one member of the Committee would appreciate this in their front gardens? Are further public toilet facilities going to be provided in Portswood High Street?

The intake of alcohol produces a diuresis and this has to be provided for in a civilised and acceptable manner.

Further - I have worked in the casualty department of a busy teaching hospital - are any of you aware of the scenes that so often arise on a Saturday night/sunday morning? It can be horrendous - whilst the staff are dealing with rowdy drunken vomitting and abusive individuals, partially or fully comatose, some with lacerations and fractures - they cannot give attention to others who are in need of emergency care for non self-inflicted conditions, who are therefore left waiting. This is the result of freely available alcohol.

If you agree to this application being granted permission then we can only assume that you are perfectly content for yourself, your family, your parents, to wait for treatment following a coronary, stroke, aortic bleed or whatever - and for your children also to be left in pain with their ear infection, appendicitis or even more serious conditions?

Please note that I as per you website advice that you can email objections to applications for licence to sell alcohol, I wish to object to an application for Portswood Road (In what was previously a Doctors Surgery.

Firstly I wish to notify you that the sign that should be displayed to notify the public is actually ripped where the address is so it is not clear what the number is. It reads but as 88 Portswood Road but this cannot be correct as the numbers of neighbouring business are in 3 figures.

Planning permission was lodge for a café and this was discussed at a local residents group. I later found that the site was looking to sell alcohol via information boards on the internet. With this in mind I looked for the poster notifying the public of an application but did not find any. I walk past this building everyday and there has over the last week been no sign visible in the window that it is now attached to and in fact there have been boards up on the windows (with fly posted signs for other events).

The sign is ripped and tacked up on a new window that has been in place less than 2 days. The scope/ deadline for these objects are 29.04.16-28.05.16 but there has been insufficient display of this application to allow fully presented arguments for objections.

I have emailed one of the local councillors to advise of this situation.

There is a wealth of reasons to not grant another licence in this area. Portswood road already has multiple pubs, bars, off licences and shops selling alcohol with late opening hours.

There is in fact PSPO in operation on this part of the road and one of the signs is outside 188 Portswood Road yet there is an application to sell alcohol on or off the premises (in a road where it cannot be consumed in the street).

Another licence being granted would fly in the face of the work the Council is doing to control drinking and anti social behaviour in the area.

Please can you advise me if there is to be an extension of this deadline for objections (which would also enable local residents groups to further discuss the application.

Dear Sir/Madam, I am writing to urge you to reject the licensing application recently submitted for this premises at 186 Portswood Road (Ref: 2016/01441/O1SPRN).

As a local resident and someone who walks up and down Portswood Road many times each week (including late into the evening), I strongly feel that to licence this premises as proposed would be irresponsible and very detrimental to the area. Portswood Road has already turned somewhat from a shopping street to an entertainment venue, but fortunately, SO FAR, has avoided becoming a late night partying and drinking venue for the transient student population in the area. Agreeing this application would change that and so it should be refused.

This venue is very close to residential areas and would lead to noise disturbance both from noise during the late hour openings and from those leaving the site very late at night every day of the week. At present the centralisation of late night venues in the city centre helps avoid such local disturbance and a great dispersal of the returning noise and drunken behaviour. Creating a new group of late night venues on Portswood Road will bring that disturbance to this residential area. With increasing student residences being built in the Portswood area this time/distance buffer between the late night venues and the homes the customers are returning to would be lost if this premises was to be approved. This buffer is vital to avoid significant late night problems. Approving this application would be a step towards creating a late night rowdy 'ghetto' in this area.

To allow a premises like this to be open to midnight seven days a week would be totally unacceptable for the local working population. This is true for any night before a working day but particularly so on a Sunday at the beginning of the working week. As stated above the noise disturbance late a night will go far beyond the immediate vicinity without any buffer to enable people to sober up and calm down.

Although there is already the Mitre pub close by this is a well established venue on a much larger site (and separated on an island from any residential properties). As such it has much more chance of containing and controlling the disturbance it creates and as such is not comparable to this proposed application. Its presence should therefore not be considered in any way a precedent to this application. Furthermore it has to be recognised that multiple nearby venues will likely multiply the problems that will occur.

The effect of this late night venue on other businesses in it's immediate vicinity also needs to be considered. The rubbish, vandalism and vomiting that will result from its approval will lead to customers of these nearby shops being discouraged, and even the businesses themselves being discouraged, so leading to a further degradation of this commercial shopping area.

Finally any suggestion, or consideration, that opening late will help the premises to run a good restaurant needs to be dismissed. This has been clearly

demonstrated by the Wild Lime (at the other end of the shopping street) that has clearly concentrated on becoming a drinking place and sports watching venue as opposed to maintaining any sort of quality food service as it began with. Allow this premises to open late will ultimately enable them to take the same approach.

So in conclusion I strongly believe that these late night hours requested are unacceptable and would lead to a considerable deterioration to this shopping and residential area. As such I urge the Licensing Committee to reject them.

I write to object to this application.

#### Details

The premises are on a large corner site, previously a doctor's surgery. Planning permission was granted in 2014 for a change of use to a restaurant/café/takeaway( A3 and A5 Use). The plans show that the whole of the ground floor would comprise a large bar and restaurant, with a raised decking area outside at the rear. A kitchen, office and store room would be on the first floor; WCs, a staff room and a large cold room and a bottle store in the basement.

My objections are as follows:

# 1. There are already more than enough premises selling alcohol in Portswood District Centre.( DC)

Portswood DC is a small shopping centre- only 200 metres long- in the middle of a densely populated residential area. There are already 20 licensed premises in the DC including 2 public houses- The Mitre and Wild Lime), plus 2 public houses (the Gordon Arms and The Richmond) and 3 other licensed premises just outside it, at the southern end. The addition of yet another licensed premises would lead to a concentration of such outlets in this part of the DC- - it would be the 6<sup>th</sup> licensed premise within 50 metres, at the northern end of the DC.

- 2. The hours sought for the sale of alcohol- 11am to 12 midnight- 13 hours a day, 7 days a week –would be excessive, particularly on Sunday. Almost half of the licensed premises in the DC close before midnight (and the majority close before then, on Sundays). If granted, others would be forced to seek later hours in order to compete, causing an escalation in late night drinking venues.
- 3. The addition of yet another licensed premise in the DC would attract people from outside the area, making it a centre for the consumption of alcohol, and an increasing danger of drunkenness and rowdiness in the DC.

- 4. This, in turn would lead to an increased risk of :
- a) Noise and disturbance and b) Anti-social behaviour c) Litter and d) even Crime (e.g. damage to cars)
- --- in the DC, with people congregating, on the corner, outside the premises, ----and on their way home through the nearby residential roads, late at night, after closing time, when the only police cover is centrally monitored (local police now cover for the whole City, rather than the local area, so there is no specific police cover in the area).
- 5. Local residents, above the shops, especially the new flats above the estate agent opposite, and in nearby residential roads would be adversely affected by all of 4) above. The DC is situated in the middle of a densely populated residential area. In addition, Portswood Residents Gardens Conservation Area (comprising Highfield Lane, Abbotts Way, Russell Place and Brookvale Road), whose key feature is that of a' quiet residential area' is within 100metres of the premises, - and whose roads lie on the way back to the University.
- 6. I live in Russell Place, and my back garden is about 100 m away from these premises.
- a) We are at times disturbed by noise, late at night, from the DC, especially in the summer months, when the windows are open. An additional outlet here, selling alcohol, at such late hours, would add to this.
- b) We already suffer from <u>litter in Russell Place</u>, and regularly collect empty cans and bottles. An additional outlet selling alcohol on and off the premises would add to this.
- 7. The hours sought by this licence would extend beyond the opening hours granted by the planning permission for the change of use from the doctors surgery to restaurant/café/take away, in July 2014(Application No.14/00739/FUL). I am writing in sadness to register a formal objection to the application by Tramstop Bar to open premises in Portswood High Street in the site of the old Doctor's Surgery.

There are already 20 licensed premises in the District Centre (as well as 18 food outlets) and the result can only be described as a distinctly malign alteration of a street which was once, as I understand, both pleasant and relatively genteel. The length of the high street in question is only 200 metres. Enough is enough.

If the application is adhered to, it would make it the third pub in the immediate Portswood area. There are two other pubs and three licensed premises further down Portswood high street.

I am now in my sixth year as a Street Pastor in the town and am only too well aware of the consequences of excess alcohol consumption, both on the the consumer, the environment and the residents in the area. There are far too many outlets for alcohol as it is and I gather that the selling of alcohol will be a major feature of the premises as projected.

Portswood High Street lies in the middle of a residential area. We live at the lower end of Brookvale Road and the behaviour of rowdy individuals - both genders and not just youth, disturbing our sleep is, to say the least, annoying. The more alcohol (and food) outlets there are, the bigger the problem will inevitably become, not to mention the consequences in terms of litter, anti-social behaviour and violence. - A report in the British Medical Journal last year noted that, as I remember, 50% of violence takes place within 100 yards of an alcohol outlet. Additionally, the hours sought, 11.0 am to midnight would mean people percolating home through what should be quiet residential streets in the early hours of the morning; not to mention a number of Old People's homes. And the litter problem which is bad enough as it is.

I have to ask, is this the sort of environment you want to create in the centre of a residential area? Would you want it for your children and grandchildren? The ratepayers of the area (and students do not pay rates) are entitled to a view, and to be sensitively represented.

I trust you will reject this application.

I wish to object most strongly to the application for a premises licence for the sale of alcohol, both on and off the premises between 11am and 12 midnight 7 days per week; live music inside 11am to 11pm 7 days per week; recorded music 9am to 11pm 7 days per week. Opening hours 9am to 12 midnight.

The hours sought are excessive, including Sunday. The impact on the local area will be seriously damaging to residents and the noise, alcohol consumption, litter and anti-social behaviour will all increase. Alcohol consumption is a major health hazard, contributing to liver disease, obesity and type 2 diabetes. There already exist 20 licensed premises in Portswood District Centre , including 2 pubs, and a further 2 pubs and 3 other licensed premises in the near vicinity.

The change of use from the previous doctors' surgery granted planning permission for a restaurant/ cafe/ takeaway in 2014 with opening hours limited to 10am to 11pm Monday to Saturday and 10am - 9.30 pm on Sunday.

I live in Highfield Lane about 100metres from this proposed development and already suffer disturbance from inebriated late-night revellers, litter from take-away food and intrusion into my garden, with anti-social behaviour. The prospect of this increasing and the noise volume which would pollute the area lead me to protest most strongly against this further erosion of our right to a peaceful environment.
