Terms of Reference

The Sub-Committee deals with licences for which the Council is responsible under the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005, including:-

- Determination of applications for review of premises licences and club premises certificates;
- Determination of representations to applications for premises licences and club premises certificates, variations and various permits;
- Determination of police objections to applications for:
 - Variation of designated premises supervisors
 - Transfer of premises licences
 - Personal licences for the sale of alcohol
- Determination of objections to temporary event notices.

Relevant Representations

Those who have made relevant representations may address the meeting about the matter in which they have an interest. New matters, not raised within a written representation, can not be relied upon at the hearing.

When dealing with Licensing Act matters the Sub-Committee must only take into account the following statutory Licensing Objectives:-

- prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

Likewise, when dealing with Gambling Act matters the Sub Committee must only take into account the statutory Licensing Objectives below:-

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way, and
- Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling

- Prevention and early intervention
- Protecting vulnerable people
- Affordable housing
- Services for all
- City pride
- A sustainable Council

DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS

A Member must regard himself or herself as having a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in any matter that they or their spouse, partner, a person they are living with as husband or wife, or a person with whom they are living as if they were a civil partner in relation to:

(i) Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.

(ii) Sponsorship:

Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from Southampton City Council) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expense incurred by you in carrying out duties as a member, or towards your election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.

(iii) Any contract which is made between you / your spouse etc (or a body in which the you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest) and Southampton City Council under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed, and which has not been fully discharged.

(iv) Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of Southampton.

(v) Any license (held alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of Southampton for a month or longer.

(vi) Any tenancy where (to your knowledge) the landlord is Southampton City Council and the tenant is a body in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interests.

(vii) Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of Southampton, and either:

- a) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body, or
- b) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest that exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

Other Interests

A Member must regard himself or herself as having an 'Other Interest' in any membership of, or occupation of a position of general control or management in:

Any body to which they have been appointed or nominated by Southampton City Council

Any public authority or body exercising functions of a public nature

Any body directed to charitable purposes

Any body whose principal purpose includes the influence of public opinion or policy

Principles of Decision Making

All decisions of the Council will be made in accordance with the following principles:-

- proportionality (i.e. the action must be proportionate to the desired outcome);
- due consultation and the taking of professional advice from officers;
- respect for human rights;
- a presumption in favour of openness, accountability and transparency;
- setting out what options have been considered;
- setting out reasons for the decision; and
- clarity of aims and desired outcomes.

In exercising discretion, the decision maker must:

- understand the law that regulates the decision making power and gives effect to it. The decision-maker must direct itself properly in law;
- take into account all relevant matters (those matters which the law requires the authority as a matter of legal obligation to take into account);
- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);

RESOLVED that Councillor Tucker be elected as Chair for the purposes of this meeting.

RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 22, 29 and 30 March 2016 be approved and signed as a correct record.

RESOLVED

- (i) that in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, the press and public be excluded from the meeting in respect of viewing CCTV evidence disclosed by the Police in relation to Item 7 (minute no 44) and be invited to return immediately following private session; and
- (ii) that in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 that the parties to the hearing, press and public be excluded at a predetermined point whilst the Sub-Committee reaches its decision.

44. **HEARING TO CONSIDER APPLICATIONS FOR REVIEW AND SUMMARY REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - SHIELD AND DAGGER, STRATTON ROAD, SHIRLEY, SOUTHAMPTON SO15 5QZ**

The Sub-Committee considered applications for Review and Summary Review of a Premises Licence in respect of Shield and Dagger, Stratton Road, Shirley, Southampton SO15 5QZ.

Jon Wallsgrove (Solicitor), Tony Cookson (Manager / Owner – Shield and Dagger), Christopher Kelly, Rob Kelly (Local Residents), Craig Hawkes (Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service) and PC Boucouvalas (Hampshire Constabulary) were present and with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee moved into confidential session to view CCTV evidence disclosed by the Police in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED that the premises licence be amended to include all the conditions imposed at the interim steps hearings, save for the amendment of hours, DPS and SIA door supervisor conditions. That four additional conditions be imposed.

After private deliberation the Sub-Committee reconvened and the Chair read out the following decision:-

The Sub-Committee determined that the hearing should proceed with the press and public excluded at a pre-determined point, namely whilst CCTV evidence was shown. This decision was made in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005. It was heard that the CCTV footage showed and thereby identified individuals (unconnected third parties) and that accordingly it would not be in the public interest to disclose it more widely. In addition, it was noted that police investigations are also ongoing in relation to the incidents shown.

The Sub-Committee has considered very carefully the certificate of Superintendent Heydari, the application for summary review and the interim steps imposed at the previous Hearing. In addition, the representations by all the parties present at the hearing as well as written representations were also fully taken into consideration.

It has given due regard to the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, including the statutory licensing objectives, the statutory guidance and the City Council's adopted statement of licensing policy. Human rights legislation has been borne in mind.

The Sub-Committee determined not to revoke the premises licence in this instance, despite holding very grave concerns about the nature of the incidents at this premises. The Sub-Committee has determined to impose the following conditions:

All the conditions that were previously imposed at the interim steps hearings, save for the amendment of hours, DPS and SIA door supervisors conditions (for the avoidance of any doubt the provision for suspension is also removed). This means that the following conditions shall remain on the premises licence; CCTV, incident book, refusals log, Challenge 25 and training.

In addition, the Sub-Committee has determined to impose the following conditions:

1. Customers are at no time to be permitted behind the bar at the premises whilst the premises licence is in force.
2. Staff are not to consume alcohol or be under the influence of alcohol whilst on duty at the premises.
3. Off duty staff must not go behind the bar or serve customers. Staff shall also be trained on the distinction between being on and off duty and that whilst off duty they should not assume responsibility for serving or managing the premises. That training shall be included with the other training required by condition attached to this licence and shall be subject to the same requirements regards refresher training and testing.
4. On every occasion that: i) a private function or hiring of the premises occurs or; ii) on occasions when live music (excluding karaoke) is provided at the premises, there shall be a minimum of two SIA registered door supervisors at the premises from 21:00 hours until the premises have closed and all customers and staff have left the premises and dispersed from the immediate vicinity.

Reasons:

The Sub-Committee heard evidence from Hampshire Constabulary that was of particular and very grave concern. A history of lack of cooperation was described, particularly in relation to due diligence at the premises generally and in relation to

CCTV provision. It is disappointing that Police intervention did not see these matters addressed at an earlier stage and that an unfortunate turn of events coupled with the issues raised by Hampshire Constabulary have led to today's hearing. This lack of due diligence is reinforced and reiterated by issues raised by Hampshire Fire and Rescue. The Sub-Committee accepts Police evidence indicating that complaints have been received but also notes evidence for the Premises Licence Holder that complaints may have been made maliciously.

The Sub-Committee considered very carefully all of the options available to it in accordance with Section 52 of the Act, including revocation of the premises licence.

Despite the very serious nature of recent incidents at the premises the Sub-Committee has determined not to revoke the premises licence at this time. The additional conditions combined with those already imposed are considered to be the appropriate and proportionate response to deal with the specific issues raised by Hampshire Constabulary and other parties. It was also noted that the Premises Licence Holder has managed the premises for a considerable period and that the most serious incidents of concern have occurred within a short and recent period of time. The Sub-Committee is aware that the premises has in effect already been subject to a period of seven days suspension of the licence whilst remedial measures were put in place.

The Sub-Committee was asked during the hearing to express its view with regards the Duty Manager who is no longer employed at the premises. The Sub-Committee advises the Premises Licence Holder, in light of the evidence that has been shown, not to reinstate the Duty Manager at the premises. This decision was made on the basis that it will enable a clean break from those events. Further, the actions displayed were not what the Sub-Committee would condone, nor encourage. It is clear that the premises require strong management and the most strict due diligence measures to cope with particular points of stress. The Sub-Committee has determined to reinstate the hours at the premises as stated on the premises licence.

The Sub-Committee has determined that the Committee report and papers should be made public, however officers shall be given sufficient time as necessary to redact the report as may be required. In addition the police shall be consulted before publication and in the event of any objection to any part being made public, that part shall remain confidential.

It should also be noted that the above decision is in relation to the summary review application. The Sub-Committee has at the same time determined the ordinary review application and decided to take no (separate) action with regard to that application (which the parties had agreed should be heard and considered at the same time).

Interim steps imposed previously are revoked and shall not remain in force pending any appeal, save for the terms of this decision.

There is a right of appeal for any party at this stage to the Magistrates' Court. All parties will receive written notification of the decision with reasons which will set out the right of appeal.

If any party has any representation to make in relation to the conditions that have been imposed that should be raised now and the Sub-Committee will reconsider the wording if appropriate.

45. **APPLICATION FOR A VARIATION OF A PREMISES LICENCE - MARTIN MCCOLLS, 71 BEDFORD PLACE, SOUTHAMPTON SO15 2DS**

The Sub-Committee considered an application for variation of a premises licence in respect of McColls, 71 Bedford Place, Southampton SO15 2DS.

Professor Roy Light (Barrister), Simon Elliott (DPS / Branch Manager - McColls), Neil Graydon (Area Manager - McColls), Lorraine Barter and Mrs Barratt (Local Residents) were present and with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED that the variation for a premises licence be granted as amended in agreement with the Police and subject to conditions.

After private deliberation the Sub-Committee reconvened and the Chair read the following decision:-

All parties will receive formal written confirmation of the decision and reasons.

The Sub-Committee has considered very carefully the application for a variation of a premises licence at Martin McColls, 71 Bedford Place, Southampton SO15 2DS. It has given due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance and the adopted statement of Licensing Policy. Human Rights legislation was borne in mind whilst making the decision.

The Sub-Committee noted that the premises are located within an area identified as suffering from high levels of crime and disorder and labelled as a Cumulative Impact Stress Area. The Sub-Committee considered the Cumulative Impact Policy and particularly paragraph 16.7 and whether the application was a “substantial” variation. Having very carefully considered the nature of this particular application and the fact that the application, if granted, would result in less licensable activity taking place overall, the Sub-Committee has determined that the application is not a substantial variation and accordingly that the rebuttable presumption does not apply.

The Sub-Committee considered representations, both written and given orally today. It was noted that as a result of correspondence sent by the applicant, two representations had been withdrawn.

In light of the above the Sub-Committee has determined to approve the application as amended in agreement with the police (in relation to hours amendment to the CCTV condition regarding the memory stick etc. and the sale of single cans condition) and subject to conditions as set out in the report – namely, refusals book, Challenge 25, training, CCTV and location of spirits.

Reasons

The Sub-Committee noted very carefully the residential objections and the concerns raised in relation to crime and disorder experienced in the area. Indeed, the evidence shown is the very reason behind the specific policy adopted. However, it could not be ignored that the application would result in one less premises and an overall reduction in the hours during which the sale of alcohol is permitted. Accordingly, it would appear perverse to refuse the application or impose further restrictions on the basis of the evidence of residents in the area. It is suspected that this accounts for two of the residential objections having been withdrawn.

It is noted that the applicant had worked with the police and had presented a comprehensive set of very detailed conditions to be attached to the licence. Further, it was noted that there had been no representations from any of the responsible authorities as a result.

In all the circumstances the Sub-Committee has determined that the appropriate and proportionate action in this application is to grant the licence.

There is a right of appeal for all parties to the Magistrates' Court. Formal notification of the decision will set out that right in full.

46. **ELECTION OF CHAIR**

RESOLVED that Councillor Tucker be elected as Chair for the purposes of this meeting.

48. **EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC**

RESOLVED that in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 that the parties to the hearing, press and public be excluded at a predetermined point whilst the Sub-Committee reaches its decision.

49. **APPLICATION FOR REVIEW OF PREMISES LICENCE - JUNK CLUB, 55 LONDON ROAD, SOUTHAMPTON SO15 5QZ**

The Sub-Committee considered the application for Review of a Premises Licence in respect of Junk Club, 55 London Road, Southampton SO15 5QZ.

Peter Savill (Barrister), Paul Merry (Consultant to Junk Club), Lorraine Barter, Denis Bundy (Local Residents), PC Boucouvalas (Hampshire Constabulary) and Phil Bates (Licensing Manager - SCC) were present and with the consent of the Chair, addressed the meeting.

The Sub-Committee considered the decision in confidential session in accordance with the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

RESOLVED that the premises licence be amended to include conditions agreed between the police and the premises licence holder in advance of the hearing, to reduce the opening hours and impose an additional condition regarding last entry time.

After private deliberation the Sub-Committee reconvened and the Chair read out the following decision:-

All parties will receive formal written confirmation of the decision and reasons.

The Sub-Committee has considered very carefully the application for review of the premises licence at Junk Club, 55 London Road, Southampton SO15 5QZ by the Licensing Authority and five residential representations. It has given due regard to the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Objectives, statutory guidance and the adopted statement of Licensing Policy. Human Rights Legislation has been borne in mind whilst making this decision.

All the evidence presented both written and given orally today, has been carefully considered and taken into account including additional evidence submitted by the police at the hearing and with the consent of all the parties. The Sub-Committee particularly addressed itself to the licensing objectives for the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the prevention of public nuisance.

Having considered all of the above, and all the options under s52, sub section 4, the Sub-Committee has decided to attach the conditions agreed between the police and the premises licence holder in advance of the hearing and reduce the opening hours at the premises to those recommended by the police including an additional condition limiting last entry or re-entry at the premises to 0030 hours every day of the week, excepting for those going outside the premises to smoke.

Reasons

The Sub-Committee considered very carefully all the evidence and held very grave concerns in relation to the nature of the most recent incidents at the premises and in particular the violent assault involving those previously on the premises on the 22 January 2016. In addition the Sub-Committee noted the catalogue of incidents relating to general crime and disorder and nuisance at the premises from November 2014 as presented in police evidence. It was noted that the premises is located within an area designated as suffering from disproportionate levels of crime and disorder and identified in the Council's policy as an area suffering from the saturation of premises. Much of the residents' evidence goes to highlighting the nature of issues faced by this identified area and therefore the reasoning behind the adoption of the policy that is in place. However, the Sub-Committee focussed its mind on the evidence clearly linked to the premises rather than the generality of the area.

The Sub-Committee heard from the premises that the incident of most serious concern was a one-off, that management had in excess of ten years of experience and that, historically, the premises could show good levels of compliance in relation to accreditation schemes and examples of best practice. It was noted that the premises could be seen to be working with the police and had agreed to implement extensive measures by way of condition attached to the Premises Licence. On this basis the Sub-Committee was, despite its very grave concerns, persuaded that revocation of the Premises Licence would not be appropriate in this particular instance.

It is noted that the premises now has very many conditions regulating its operation and the point raised by the Licensing Authority that there is a tipping point at which it must be considered whether a premises should in fact be operating at all if such strong and so many conditions are required. The Sub-Committee's initial inclination was to revoke the Premises Licence but considerable weight was placed upon the police evidence that revocation was no longer appropriate if the agreed conditions were imposed and the hours reduced. The Sub-Committee took note of paragraph 2.1 of the statutory guidance.

The premises licence holder argued during the hearing that the earlier closure of the premises, at a time that police evidence shows a spike in incidents, would further add to the disproportionate levels of crime and disorder on the basis that more premises would be closing at the same time. This was put to the police and their expert opinion was that it would not cause such an effect – the impact being more widespread and upon a

number of premises. It was stressed that the premises has a considerable attraction “draw” due to its later terminal hour – the implications of an earlier terminal hour would be that clientele would likely be more evenly spread across venues. The police had considered the financial impact of an (even) earlier closing time but felt the hours proposed were an appropriate compromise.

The earlier closing hour combined with the entry / re-entry condition also goes some way to alleviating the concerns of residents relating to late night noise nuisance in the immediate vicinity of the premises – particularly from, but not limited to, queuing at the premises. It is noted that additional staff would be employed to scan and check but the Sub-Committee remains of the view that queuing would otherwise have had the potential to continue to cause nuisance along with the later operation of the premises.

The Sub-Committee has, following legal advice given during the hearing, very carefully considered the financial impact of its decision. Not least due to the premises indicating that earlier closure times might have a dramatic and drastic impact on the viability of the business. However, having considered the evidence of residents, and in particular those living close by, coupled with police evidence it is determined that the issues of general crime and disorder and the impact of such a late terminal hour in this most sensitive location outweigh the financial implications. The wording of the statutory guidance was taken into account, particularly but not exclusively, paragraph 11.23.

In light of all of the above the Sub-Committee decided that revocation would not be appropriate and that the reduced terminal hour along with entry / re-entry condition was the appropriate and proportionate measure to specifically address the various concerns.

The Sub-Committee must reiterate how close it has come to revoking the premises licence on this occasion and must clearly stress that any further issues will place the premises licence in extreme jeopardy in the event of further review.

There is a right of appeal for all parties to the Magistrates’ Court. Formal notification of the decision will set out that right in full.

The Sub-Committee confirmed by way of clarification the hours as amended are as follows:

- Premises shall close at 0200 hours
- Licensable activities shall cease at 0130 hours
- Last entry/re-entry at 0030 hours

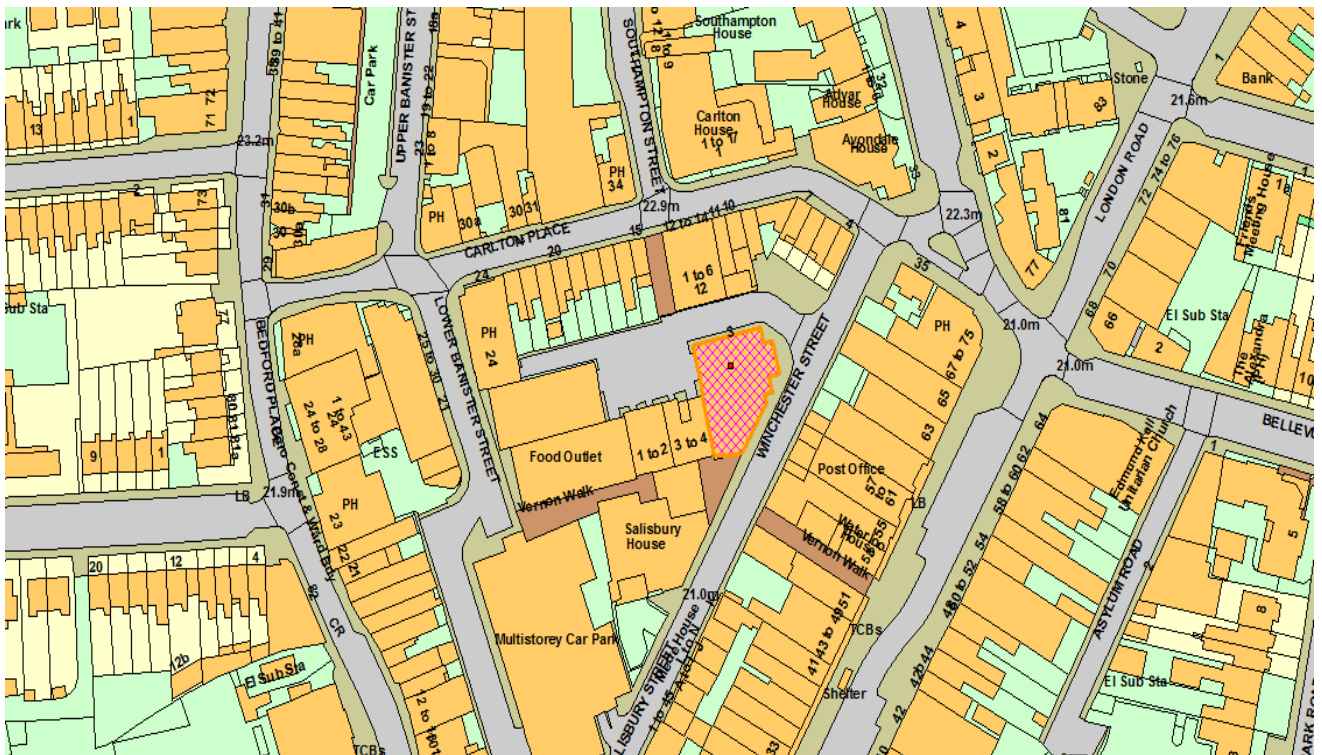

Legal Implications

1. The legislation specifically restricts the grounds on which the sub-committee may refuse an application for variation of a premises licence, or impose conditions. The legislation provides for a presumption of grant of an application for variation of a premises licence, subject to the determination of the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. In doing so the sub-committee must give appropriate weight to:
 - the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
 - the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
 - its own statement of licensing policy
 - the Statutory Guidance
2. An application may be refused in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
3. An applicant for variation of a premises licence whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Any other person, who made a valid representation, may appeal to the Magistrates' Court against the decision to grant the application or against any conditions imposed.
4. In considering this application the sub-committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider the application in accordance, in particular, with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (as amended) and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the sub-committee must make its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.
5. The sub-committee must also have regard to:
 - *The Crime and Disorder Act 1998*
Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the sub-committee under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.
 - *The Human Rights Act 1998*
The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the sub-committee to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the sub-committee that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the sub-committee which affects another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matters set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

Conditions attached to current licence at ANNEX 2

2.1 A CCTV system shall be installed and maintained in the licensed premises to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority and Hampshire Constabulary. As a minimum, it shall enable surveillance of both external and internal areas of the premises including entrances and exits. Recordings from the system shall be of quality acceptable as evidence in a court of law and shall be securely retained at the licensed premises for a minimum period of 30 days after recording, and shall be surrendered to Hampshire Constabulary or the Licensing Authority immediately on request.

2.2 No children will be allowed in the premises unless they are accompanied by an adult.

2.3 The roof terrace area will not be open between the hours of 22.00 and 08.00 daily.

2.4 Additionally, the permitted licensable activities may continue on:

Christmas Eve between 10:00 - 02:00; Boxing Day between 10:00 - 02:00;

New Year's Eve between 10:00 - 03:00 and Bank Holiday Sundays from the end of permitted hours until 02:00.

2.5 All activities permitted by this licence shall take place inside the licensed premises

2.6 EMBEDDED CONDITIONS FROM CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS ACT 1933

It is a condition of your licence that you comply with the extant provisions of the Children and Young Persons Act 1933, as amended.

2.7 On any occasion that the connecting door between Prohibition and Buddha Lounge is being utilized for moving customers between the premises, there will be an SIA door supervisor on duty at the door to monitor numbers in both premises.

The provision, maintenance and use of the I.D scan/visitor equipment, or other such equipment previously approved by the Police in writing, to scan all customers identification upon entry to the premises at all times during licensable activities. The only exception will be customers who have had their identification against their fingerprint meaning they can be identified by the use of a biometric fingerprint or a mag stripe reader integrated into the system. Accepted forms of identification will be passport, photo driving licence, Military ID or proof of age standard scheme (pass). The ID scanning system installed should work by scanning the data page of the identification provided (for example the face of a drivers licence or identity card or the bio data page of a passport) which is then connected to a database of legitimate forms of identification. The user is alerted if a match for the scanned ID is not found in the database and is therefore potentially false ID. The system will be capable of calculating the age of the owner of the ID and of verifying that the ID has not expired. The system will also be set up to ID anyone who is banned via Drinks Banning Orders, Local Pub Watch schemes or other similar initiatives with all such bans being added to the system within 7 days.

In all circumstances of a breakdown or fault in the system, the Police must be notified immediately and the fault rectified as soon as reasonably practicable, with the premises licence holder keeping the Police informed and demonstrating all reasonable efforts at all times.

The ID scanning system will be operated from 21:30 hrs



The system will also be set up to ID anyone who is banned through Local Pub Watch schemes or other similar initiatives with all such bans being added to the system within 7 days.

IMPLEMENT:

1) CCTV

The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including outside of the premises covering the entrance and exit. The system will be able to cope with strobe lighting (where used) and all levels of illumination throughout the premises as well as outside areas.

CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.

The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.

The recording system will be able to capture a minimum of 4 frames per second and all recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.

Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.

The DPS or premises manager must be able to demonstrate that the CCTV system has measures to prevent recordings being tampered with, i.e. password protected.

There shall be sufficient members of trained staff at the premises during operating hours to be able to provide viewable copies immediately to police on request when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. Any images recovered must be in a viewable format on a disc. Footage supplied in a digital format on CD or DVD will also have a copy of the CCTV system software enabled on the disc to allow playback.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Hampshire Police Licensing Unit within 24 hours.

2) Incident book

An incident book will be provided and maintained at the premises. It will remain on the premises at all times and will be available to police for inspection upon request.

Any incidents that include physical altercation or disorder, physical ejection, injury, id seizure or drug misuse will be recorded in the incident book. The entry is to include an account of the incident and the identity of all person(s) involved (or descriptions of those involved if identity is not known). Should there be any physical interaction by members of staff and the public the entry will include what physical action occurred between each party. The entry shall be timed, dated and signed by the author.

If the member of staff creating the entry has difficulties reading or writing then the entry may be written by another staff member. This should however be read back to the person creating the entry and counter signed by the person who wrote the entry.

At the close of business on each day the incident book will be checked by the manager on duty where any entries will be reviewed and signed. If incidents have occurred the duty manager will de-brief door staff at the close of business. Should there be no incidents then this will also be recorded at the close of business in the incident book.

3) Refusals Logs

A written log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the premises manager/manageress.

The refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.

The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.

4) Challenge 25

There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.

Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the persons date of birth.

If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.

'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

5) Training

Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.

All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

In addition to their training a written test related to the training given will be conducted before the staff member is permitted to sell or authorise alcohol. The test will consist of a minimum of ten questions of which the pass rate is 80%. Anyone who fails to reach the prescribed pass rate will be retrained and re-tested. Anyone not attaining the pass rate will not be permitted to sell or authorise the sale of alcohol until the pass rate is attained. There will be a minimum of two sets of questions to be used in the training which will be rotated upon each subsequent six month training session.

All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept for a minimum period of two years. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

6) Toilet Checks

The public toilets within the premises shall be checked every 30 minutes when the premises are open for licensable activities. A record shall be kept by the premise and presented on request by Hampshire constabulary. Toilet check records shall be kept for a minimum period of 3 months.

7) Authorisation of supply of alcohol in absence of DPS

A record will be kept at the premise of any persons that the DPS has authorised to supply alcohol. Further to this when the DPS is absent from the premises a list will be made available stating who will be managing the venue.

8) Door Supervisors

On every Friday, Saturday, any Sunday preceding public holidays and New Years Eve, there shall be SIA registered door staff on duty from 22:00 hours to closing and until any dispersal policy operation is completed. They shall be employed at a ratio of 2 for the first 100 customers and one additional SIA registered door staff for every 100 customers thereafter.

On all other occasions when the premises are open for licensable activities there shall be a risk assessment conducted as to whether it is necessary to employ SIA door.

9) Drinks Outside

No open vessels of alcohol are permitted to leave the licensed area at any time.

10) Neighbouring Premises

There shall be no internal access between any neighbouring premises whether licensed or otherwise, at anytime.

11) Capacity of Customers on the Premises

The capacity of the premises shall not exceed 400 patrons at any one time.

12) Windows

The existing bi-fold windows on the ground floor of the premises shall remain closed & shut between 2200 hours and closing time.

13) Pub watch

The premises licence holder or his nominated representative will maintain membership of any existing Pub watch scheme, or join any future scheme, which is not currently in existence. He/she will ensure co-operation with the relevant scheme, abide by any rules and ensure meetings are regularly attended.

14) Polycarbonates

From 22:30 hours, all new sales of drinks shall be served into polycarbonate vessels. From this point, the premises shall commence a phased return of all glass products and vessels.

From 23:00 hours, all receptacles used for drinking at the premises will be polycarbonate and the contents of all glass bottles will be decanted into polycarbonate vessels with the exception of wine,

spirits and champagne bottles consumed in the VIP seated area within the premises and these should remain there at all times.

15) Club Nanny/Floorwalker

A member of staff will be employed at the premises during operating hours with the purpose of patrolling the venue and monitoring customers. They will check for the signs/symptoms of excess alcohol consumption, and general vulnerability of customers. They will take any appropriate action to reduce vulnerability and promote personal safety. Anyone suspected of consuming excess amounts of alcohol will be cared for.

A record the club nanny/welfare officer's action be maintained providing details of any persons attended to, date, and time along with the members of staff involved and will be made available to the Police for inspection upon request.

16) Dispersal Policy

The premises shall maintain a written dispersal policy. The policy shall be a workable document subject to variation following advice from the Police and Local Authority or agreed operational changes. A copy of the current policy should be provided to the Police and Local Authority and kept on the premises for inspection by authorised officers.

Hello Licensing,

I am writing regarding this application for a major variation to the premises licence for the above premises.

This is an unusual application combined with a minor variation to 3-4 Vernon Walk.

Hampshire Constabulary supports the cumulative impact policy Southampton City Council has in place and considers applications within the special policy zones very carefully.

There have been long standing planning enforcement issues with the premises involved which Hampshire Constabulary understands have recently been resolved with Southampton City Council planning authority.

We understand that essentially the planning restrictions between 3-4 Vernon Walk and Unit 3 Winchester Street have been 'swapped' and tightened to ensure the applicants are fully understand and are compliant with these.

Hampshire Constabulary considers it in the public interest to ensure the premises licences for these addresses are also in-line with the decision by the planning authority and agree with the applicants that the premises licences should reflect this.

We have carefully considered the application and believe that essentially as this is almost an application for a licence 'swap' between premises, there does not appear to be any additional negative cumulative impact within the area of this application and as such The Constabulary is not making a representation based on the cumulative impact policy in place.

This is however subject to the document attached to the application titled '*Buddha Lounge (3 WINCHESTER STREET)*' being implemented into a newly issued licence. This document contains a number of licence conditions proposed by Hampshire Constabulary and the applicant.

I would like to remind the applicant that Hampshire Constabulary expects the applicant to maintain promotion of the licensing objectives and the highest of standards. This is particularly important with the applicant's operation within the special policy zone.

We do not consider a hearing is necessary for this application on our behalf, however should a hearing be necessary, I will endeavour to attend to provide explanation if necessary.

Dear Sirs

I am writing to you both on my own behalf and that of the 4 other tenants of Conroy Court, 65A London Road, Southampton, SO15 2AB as the appointed Manager of Conroy Court Residents Association RTM concerning the application to the variation of the licensing hours for Buddha Lounge as detailed on the notice outside the premises. As you can see from the attached photographs, the rear entrance 65A London Road is only a very short distance from the centre of Buddha Lounge and the flats above Starbucks and Rymans are even closer. You can clearly see our folding garage doors and Flat 1 immediately above it plus Flats 3 and 5 above Flat 1 who both have bedrooms at the rear. Flats 4 and Flat 2 are at the front of the building but with our bedrooms at the rear both these are both also greatly affected by noise and by the traffic directly caused by the clubs who already have extended licensing hours in close proximity to Buddha – extended licensing hours for Buddha Lounge can only increase this problem. We all often access and leave the block via the back entrance/exit.

On behalf of all the residents of 65A London Road I object most strongly to the proposed extended licensing and music hours as detailed on the notice currently displayed. This will undoubtedly create much increased noise, foot and motor traffic in an already congested Winchester Street and directly behind our premises especially in the early hours of the morning. In view of the obvious lack of proper door and internal supervision and the obvious fact that many of the much increased traffic will be under the influence of alcohol and often drugs, quite often to the extreme, it is quite clear us that disorder and even crime will be the inevitable result. There is again an obvious much increased risk to public safety as I have witnessed myself when arriving in the early hours after working late in my job as an entertainer. We have to tolerate kicking of the folding metal garage doors and the bin store late into the early hours plus graffiti that I have to constantly attempt to remove. Buddha even boast that they have long queues waiting to get in on their website!

The extended hours of premises fronting Winchester Road will also undoubtedly increase the already high level of public nuisance and how on earth will anyone properly police the crowds of young people exiting the Lounge when they clearly can't properly cope with door or internal management?.

The level of noise created by (A) The live and recorded music and (B) The noise made by people as they arrive and especially when they leave Buddha is already extreme and has been reported by me in the past. This is especially the case for Flats 1, 3 and 5 and also for 2 and 4 and this can only increase with these proposed changes allowing this to carry on until 3am.

I feel it is also very important to point out that two schoolchildren live with their parents in Flat 1 and an infant in Flat 5.

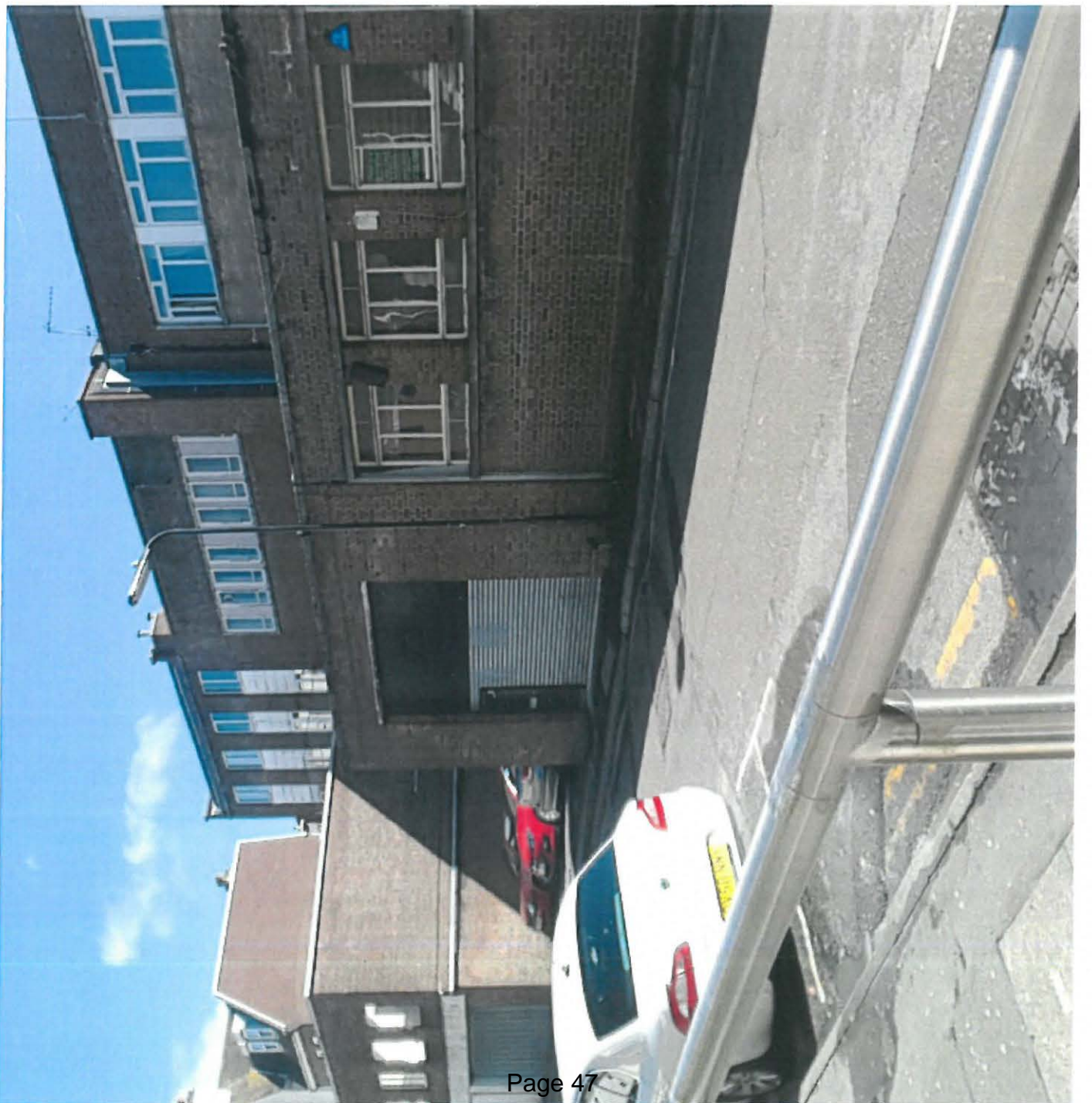

Objection to 03.00 closing Friday and Saturday at Buddha Lounge Unit 3 Winchester Street.

The large corner site extra hours with a very "studentish" patron base would cause sleep deprivation and distress to those living in the flats only about 50 metres distance. As Planning rules encourage more residential units above high street shops this problem will be increasing due to slack policies that do little or nothing to protect citizens from sleep deprivation, stress and violent crime.

It is not music sound ,that can be controlled, but people exiting shouting and screaming.

Important to note that in nearby Carlton Place the small Cricketers pub was refused 03.00 hours and it was stated (I was told) at that hearing Carlton Place at night was described as the most dangerous in all Southampton.

It would be contrary to the prevention of crime and disorder, public nuisance to grant 03.00, have a devastating impact on public safety , the area is just not safe at night. Either for people coming out of Buddha Lounge or those passing by.

The three year diary produced below the next paragraph show the suffering of local citizen and much of it is night time incidents.

I may write more later and add some photographs

It is my opinion that any later hours would be contrary to Licensing Objectives Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Nuisance and compromise Public Safety.

Having suffered the consequences of the night time economy use since the early 1990s, the drunken behaviour and criminal damage, noise nuisance etc I state that the extra hours of trading at Buddha could cause patrons to become very drunk, more so than at places that close earlier, unable to control their behaviour or bladders, for instance on Sunday 13th morning there were puddles of urine in Henstead Road, Carlton Place and Vernon Walk and more last week and this week in Harborough, Kenilworth, Henstead Roads and Devonshire Roads..

There are no huge dogs puddling in the area and it is not petrol, diesel, sump oil or spilled drinks, the smell is of urine.

It is my strong opinion that the extra hours to 03.00 Friday and Saturday would be contrary to the Licensing Objectives, Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Nuisance and impact on Public Safety (the area is not safe) as shown in press articles and local reports.. The extra time at the BUDDHA Lounge could cause patrons to become very drunk, more so than at places that close earlier, unable to control their behaviour or bladders, for instance on Sunday morning 13th there were puddles of urine in Henstead Road, Carlton Place and Vernon Walk and more to-day in Harborough, Kenilworth, Henstead Roads and Vernon Walk. This has been seen again during the past week. There no huge dogs puddling in the area and it is not petrol, diesel, sump oil or spilled drinks, the smell is of urine.

The fact is and it cannot be argued, this corner site is too close to residential flats to be suitable for this later exit time.

It is only about 50 metres from the flats in London Road, above Post Office, Starbucks and Bookmakers ?

It is not so much about music, that sound can be controlled but patrons , very "studentish" could be coming out shouting and screaming at 03.00.

Then no time to get back to sleep before JUNK turn out a couple of hours later.

Bear in mind that similar hours as requested by Buddha were refused at a small public house, The Cricketers, in Carlton Place and this road has been described at night as the most dangerous in Southampton by someone at the Licensing hearing.

I present a diary of suffering over the past three years, showing the night time dangers in this crime ridden area ,although some of the nuisance is at houses, often it occurs because the noise makers are drunk, as they explain that some of them have just got back from clubbing and are too drunk to know what they are doing.

The location of the Buddha Lounge ,so close to residential flats make it unsuitable for the present use and as more buildings are converted into homes in London Road that factor will be accentuated.

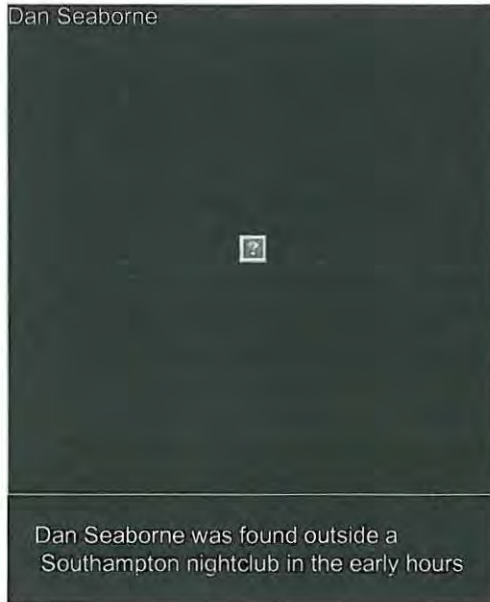

- Students are being warned after a series of sex attacks on young women walking alone in Southampton.

In 12 cases similar descriptions have been given of the attacker and detectives are keeping an open mind over whether some of them are linked.

The latest victim, 20, was sexually assaulted. Days earlier, three other women were attacked in nine-hours.

Southampton University is encouraging female students to join a scheme which provides taxis paid for on account.

The most recent attack took place in St Denys Road on 8 March.

The victim was grabbed from behind and pushed to the ground by a man in an alleyway.

He threatened her saying he had a knife, then sexually assaulted her before fleeing as he heard voices approaching.

'Severely traumatised'

The victim described her attacker as 5ft 8in but said his face was covered. He spoke with, what is described as a foreign accent and was wearing a leather or hard material black jacket.

Det Sgt Tom Orchard said: "This is a distressing offence for anyone to endure and has, understandably, left this woman severely traumatised.

"We would also like to remind anyone walking alone, especially at night, to be constantly aware of their surroundings and to contact us immediately to report anything or anyone they consider to be suspicious."

Three lone women were indecently assaulted as they walked in the city between 22:00 GMT on 28 February and 07:00 on 29 February.

The assaults occurred in Banister Road, Governor Road, and in the city centre close to the Matalan store.

All three victims gave similar descriptions.

The woman who was assaulted in Banister Road believes her attacker held a knife against her.

'Personal safety'

A number of attacks occurred between late Tuesday evening and early Wednesday morning, which is one of the city's most popular student nights, but police have not confirmed the same person is responsible.

Speaking after the attack on 8 March, Det Sgt Tom Orchard added: "We are keeping an open mind about this assault and are unable to say whether it is linked to other recent incidents of indecent assault against women in Southampton."

A University of Southampton spokesman said all issues regarding student safety are treated with "utmost importance" so students are being reminded of appropriate measures to ensure their safety.

"In light of recent incidents which have occurred within the city, we have taken proactive steps to remind students about personal safety issues through a variety of means," he said.

A Southampton Rape Crisis spokeswoman said: "We understand that when there are reports of this nature within our local community it can cause increased anxiety.

"We would want to encourage people to give thought, as much as they can, to how they might take care of themselves and each other.

"For example, when planning nights out, having arrangements for how to get home, sticking with a trusted group of friends and keeping alcohol intake low can help keep people safer."

A 21-year-old victim was forced to the floor by a man in Vernon Walk, an alleyway next to the Orange Rooms bar, at 00:45 BST on 21 September.

The victim was sexually assaulted but she managed to fight free by punching and kicking the man, who then ran off.

A 19-year-old was indecently assaulted by a man in Carlton Crescent at 02:15 BST on 28 September.

It is believed she had been followed for some distance by the man beforehand, police said.

Screamed out

Both victims were attacked in an area of the city that is popular with students on Tuesday nights. Officers want to trace a group of young men and women who were standing by a white car in Carlton Crescent on 21 September and spoke to the first victim while she was being followed by the attacker.

The victim in the second incident told police two men came to her aid when she screamed out during the attack in Carlton Crescent.

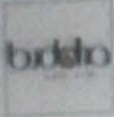
Hampshire Constabulary is appealing for all of these witnesses to come forward, along with anyone else who may have information about the attacks.

OPENING hours at a restaurant and nightclub in central Southampton could be changed. The owners of the Buddha Lounge and Buddha Club in Winchester Street and Vernon Walk have asked to alter the hours both venues are open.

They want to restrict the opening hours of Buddha Club to midnight, while extending the hours at Buddha Lounge to 2am Monday to Thursday and 3am Friday, Saturday and bank holidays.

They say it is because Buddha Lounge is a "more viable business venture for the applicant" and "would in turn reduce the management issues of patrons when leaving the Buddha Lounge at midnight to use the Buddha Club". OPENING hours at a restaurant and nightclub in central Southampton could be changed.

Five residents have made representations to the city council about the plans, saying they could lead to an increase in anti-social behaviour and alcohol-related crime. City council's planning and rights of way panel have recommended the plans be approved at a meeting tomorrow.

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Police are investigating a 'savage assault' at Orange Rooms Nightclub on Saturday night. Two men, aged 23 and 24 were attacked at approximately 1am in an unprovoked assault while dancing with a group of friends. Both victims were taken taken to Southampton General Hospital, after 23-year-old suffered a fractured nose, and the 24-year-old sustained damage to his teeth and a black eye.



It is believed the offender immediately left the night club. He is described as a white man, around 5ft 10ins in his mid-late 20s. The offender was wearing a red tartan t-shirt. He has an athletic build with short dark hair. At the time of the assault the offender was with a woman who is described a white, of slim build and with short blonde bob. She was wearing a white

top at the time of the attack.

Speaking to the Daily Echo, Police Staff Investigator Katherine Pullen, said:

This has been described as a savage and unprovoked attack which left the two victims with injuries that will require further medical treatment. I am appealing for anyone with any information which may help lead to the identification of the offender."

Detectives are continuing to question four men after an incident outside a nightclub in Southampton earlier today (January 22).

Police were called at 3.55am to reports of a fight outside the Junk nightclub in London Road. Two men suffered stab wounds and a third man sustained a head injury.

The three injured men are aged 26, 32 and 34, and were admitted to Southampton General Hospital and their injuries are not believed to be life threatening.

Four men, aged between 19 and 21 and from the London area, have been arrested on suspicion of grievous bodily harm and affray. They remain in custody at the current time.

Police served a 24 hour closure notice on Junk this afternoon as enquiries are ongoing.

Detective Inspector John McGonigle said: "We'd like to reassure the community that we're treating this as an isolated incident and are conducting a thorough investigation.

"There will be increased patrols in the area throughout the weekend to provide reassurance and a visible policing presence.

"We're still investigating the circumstances around this incident; if anyone has any information that they think may help us then they should call 101 and quote Operation Twin."

A MAN who attacked a complete stranger, smashing his jaw and causing him "serious" psychological harm, has been spared an immediate jail sentence.

Mark McMullan and former Hampshire Sunday League footballer Craig Lyons were walking near Bedford Place in Southampton following a night out when they brushed shoulders with two other men.

Southampton Crown Court heard that McMullan punched Paul Adams and Lyons assaulted Gareth Jones, leaving both victims lying injured on the ground.

Referring to a victim impact statement Mr Adams made a month after the incident in July last year Kerry Mears, prosecuting, said he had not returned to Southampton "in case of repercussions" and constantly felt unsafe when out in public.

McMullan, 30, of Deeping Close, Southampton, admitted grievous bodily harm.

Khalid Missouri, in mitigation, said his client threw a single punch when his judgement was impaired by alcohol, and was full of remorse.

Recorder James Townsend said Mr Adams suffered a fractured jaw as well as serious psychological harm.

McMullan was given a 12-month jail term, suspended for two years, has. He was told to pay his victim £200 compensation and complete 150 hours of unpaid work.

Lyons, 30, of Heathfield Road, Southampton, also admitted grievous bodily harm. His case was adjourned until February 11 following a family bereavement.

I cannot see how this can be passed after the Panel refusing 03.00 closing at The Cricketers Pub in Carlton Place, that is a much smaller venue with no or little space for dancing, I seem to remember that one of the reasons for refusal was proven crime and anti-social behaviour in the area but please correct me and quote the exact reasons if I am incorrect on this matter.

However I do remember Carlton Place being described at the hearing as "the most dangerous street in Southampton at night ". I have seen blood on the ground and many urine stains in that road.

I cannot understand where in Licensing law one can swop hours between two venues and guarantee a granted licence- for instance if a nearby night club closed down would the next door premises be able to "grab" their licence via the Panel and claim no Cumulative Impact ?

Actually there is Cumulative Impact as the extra time gives rise to the potential for more disorder that has been proven already in the area.

A grant would be contrary to the Council's Health and Well Being Strategy, I was able to speak at a meeting recently and asked " what is the use of lecturing/advising people on diet and exercise if they are damaging their livers and kidneys with long term alcohol abuse/self abuse ? "

I have dredged up more press cuttings of local violence and shall attach some photos of night time ASB, I see this in mornings and it does not increase in the day , there are hardly any school children living in the area to wrongly blame for such damage.

Talking tough on alcohol-related crime and disorder though has always been popular with politicians; the crime strategy's alcohol section reminds us half of all violent crime is alcohol-related, and tells us 'the harms associated with alcohol remain too high'. Users of the night time economy should be able to do so 'without the fear of becoming a victim of crime'. Whilst a clear emphasis on partnership approaches is set out, 'personal responsibility is just as important'; the strategy says 'Individuals must shoulder their share of responsibility when it comes to decisions they take about drinking to excess, committing acts of violence or disorder, and not challenging the unacceptable behaviour of others.'

More of the same?

The crime strategy sets out three areas for addressing alcohol harms:

- Improving local intelligence
- Effective local partnerships
- Equipping the police and local authorities with the right powers

Nothing not previously seen on the pages of alcohol strategies, but always room for improvement? To **improve local intelligence**, it says the Government will publish information about where alcohol-related crime and disorder is occurring on police.uk. Local partnerships though may already feel they are making the best use of available data. Local analyst capacity may be more of an issue, whilst alcohol-related crime has been inconsistently 'flagged' on police databases.

NHS trusts will also be 'expected' to share more data about alcohol-related violence to support licensing decisions, though of course cannot do so with the intention that data will be considered on public health grounds. Licensing authorities will be 'encouraged' to share information about problem premises and individuals. Mention of helping local authorities to have the 'right analytical tools and capability' is also made, but without identifying the mechanism.

On '**effective local partnerships**', the strategy states that 'police, local authority and health partners must work alongside local businesses to devise local solutions and strategies'. Another round of (LAAAs) Local Alcohol Action Areas will be launched, but worth noting the previous round came with no additional

resources other than input from central departments. Areas will be able to bid to take part in round two later this year.

Working with industry partners to support local business action is also identified, with more examples of aims or initiatives to 'support', 'improve' or 'build on'. Diversifying the night time economy, Challenge 25, Best Bar None are cited - approaches that readers will be familiar with, though arguably lacking any robust evaluation. Influencing 'positive behaviour change' and pursuing a life-course approach to prevention are also touched on, but without specifics.

In response to the strategy the Portman Group issued a press release and a new infographic video promoting local alcohol partnership schemes.

On '**equipping local authorities and the police with the right powers**', the Government says it will ensure police and local authorities can operate within a licensing framework that allows them to take the 'right action'. It identifies changes to the Late Night Levy to make it 'more flexible', putting Cumulative Impact Policies (CIPs) on a statutory footing, and giving civilian staff powers to inspect premises on behalf of police. Additionally, consultation on a new 'group review intervention power' (GRIP) will take place to potentially allow licensing conditions on a group of premises within an identified problem area.

In announcing the new strategy, the Home Secretary Theresa May said it would 'build on the previous reforms to the licensing act', touted in 2010 as "rebalancing" back in favour of communities, but the figures suggest it may be hard to argue any actual re-balancing has since taken place. However CIPs - often described as 'saturation zones' - do appear to have been fairly widely used, so changes to these and the levy may be welcomed by licensing authorities. Trade bodies though have not welcomed this part of the strategy. No mention of the use of a health objective in relation to CIPs proposed for consultation in the 2012 strategy.

Health and treatment?

PHE will still support health and prevention related activity and have previously said they would continue to call for

an MUP but a lack of a top level national strategy may well raise questions over the level of genuine commitment to address alcohol harms at Government level. Health groups may argue policy is veering further from the approach set out in Health First, an independent 'evidence based' strategy set out in 2013. Indeed England fared least well in the recent Four Nations review of UK alcohol policies. Alcohol actions within the crime strategy are unlikely to alter the current public health view of the Government's approach to alcohol harms.

THEY are the worst places for antisocial behaviour in the city and today the *Daily Echo* can reveal where they are.

Yobs throwing stones at cars, drunks shouting abuse in the street and revellers making noise late into the night are common.

People living across the city are forced to endure a living nightmare in their own neighbourhood by those determined to make life hell for others.

Now the top hotspots in the city have been exposed as police join council chiefs and other organisations to crack down on anti-social behaviour. Many of the roads are where revellers drink to excess on binge-fuelled nights such as the areas around London Road and Above Bar.

In the city centre businesses are losing law-abiding customers because of the nuisance behaviour. However some places are popular for the homeless or those intoxicated from drink and drugs.

Southampton's Chief Inspector Debbie Masson vowed the force would continue to ensure residents feel safer in their city.

Compiled with data recorded by Hampshire police, a report for Southampton City Council shows that the number of incidents for the last year stands at 1,036.

While this is a drop by more than 30 per cent compared to the previous year, the report found that two-thirds of Southampton residents still felt unsafe in the city at night.

The report, known as the Draft Summary of the Crime and Disorder Strategic Assessment 2013/14, said that many people felt anti-social behaviour was on the increase, despite the drop in incidents. It added that most people feel safe in their neighbourhood during the day but that this changes significantly once darkness falls.

Caronwen Henderson is a Southampton City Council officer tasked with the Safe City and Youth Justice Strategies department who authored the report.

She said: "Two thirds of young people felt safe in Southampton. Those that felt unsafe stated fear of bullying, attacks, drunk people on the street made them feel unsafe." UNQUOTE
