#### **Terms of Reference**

The Sub-Committee deals with licences for which the Council is responsible under the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005, including:-

- Determination of applications for review of premises licences and club premises certificates;
- Determination of representations to applications for premises licences and club premises certificates, variations and various permits;
- Determination of police objections to applications for:
  - Variation of designated premises supervisors
  - Transfer of premises licences
  - Personal licences for the sale of alcohol
- Determination of objections to temporary event notices.

## **Relevant Representations**

Those who have made relevant representations may address the meeting about the matter in which they have an interest. New matters, not raised within a written representation, can not be relied upon at the hearing. When dealing with Licensing Act matters the Sub-Committee must only take into account the following statutory Licensing Objectives:-

- prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

Likewise, when dealing with Gambling Act matters the Sub Committee must only take into account the statutory Licensing Objectives below:-

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way, and
- Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling

## **DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS**

A Member must regard himself or herself as having a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in any matter that they or their spouse, partner, a person they are living with as husband or wife, or a person with whom they are living as if they were a civil partner in relation to:

- (i) Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
- (ii) Sponsorship:

Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from Southampton City Council) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expense incurred by you in carrying out duties as a member, or towards your election expenses. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992.

- (iii) Any contract which is made between you / your spouse etc (or a body in which the you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest) and Southampton City Council under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed, and which has not been fully discharged.
- (iv) Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of Southampton.
- (v) Any license (held alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of Southampton for a month or longer.
- (vi) Any tenancy where (to your knowledge) the landlord is Southampton City Council and the tenant is a body in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interests.
- (vii) Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where that body (to your knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of Southampton, and either:
  - a) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body, or
  - b) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which you / your spouse etc has a beneficial interest that exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

### Other Interests

A Member must regard himself or herself as having an 'Other Interest' in any membership of, or occupation of a position of general control or management in:

Any body to which they have been appointed or nominated by Southampton City Council Any public authority or body exercising functions of a public nature

Any body directed to charitable purposes

Any body whose principal purpose includes the influence of public opinion or policy

## **Principles of Decision Making**

All decisions of the Council will be made in accordance with the following principles:-

- proportionality (i.e. the action must be proportionate to the desired outcome);
- due consultation and the taking of professional advice from officers;
- respect for human rights;
- a presumption in favour of openness, accountability and transparency;
- setting out what options have been considered;
- · setting out reasons for the decision; and
- clarity of aims and desired outcomes.

In exercising discretion, the decision maker must:

- understand the law that regulates the decision making power and gives effect to it.
   The decision-maker must direct itself properly in law;
- take into account all relevant matters (those matters which the law requires the authority as a matter of legal obligation to take into account);
- leave out of account irrelevant considerations;
- act for a proper purpose, exercising its powers for the public good;
- not reach a decision which no authority acting reasonably could reach, (also known as the "rationality" or "taking leave of your senses" principle);
- comply with the rule that local government finance is to be conducted on an annual basis. Save to the extent authorised by Parliament, 'live now, pay later' and forward funding are unlawful; and
- act with procedural propriety in accordance with the rules of fairness.

## Legal Implications

- 1. The legislation specifically restricts the grounds on which the sub-committee may refuse an application for variation of a premises licence, or impose conditions. The legislation provides for a presumption of grant of an application for variation of a premises licence, subject to the determination of the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. In doing so the sub-committee must give appropriate weight to:
  - the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
  - the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
  - its own statement of licensing policy
  - the Statutory Guidance
- 2. An application may be refused in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
- 3. An applicant for variation of a premises licence whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Any other person, who made a valid representation, may appeal to the Magistrates' Court against the decision to grant the application or against any conditions imposed.
- 4. In considering this application the sub-committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider the application in accordance, in particular, with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (as amended) and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the sub-committee must makes its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.
- 5. The sub-committee must also have regard to:
  - The Crime and Disorder Act 1998
     Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the sub-committee under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.
  - The Human Rights Act 1998
    The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the sub-committee to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the sub-committee that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of proportionality the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the sub-committee which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matters set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

The premises is a large supermarket store selling a range of groceries, household products and alcohol.

## **History**

The applicant first applied for a new premises licence on 27<sup>th</sup> October 2011. The application went to hearing on the 15<sup>th</sup> December 2011 and the application was amended to reduce the hours for the sale of alcohol to between the hours of 08:00 to 23:00 and to withdraw the application for late night refreshment.

On 17<sup>th</sup> October 2012 a variation application was received to extend the sale by retail of alcohol (consumption off the premises only) to between the hours of 07:00 and 23:00. 7 days a week. This received no representation and was therefore granted on 15<sup>th</sup> November 2012.

## Conditions already attached to the issued licence

## 1. CCTV

- (i) The licence holder will ensure that the premises benefit from a CCTV system that operates at all times when licensable activities are taking place.
- (ii) The system will incorporate a camera covering each of the entrance doors and the main alcohol display area and will be capable of providing an image which is regarded as identification standard. The precise positions of the cameras may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
- (iii) The system will incorporate a recording facility and any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum period of 30 days and will be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the Police for inspection on request.
- (iv) The system must be able to export recorded images to a removable means e.g. CD/DVD and have its own software enabled to allow playback/review.

- (v) A member of staff trained in the use of the CCTV system must be available at the premises at all times that the premises are open to the public.
- (vi) The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of the recording.
- (vii) The CCTV system is to be to the reasonable satisfaction of Hampshire Constabulary.
- 2. The applicant will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff and security. Such staff levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.
- 3. Signage will be displayed at the exit of the premises requesting customers leaving the premises late at night to do so quietly and with consideration so as not to disturb nearby residents.
- 4. The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appear to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce (before being sold alcohol) identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 5. Training
- (i) All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age related sales:
- Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member. This will include due diligence, recognising the signs of drunkenness and refusal of sale due to intoxication.
- Refresher/ reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.
- (ii) Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer on request and will be maintained at the premises for a period of 12 months.
- 6. Incidents

All cashiers, management and security personnel shall be instructed to record in an incident book/register:

- All incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises;
- Details of occasions when the Police are called to the premises.

This book/register will be available for inspection by a police officer on request.

7. The entire premises may be used for Supply by retail of alcohol

## Variation application received 22<sup>nd</sup> August 2017

The applicant wishes to extend the sale by retail of alcohol (consumption off the premises only) to between the hours of 06:00 and 24:00. 7 days a week.

## Amendment to variation application.

On the 19<sup>th</sup> September 2017 we received the following amendment to the variation application as follows:

- 1. The hours for the sale of alcohol to remain as existing i.e. 0700 to 2300.
- 2. A condition to be added for 'Seasonal periods' means the period 14 days before Christmas, Christmas Day and up to and including the day 7 days after Christmas

Day each year and the period from and including the Monday prior to Good Friday up to and including Sunday following Easter Monday each year.

The hours for the sale of alcohol during the seasonal periods shall be 0600 to 2400.

3. The restriction on the times the licence authorises the sale of alcohol do not apply to the processing of on line sales and the preparation of such orders for delivery. For the avoidance of doubt the said processing and preparation of on line orders may take place at any time.

All objectors were e-mailed the amended instruction and asked if they wish to withdraw their representation. No public representation were withdrawn as of 20th September 2017. However Hampshire Constabulary agreed to the amendments on 20th September 2017.

- Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member. This will include due diligence, recognising the signs of drunkenness and refusal of sale due to intoxication.
- Refresher/ reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.
- (ii) Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer on request and will be maintained at the premises for a period of 12 months.

#### 6. Incidents

All cashiers, management and security personnel shall be instructed to record in an incident book/register:

- All incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises;
- Details of occasions when the Police are called to the premises.



An application has been submitted to vary an existing premises licence by increasing the licensable activities of the supply of alcohol at a large supermarket.

The venues current premises licence allows for the supply of alcohol off the premises from 07:00 - 23:00 daily. This application is requesting to extend this to - 06:00 - 00:00 daily. The current licence also allows for the store to be open 24 hours a day. However, it currently operates (as obtained from the venues website at the time of writing) Monday - Friday 07:00 - 23:00. Saturday 07:00 - 22:00 and Sunday 11:00 - 17:00 with, I assume seasonal variations.

I would strongly suggest that if this application is granted, the store opening hours would be amended to reflect the supply of alcohol timings.

The venue is situated on a main road in a busy part of town. The area, Portswood, has several outlets that have a premises licences that benefit from the licensable activity of the supply alcohol off the premises.

As such, alcohol fuelled crime and disorder and anti-social behaviour is prevalent within the area. The venue in question is not exempt from this. In fact the venue suffers disproportionately more.

Initial research on the police crime recording system (RMS) shows that there have been at least 36 reported thefts at the store within the last 6 months. With at least 50% of these involving the theft of alcohol from the store.

To have the availability of alcohol in a retail unit that already suffers from high levels of theft of alcohol increased, can but only lead to an increase in crime.

The applicant has not offered any changes to the current premises licence in way of conditions or diligence to mitigate any increase in crime. I would suggest that as the licence was recently amended and updated in 2014, there is little that could be offered. I would consider the potential need for SIA security to be conditioned upon the licence to act as a visible deterrent to potential thieves. However, I note from my records that most of the incidents are reported by store security, so the venue currently operates them.

The Chief Officer of Police is therefore satisfied that if this application is granted, the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder cannot be met as crime will increase

#### Dear Sirs/ Madame

I am very concerned that Sainsbury's has asked for permission to extend their licence to sell alcohol off premises from 6 am until midnight. I think it is a very cynical and anti-social move. Cynical because the application coincides with the building of over 400 student living units in close proximity to 202-224 Portswood Road, plus the imminent arrival of an enormous number of students on the old B&Q site. I like students living in the area but I am not so keen on the extra noise and anti-social behaviour in the evening from Thursday till Sunday. I think there are already enough outlets for buying alcohol. I do not understand why any retail trader needs to sell alcohol from 6 am.

The other point I would like to make is that Portswood High Street has a problem with homeless people who also have an alcohol problem. Whilst I feel very sorry for them it does discourage some potential shoppers from the area. Recently a bench had to be removed from outside the Tenovus charity shop because the drinkers were causing a problem. I would not like to make it even easier for this group of people to extend their drinking day by selling alcohol so early in the morning.

The local police and ambulance service are already overstretched and have to concentrate considerable resources on the city centre at the weekends because of drunkenness and anti-social behaviour. Would their resources be able to also cope with policing the Portswood area. I would be interested to see if they have to respond to more incidents in the area as the new student accommodation is occupied in the coming weeks. Local residents are rather fed up with the city council kowtowing to large organisations and property developers. I feel for the residents in the immediate vicinity and all they have to put up with on a regular basis. Since Sainsbury's was granted permission to build a retail outlet on the bus garage site they have reneged on several points: they have extended the opening hours, they sold on the other half of the site so families lost out on the opportunity for affordable housing and they do not have doctors or dentists surgeries on site because the rent was pitched too high.

As local residents we strongly feel that this will lead to increased problems in this area, particularly with it encouraging people leaving the local pubs and bars after 11 and using Sainsburys as a source of late night cheap alcohol. This will lead to more anti social behaviour in the early hours of the morning as the already drunken state of the purchasers will mean the alcohol will likely be consumed and discarded in the street and our gardens (as litter, vomit and urine). There is already a plentiful supply of drunken behaviour in this area due to existing licensing decisions and to agree this one will lead to more of it on the street, rather than in the venues, and also an increase in people coming to the area to add to it. Further more the Sainsburys site is also due to become the home to a large number of elderly people, such increase in licensing hours is not respectful to that situation either.

The effects of alcohol driven antisocial behaviour are a significant concern in this area and it is important that the licensing committee demonstate recognition of that in rejection of this application.

The area of central Portswood and the district centre is already blighted by alcohol related night time antisocial behavior and is already the location of to many off licenses, restaurants, and shops that have late night licenses to serve and sell alcohol.

There us no need for a further source of late night alcohol sales which will further draw people into the district centre via the densely populated side streets that surround this location and which routinely are the site for drunken noise nuisance, antisocial behaviour and vandalism.

Another extension of any license would further exacerbate these problems. The residential area that surrounds this site is densely populated including children and pensioners and yet central Portswood has been turned into the site of an ever expanding night time economy. The police do not have appeared in recent times to engage with either local residents or councillors in terms of representations or responses to licencing applications.

However it is certain that action is required as there are apparently no late night police patrols in the Portswood area other than at of the start of the University term( as confirmed by local constabulary to local residents during local residents meetings). Outside of this time there appear to be no late night patrols to deal with any disorder which includes large numbers of large groups of drunk people moving through the area to and from licensed premises late at night.

It is also very sad that the development of the site that the was occupied by the bus depot and had (presumably) 106 agreement has seemed to deliver so little back to the local community in these terms: no social housing, no GP surgery etc.

I should like to object to Sainsbury's request for permission to retail alcohol from 6am to midnight every day of the week.

Unless the whole store is to be opened during those hours (which would also attract complaints) then I do not believe that extended hours should be granted purely for the sale of alcohol. Its pricing policies and location are likely to attract customers from a distance as well as locally, and the additional traffic at those times would just add to the noise pollution in the area, which grows with every extended opening, every extract fan installed and the growing stream of people.

I am also opposed to stores going out of their way to attract sales of materials which can pose a health risk, particularly at times which are out of normal shopping hours. # I strongly object to the above application because of the significant harm to the amenity of local residents.

This proposal to extend the opening hours would be far in excess of what is permitted for other licensed premises within the centre. A major supermarket which is open for the sale of alcohol for 18 hours a day, including Sundays, would be likely to act as a magnet attracting customers from much further afield and increase the probability of drunken anti-social behaviour in Portswood and its environs.

Portswood District Centre lies in a predominantly residential area. There are large numbers of dwellings in the immediate vicinity of Sainsbury's, including dwellings in Portswood Road, St. Denys Road, Highfield Lane, Shaftesbury Avenue and Abbotts Way. There are flats for old people directly opposite the site. If the application is allowed, it would be likely to cause noise and disturbance to local residents late at night close to the application site and in the wider area, and to set an undesirable precedent for similar proposals for late night extensions elsewhere in Portswood District Centre.

As a resident in the nearby Portswood Residents' Gardens Conservation Area, I have plenty of direct experience of the noise and nuisance caused by late night revellers congregating in parts of Portswood District Centre outside licensed premised or wending their way home, shouting and singing, dropping litter and occasionally breaking branches off young trees in the street. Extended opening hours at Sainsbury's would be very likely to increase these adverse effects on nearby residents which would be totally unacceptable.

Furthermore, there would be a significant cumulative effects of this proposal on top of the large number of existing pubs, take-aways and music venues in Portswood, Highfield and Bevois Valley which harm residential amenity.

Finally, if allowed the proposal would set an undesirable precedent and other venues in the District Centre would seek later hours than have been allowed by planning conditions or on appeal in the past, especially on Sundays. It is simply not reasonable to allow such late night operation of alcohol sales so close to homes and to a quiet Conservation Area of family dwellings. Portswood District Centre should be a local shopping and service centre for surrounding neighbourhoods, not one of the eating, drinking and music hot-spots of the night-time economy. Areas such as the Civic Centre and waterfront are much better suited to this role.

I would be grateful if you would refer this application to the Panel for consideration.

I write to strongly object to this application to increase the existing hours for the sale of alcohol from 7am to11pm, to 6am to 12 midnight.

- 1. The hours sought for the sale of alcohol- 7am to 12 midnight- 18 hours a day- 7 days a week –would be excessive, particularly on Sunday. The premises are on the edge of the Portswood District Centre (DC) where there are more than 20 licensed premises. None of those premises licensed to sell alcohol, within the District Centre, have such long hours or are licensed to sell it as early as 6am. The majority of shops selling alcohol locally close at midnight, or before, especially on Sundays. If granted, others would be forced to seek longer hours in order to compete, increasing the sale and consumption of alcohol in the area.
- 2. <u>Such increased hours from such a large Superstore</u>, selling alcohol at discounted supermarket prices, would lead to a huge increase in the amount of alcohol consumed; attract people from outside the area and consequently an increased risk of drunkenness and rowdy behaviour causing:
- a ) Noise and disturbance and
- b) Anti- social behaviour
- c) Litter (discarded cans and bottles) and

d) even Crime (e.g. damage to cars)

- --- <u>in the DC-</u> at extremely early hours and late- and even later after closing hours with people congregating outside the premises,
- ----and on their way home through the nearby residential roads, in the early hours, after closing time, when the only police cover is centrally monitored (local police now cover for the whole City, rather than the local area, so there is no specific police cover in the area).
- 3. <u>Such extended hours would be particularly unsuitable here</u>. Sainsburys Superstore is situated at the edge of Portswood District Centre, which is a small District Centre, 200 metres long, and surrounded predominantly by a densely

# populated residential area. <u>Local residents nearby and in nearby roads, all of</u> which are residential, would be adversely affected by all of 2) above.

In particular, the houses opposite, and the Churchill retirement home being built next door - as well as Victoria Lodge, an old peoples home on Highfield Lane opposite would be affected. In addition, it should be noted that student accommodation, for 433 students, is being built next door on Portswood Road. Extended hours would encourage students to continue drinking early and late.

4. <u>Portswood Residents Gardens Conservation Area</u> (comprising Highfield Lane, Abbotts Way, Russell Place and Brookvale Road), whose key feature is that of a' quiet residential area' is within 50 metres of the premises, - and whose roads lie on the way back to the University, for students, <u>would similarly be adversely affected by</u> all of 2) above.

# 5. I live in Russell Place, and my back garden is about 100 m away from these premises.

- **a)** We are at times disturbed by <u>noise</u>, <u>late at night</u>, from the DC, especially in the summer months, when the windows are open. <u>Such long and early hours for an off</u> licence, would increase this, at unacceptably early and late hours.
- **b**) We already suffer from <u>litter in Russell Place</u>, and regularly collect empty cans and bottles. Such long hours selling alcohol off the premises is likely to add to this.
- 6.The extended hours would necessitate earlier store opening- leading to noise and disturbance from customers and staff arriving, on foot or by car, even earlier (e.g. 5am), and departing even later (e.g. 1am). This would be unacceptable for a predominantly residential area..

For these reasons, I ask that this application is refused.

I should be obliged if you would take these comments into account when considering this application.

As neighbouring residents to this supermarket, we wish to object to the application for a variation of the premises licence.

The hours which are sought are from 6.am to midnight every day, which are an excessive number of hours for a premises in what is a predominantly local and residential area.

There are already many shops in Portswood which are allowed to sell alcohol, but none from as early as 6.00am, and most of which shut earlier than midnight, especially on Sunday.

Such excessive hours would lead to the attraction of people from outside the immediate area, which would increase a risk of crime and disorder, particularly in the early morning and late at night.
