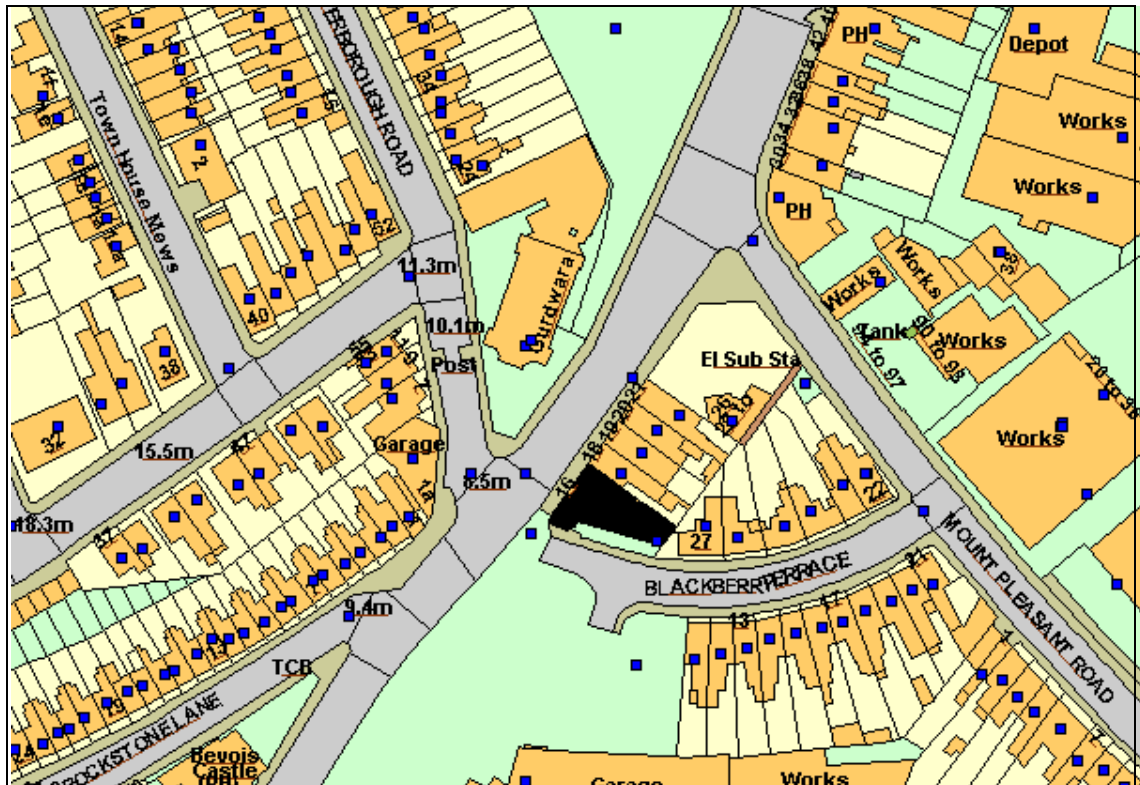

Legal Implications

1. Where the Police give notice (stating that the Chief Officer of Police is satisfied that the exceptional circumstances of the case are such that granting the application would undermine the crime prevention objective and stating their reasons) the authority must –
 - (a) hold a hearing to consider it, unless the authority, the applicant and the Chief Officer of Police who gave the notice agree that a hearing is unnecessary, and
 - (b) having regard to the notice, reject the application if it considers it necessary for the promotion of the crime prevention objective to do so.
2. The decision making panel, in considering an application, must have regard to the notice, adopted Statement of Licensing Policy and any relevant representations of the applicant.
3. An applicant, whose application has been rejected, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Likewise the Chief Officer of Police may appeal against a decision to grant the application.
4. Where an application is granted or rejected, the relevant licensing authority must give a notice to that effect to –
 - (a) the applicant,
 - (b) the proposed individual and
 - (c) the Chief Officer of Police for the police area (or each police area) in which the premises are situated.

The notice must state the authority's reasons for granting or rejecting the application. Where the application is granted, the notice must specify the time when the variation takes effect.
5. In considering this application the panel will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider applications in accordance with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, and amending secondary legislation and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the panel must make its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.

The panel must also have regard to:-

6. *Crime and Disorder Act 1998*
Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the Council under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.
7. *Human Rights Act 1998*
The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the Council to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the Council that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of Proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the Council which affects another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matter set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

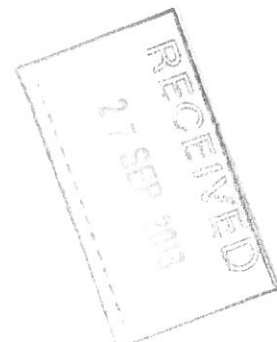



Hampshire Constabulary objects to Jacqueline Barclay being the proposed designated premise supervisor for Inferno, Southampton under the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety objectives. Jacqueline Barclay has convictions for relevant offences under The Licensing Act 2003.

The facts surrounding the convictions are:

During September 2011 it had been reported to the Police that numerous packets of cigarettes had been stolen from the student union bar at Southampton Solent University. During that time Jacqueline had been employed as bar manager on a temporary basis. All staff were advised that an investigation would take place into the theft. On the 23/24th September 2011 Jacqueline brought a hand written letter to the manager, the letter claimed to be from the cleaner; the letter admitted to the theft of the cigarettes and contained 5 twenty pound notes. After further investigation CCTV footage showed Jacqueline entering the Student Union empty handed and leaving holding a white carrier bag which was believed to contain packets of cigarettes.

After Jacqueline was informed of the CCTV footage, she emailed management admitting to the theft of the cigarettes and that she had placed the five twenty pound notes and the written letter, not the cleaner which she then pretended to find and hand to the the manager (Appendix A). This shows that not only did Jacqueline commit the offence of Theft but she was also dishonest by forging a letter trying to make it appear that someone else was responsible for the theft.

Jacqueline was charged for the offence of Theft by employee at West Hampshire Magistrates and on the 12/06/2012 was sentenced to community order until 11/06/2012, unpaid work requirement 40 hours, costs of £85.00 and Supervision requirement order revoked until 18/10/2012. The conviction will be spent in 2017 as the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 states the time it takes for this conviction to be spent is 5 years

Jacqueline has a second relevant offence in November 2010, namely driving a motor vehicle whilst over the prescribed limit of alcohol. On 13th November 2012 Police stopped a Rover 25 registration WX52LVR due to it having no rear lights. Jacqueline smelt of intoxicating liquor and was asked to provide a breath specimen at the roadside where the

results showed positive.

On 15/02/2011, Jacqueline pleaded guilty at Southampton Magistrates Court and received a fine of £150, disqualified from driving 12 months reduced if course completed (course was completed and disqualification reduced by 91 days) and victim surcharge of £15.00. The conviction will be spent in 2016 as the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 states the time it takes for this conviction to be spent is 5 years. This again raises concerns that if Jackie herself commits the offence of drink driving she has little regard for the law and I would question her ability to prevent the sale or supply of alcohol to persons in drink as she clearly does not recognise drink driving as an offence.

Jacqueline was also convicted for the offence of 'permit premises to remain open in contravention of Police closure order.' On 23rd July 2010 a S161 Licensing Act Closure Order was served on Jacqueline Barclay, who at the time was the designated premise supervisor for Red Lion, Southampton. The order was renewed twice over the weekend and was to ensure the pub remained closed until Monday 26th July 2010. On Sunday 25th July Police received information that there was a gathering at the Red Lion. On Police attendance it showed that alcohol was being supplied inside the premise (Appendix B).

On the 14/02/2011 Jacqueline pleaded guilty at Southampton Magistrates Court and received a conditional discharge of 12 months and costs of £400.00. Although under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 the conviction has been spent it once again shows that Barclay has little regard for the law and as such is not a suitable person to be in control of licensed premises.

I am the above named person and I live at the address named overleaf. This statement will detail an incident of theft, whereby £150.00 worth of cigarettes was taken without permission. The theft occurred on 14th September 2011 at the Student Union bar, East park terrace, Southampton. During this statement I shall be mentioning the following people: The female employee, I believe is responsible for the theft, Jacqueline BARCLAY, I shall refer to her as JACKIE.

who noticed that the cigarettes had gone missing, I shall refer to him as who is the sales assistant at the Student Union bar, I shall refer to her as who is the outgoing bar manager, I shall refer to him as I shall also be mentioning who is the chef at the union; I shall refer to him as

I am the of Solent University Student union. I have held this position for approximately two years. Part of my role is to oversee the operation of the bars and the shop on campus. The student union operate two bars on site. Two managers are responsible for overseeing both bars. One of the bar managers, gave notice in May 2011 to leave the post in September 2011. The other bar manager left the post at the beginning of September after giving one weeks notice. was due to leave the post on the 16th September 2011. The students for the university were due to being arriving on 24th September for Fresher's week. Fresher's week is our busiest time and when left on the 24th, we would be left without a manager for either of the bars. At the beginning of September, we posted the position for a temporary bar manager at the local job centre and also on several websites. We received a number of applicants. We short listed four and interviewed three. JACKIE was one of the applicants we interviewed. Following a successful interview, JACKIE was hired on a temporary basis. JACKIE started working at the Student Union bar around the 12th September. For a week she was on a hand over period, which required her to shadow As part of what JACKIE and were doing that week, they rearranged the stock of cigarettes, in the cabinet ready for deliveries. On the 14th September a bag of incorrectly labelled cigarettes were set aside ready for the suppliers to collect and replace with good stock. The bag was a plain white plastic carrier bag. It contained a mixture of branded

cigarettes, in packets of ten and twenty. The cost of the cigarettes inside the bag was estimated to be between £150 and £200. Either [REDACTED] or JACKIE placed the white bag, containing the cigarettes on top of the filing cabinet which is beside the locked cabinet in the supplier's office. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were present at the time as everyone was preparing for the deliveries. On Friday 16th September, at approximately 1600hrs, [REDACTED] went to see the [REDACTED] and reported that he thought that the cigarettes had gone missing. I returned to work on Monday 19th September and was advised by [REDACTED] and the [REDACTED] about the missing cigarettes. Despite searching for the cigarettes, they remained missing. I launched an internal investigation whereby all of those who had access to the trading office between the time the cigarettes were left on the filing cabinet and [REDACTED] reporting them missing, were questioned. [REDACTED] JACKIE, I [REDACTED] were questioned about the cigarettes. All denied having any knowledge of the whereabouts of the cigarettes and no one could shed any light on the situation. The first line of questioning was completed by the 20th September. I then requested CCTV from the university cameras covering the front of the Student Union building. I was advised by the university that they had some evidence which may be of interest from the 14th September. The university, for data protection reasons, did not disclose what that evidence was. On the 22nd of September 2011, we re-interviewed [REDACTED] JACKIE, [REDACTED] [REDACTED] stated that the cigarettes were left on the filing cabinet on the 14th September. JACKIE was adamant that the cigarettes were left out on the 15th September. I took all of the evidence from the investigation and reported the incident to the Police on 26th September. On Friday 23rd or Monday 26th September, I wrote to all of the members of staff involved in the incident, that I would be reporting the theft to the Police. On Monday 26th September at approximately 1730hrs, I received a phone call from [REDACTED] stating that a short while earlier, he had been in the trading office at his desk when JACKIE walked in [REDACTED] stated that as JACKIE walked into the office, she made a sound as though she had found something and then walked over to his desk and handed him a white envelope. The envelope was addressed to [REDACTED] advised me that he had opened the envelope and found it to contain five twenty pound notes and a hand written letter. The letter admitted to the theft of the cigarettes. It had been written in a child like manner and was unsigned. [REDACTED] informed me that whilst he was trying to read the letter, JACKIE was stood over him and kept asking who it was from. I advised [REDACTED] to keep the envelope and the contents with him until I could collect it the following day. As I had reported the incident to the Police, the University released the CCTV footage to me. The CCTV footage showed JACKIE arriving at the Student Union, on the 14th September 2011, with nothing in her hands and leaving the student union later that day, carrying a plain white plastic carrier bag, which appeared to contain packets of cigarettes. On the 27th September, at approximately 0900hrs, JACKIE arrived for work. As soon as JACKIE came into the Union, I asked her to attend my office. I informed JACKIE, that we had reported the theft of the cigarettes to the Police and that we would continue to conduct our investigation alongside. I also informed her that due to the footage from CCTV, we would be suspending her, on full pay, pending the outcome of the investigation. I showed JACKIE the CCTV. JACKIE did not respond to the CCTV. I offered JACKIE the opportunity to give comment. JACKIE replied 'I'M GUTTED.' I then escorted JACKIE to her office where she collected all of her personal belongings, took the keys from her and escorted her from the building. At 1430hrs I received an



email from the following email address:  The email was from JACKIE. During the email, JACKIE admitted to the theft of the cigarettes and admitted to placing the five twenty pound notes and the hand written letter in to  as a way of 'putting things right.' At the end of the email JACKIE resigned from the post of bar manager, I responded to the email to clarify that she was resigning with immediate effect. JACKIE responded to the email by confirming that it was with immediate effect and I have had no contact with her since. At no time did JACKIE have permission to take the cigarettes. I do wish to press charges against JACKIE and I am prepared to go to court. Even though JACKIE tried to 'make things right' by paying £100 in five twenty pound notes for the cigarettes she took, she was dishonest in that she tried to make it appear that someone else was responsible. The cigarettes JACKIE stole were estimated to have cost between £150 and £200.

I have given the Police two still images taken from the CCTV, the email I received from JACKIE and the small white envelope containing the hand written letter and 5 twenty pound notes.

I would describe JACKIE as being a white female, approximately 50 years of age, approximately 5'4-5 inches in height and of medium build. JACKIE has shoulder length hair which is bleached blond. I would definitely recognise her again.

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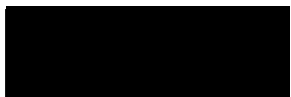
