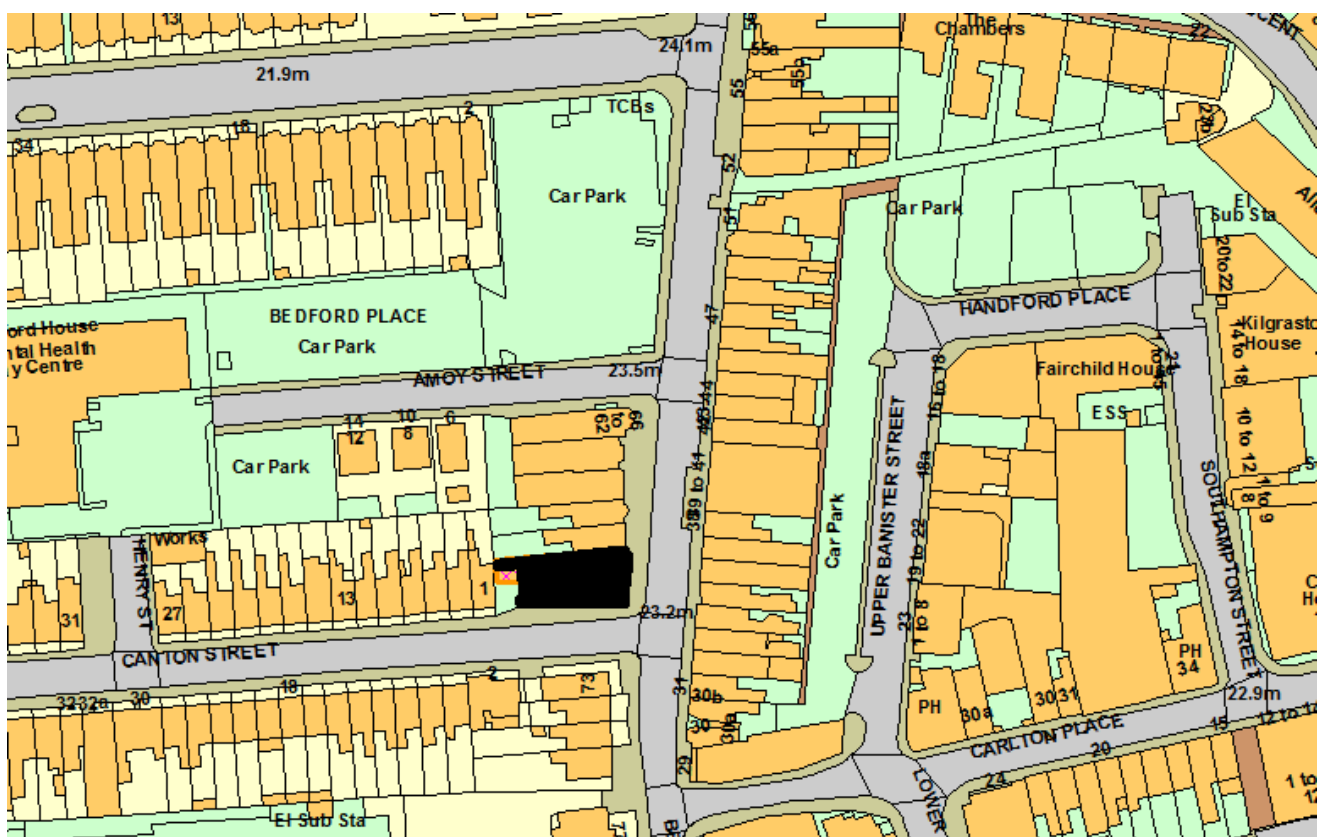

Legal Implications

1. The legislation specifically restricts the grounds on which the sub-committee may refuse an application for variation of a premises licence, or impose conditions. The legislation provides for a presumption of grant of an application for variation of a premises licence, subject to the determination of the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. In doing so the sub-committee must give appropriate weight to:
 - the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
 - the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
 - its own statement of licensing policy
 - the Statutory Guidance
2. An application may be refused in part and thereby only permit some of the licensable activities sought.
3. An applicant for variation of a premises licence whose application has been refused, or who is aggrieved by conditions imposed, may appeal against the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Any other person, who made a valid representation, may appeal to the Magistrates' Court against the decision to grant the application or against any conditions imposed.
4. In considering this application the sub-committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity and is thus obliged to consider the application in accordance, in particular, with both the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (as amended) and the rules of natural justice. The practical effect of this is that the sub-committee must make its decision based on evidence submitted in accordance with the legislation and give adequate reasons for reaching its decision.
5. The sub-committee must also have regard to:

- *The Crime and Disorder Act 1998*
Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places the sub-committee under a duty to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.
- *The Human Rights Act 1998*
The Act requires UK legislation to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the European Convention on Human Rights. It is unlawful for the sub-committee to act in a way that is incompatible (or fail to act in a way that is compatible) with the rights protected by the Act. Any action undertaken by the sub-committee that could have an effect upon another person's Human Rights must be taken having regard to the principle of proportionality - the need to balance the rights of the individual with the rights of the community as a whole. Any action taken by the sub-committee which affect another's rights must be no more onerous than is necessary in a democratic society. The matters set out in this report must be considered in light of the above obligations.

1 EMBEDDED CONDITIONS FROM THE LICENSING ACT 1964

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- (a) On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 08:00 to 23:00
- (b) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10:00 to 22:30
- (c) On Christmas Day, 12:00 to 15:00 and 19:00 to 22:30
- (d) On Good Friday, 08:00 to 22:30

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises, unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (b) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (c) the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;



Convenience Store Overview:

Convenience Store:

This is a well-established convenience store site which Martin McColl Limited have just taken over from the Co-Operative Group Food Limited. This convenience store has been designed to serve both the local community and those from further a-field. The off-licence is an important part of the service that the store offers. The variation will look to extend the opening hours and alcohol trading hours to allow the store to sell alcohol in line with the company's standard operating hours.

Security:

The digital CCTV system benefits from a recorder with image retention. Recordings can be made available to Police and other enforcement agencies upon reasonable request.

The Operation:

The store is to be operated by the manager, assisted by a team of staff. The designated premises supervisor is trained and certified through the APLH training scheme.

The manager is responsible for training all staff and keeping and maintaining ongoing training records. The **Challenge 25** trading initiative is also used at the store supported by the refusals system with records kept in the **Electronic Refusals Scanning System**.

The till scanning system has an age restricted till prompt for all age restricted products.

Challenge 25 signage is displayed throughout the store to advise customers of the Challenge 25 Policy that is in place at the store.

Section M Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General-all four licensing objectives (b, c, d, e)

1) Refusals book:

- An electronic log shall be kept of all refusals including refusals for the sale of alcohol. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that the refusals log is printed, checked, signed and dated on a weekly basis by the store manager/manageress.
- The electronic refusals log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available for inspection immediately upon request by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible authority.
- The record of refusals will be retained for 12 months.
- A till prompt system will be in operation at the store and used for the refusal of all age restricted products.

2) Challenge 25:

- There will be a Challenge 25 policy operating at the premises. Challenge 25 means that the holder of the premises licence shall ensure that every individual, who visually appears to be under 25 years of age and is seeking to purchase or be supplied with alcohol at the premises or from the premises, shall produce identification proving that individual to be 18 years of age or older.
- Acceptable identification for the purposes of age verification will include a driving licence, passport or photographic identification bearing the "PASS" logo and the persons date of birth.
- If the person seeking alcohol is unable to produce acceptable means of identification, no sale or supply of alcohol will be made to or for that person.
- 'Challenge 25' posters shall be displayed in prominent positions at the premises.

3) Training:

- Staff will be trained regarding appropriate precautions to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons under the age of 18, the signs and symptoms of drunk persons and the refusal of sale due to intoxication. Records will be kept of such training which must be signed and dated by the member of staff who has received that training.
- All staff will receive refresher training every six months as a minimum and records are to be kept of this refresher training which should be signed and dated by the member of staff who received that training.

- All training records will be made immediately available for inspection by Hampshire Constabulary and any responsible Authority upon request. Training records will be kept on the licensed premises to which they relate to.

4) CCTV:

- The premises shall have sufficient cameras located within the premises to cover all public areas including the entrance and exit and where the sale of alcohol takes place.
- CCTV warning signs to be fitted in public places.
- The CCTV system must be operating at all times whilst the premises are open for licensable activity. All equipment shall have a constant and accurate time and date generation.
- All recorded footage must be securely retained for a minimum of 28 days.
- Records must be made on a weekly basis and kept for inspection to show that the system is functioning correctly and that data is being securely retained.
- The manager, supervisor and DPS will be trained in the use of the CCTV system and can play the CCTV recordings on the system immediately to police when investigating allegations of offences or criminal activity. 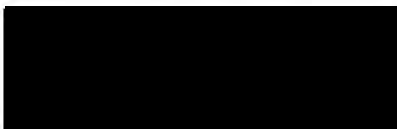

I would like to strongly object to the application for extending licensing hours to McColls convenient store based at 71 Bedford place, which also occupies some of Canton street which is a residential habitat for families and some very old people on the following grounds:-

1. **Prevention of crime** – there have already been several incidents around and about Bedford place and Canton street, where I live, due to young people misusing alcohol, especially at the weekends where plant pots have been stolen from our front gardens, cans, bottles smashed in the street, wing mirrors of cars ripped off etc. We do not want to encourage more violence or vandalism by opening more stores longer to purchase alcohol.
2. **Public nuisance** - as above, often these drunken people walk/run down our street at night, being very boisterous, loud/singing and shouting and generally being a nuisance which is very worrying as there are currently 40 elderly and very vulnerable people who live here and are very anxious about such unruly behaviour and are frightened that drunkard people will bang their doors, or worse, burgle them. We have already had a spate of burglaries in the studio/salon at no 2 Canton street last week, where monies were taken. By opening longer to purchase alcohol, this will only encourage this behaviour especially from the student populations who generally frequent the pubs/clubs in and around Bedford place.
3. **Public safety** – ditto as above, Also there are 22 single women of various ages living in the street, many of whom, as above, are 70+ live alone and some who are unwell, infirmed and disabled which is of great concern if drunken people are wandering down our streets at night.
4. **Protection of Children.** We have several small children living in the street who are up early in the mornings going school, we also have a girls catholic school (St Annes) 200 yards up the road from McColls and girls with ages ranging from 11-17 are cycling/walking to school early in the morning, and therefore we want to protect these young people from potential harm/crime and allowing alcohol to be served to people from 6am, is just not only not reasonable, but is encouraging nuisance, violence and criminal behaviour.
5. We already have a number of homeless people and victims of falling out of the system, sleeping in the doors of several commercial properties along Bedford place, their only solace often being able to consume alcohol late at night, which I'm sure you agree should not be encouraged as this can lead to criminal damage and illegal/unruly behaviours. We especially wouldn't want to encourage them to start drinking early in the morning, which is likely to happen if you allow McColls to sell alcohol from 6am.

A WOMAN fought off a sex attacker who targeted her as she walked home along a Southampton street. The 24-year-old victim had been on a night out and was walking alone along Banister Road leading into Archers Road, in the early hours of the morning when the attack happened.

The woman was approached by a man from the other side of the road.

He then sexually assaulted her, but she managed to fight him off and escape.

The victim then ran off towards The Avenue and when she was far enough away raised the alarm.

The woman rang a friend who then contacted the police.

Police say the the woman was not injured in the incident, but she was described by officers as "distraught" by what had had happened.

Police have launched a hunt to find the attacker and pleaded for help in tracking him down.

He is described as white, aged in his 30s, between 5ft 4ins and 5ft 6ins tall, of skinny build, with dark brown shaven hair and a receding hair line.

He is also said to have a brown beard, which was just longer than stubble, and was wearing a light coloured jacket with a hood and spoke with a Russian or Polish accent.

Officers have appealed for more information or any possible witnesses to the incident, which happened at around 4.20a.m on Saturday, to come forward.

Detective Constable Keith Evans, said: "I am appealing to anyone who may have been in the area at the time of the incident.

Southampton footballer Dan Seaborne has suffered serious head injuries in an attack outside a nightclub in the city.

In 12 cases similar descriptions have been given of the attacker and detectives are keeping an open mind over whether some of them are linked.

The latest victim, 20, was sexually assaulted. Days earlier, three other women were attacked in nine-hours.

Southampton University is encouraging female students to join a scheme which provides taxis paid for on account.

The most recent attack took place in St Denys Road on 8 March.

The victim was grabbed from behind and pushed to the ground by a man in an alleyway.

He threatened her saying he had a knife, then sexually assaulted her before fleeing as he heard voices approaching.

'Severely traumatised'

The victim described her attacker as 5ft 8in but said his face was covered. He spoke with, what is described as a foreign accent and was wearing a leather or hard material black jacket.

Det Sgt Tom Orchard said: "This is a distressing offence for anyone to endure and has, understandably, left this woman severely traumatised.

"We would also like to remind anyone walking alone, especially at night, to be constantly aware of their surroundings and to contact us immediately to report anything or anyone they consider to be suspicious."

Three lone women were indecently assaulted as they walked in the city between 22:00 GMT on 28 February and 07:00 on 29 February.

The assaults occurred in Banister Road, Governor Road, and in the city centre close to the Matalan store.

All three victims gave similar descriptions.

The woman who was assaulted in Banister Road believes her attacker held a knife against her.

'Personal safety'

A number of attacks occurred between late Tuesday evening and early Wednesday morning, which is one of the city's most popular student nights, but police have not confirmed the same person is responsible.

Speaking after the attack on 8 March, Det Sgt Tom Orchard added: "We are keeping an open mind about this assault and are unable to say whether it is linked to other recent incidents of indecent assault against women in Southampton."

A University of Southampton spokesman said all issues regarding student safety are treated with "utmost importance" so students are being reminded of appropriate measures to ensure their safety.

"In light of recent incidents which have occurred within the city, we have taken proactive steps to remind students about personal safety issues through a variety of means," he said.

A Southampton Rape Crisis spokeswoman said: "We understand that when there are reports of this nature within our local community it can cause increased anxiety.

"We would want to encourage people to give thought, as much as they can, to how they might take care of themselves and each other.

"For example, when planning nights out, having arrangements for how to get home, sticking with a trusted group of friends and keeping alcohol intake low can help keep people safer."

Whilst I concede that beer/lager cans, bottles/ smashed bottles and urine on street does not seem a serious

detriment everyone of those constitutes a minor "crime" as the city is a no drinking zone, completely ignored by the drinkers. Also impacts on public safety as people could cut themselves if they fell over .

Although Sainsburys do sell from 07.00 the residents did try to prevent the licence/ hours but the Government at the time did not allow objections under the Vicinity rule, therefore the Polygonians had to standby and see both Sainsburys and Co-op obtain licences.

However I was listening at a hearing where a licence was refused at a shop two doors from this McColls, it was done under the Cumulative Impact policy.

If the applicant says there is a need for alcohol at 6- 7 a.m then that need is already filled by Sainsburys. That shop is situated between a pub and a bar , whereas McColls is on the corner of a residential street. A very different matter indeed.

A diary is kept of all known misdeeds , I do attend police meetings regularly, it is horrific how many burglaries there are in Polygon and it is considered some are committed to get money for drink and drugs.

It is distressing , particularly for the many pensioners in flats in Henstead Road to find that the area has downgraded so much since every supermarket or newsagent has got a licence. But the security at the flats is good and no way to inform them individually of the added nuisance of more alcohol buying hours.

After suffering ASB and criminal damage (a few examples shown in 8 photos attached) for 25 years no one has the strength to tackle legal affairs anyway.

IT would have struck fear through the heart of any drug dealer, burglar, vandal or mugger. A convoy of police vehicles sweeping its way through Southampton yesterday, backed up with teams of officers on bicycles and on foot, flooding the streets, estates and parks. The convoy – featuring four cars and two vans – marked the launch of Operation Deluge, targeting antisocial behaviour, drug dealing, burglary and other crimes in the city's central and western neighbourhoods.

The operation involves drafting personnel from a wide range of backgrounds, including PCSOs, neighbourhood specialists, dog units and custody investigation teams, into a highvisibility taskforce targeting carefully chosen hotspot areas.

On the beat It is based on tactics used by forces in New York, and Chief Inspector Craig Dibdin said: "The public want to see more officers on the beat but we never have enough police officers available to put where we need them all the time.

"But this way we are using our resources more imaginatively and effectively creating a movable unit which can be redeployed to different areas when needed."

The Daily Echo accompanied some of yesterday's 22-strong team to the Polygon and Bedford Place areas – focusing on burglary, drug dealing and shoplifting – where they patrolled streets, car parks and alleyways and spoke to businesses and shoppers.

Later they visited Millbrook and Shirley, including Windrush Road and the Redbridge Hill areas, plus Green Park and Mansfield Park to crack down on antisocial behaviour, drugs and vandalism.

One man was arrested on suspicion of theft in Redbridge Hill, Millbrook, and there were 20 stop and searches – mainly on suspicion of drugs – plus a cannabis warning for a man stopped in Winchester Street.

The scheme will involve two more operations this month at alternative locations and times of the day to assess its success.

Chief Insp Dibdin stressed that the initiative prevented too many staff being drafted away from frontline patrols, and that it relies heavily on specific analysis to anticipate crimes in certain areas.

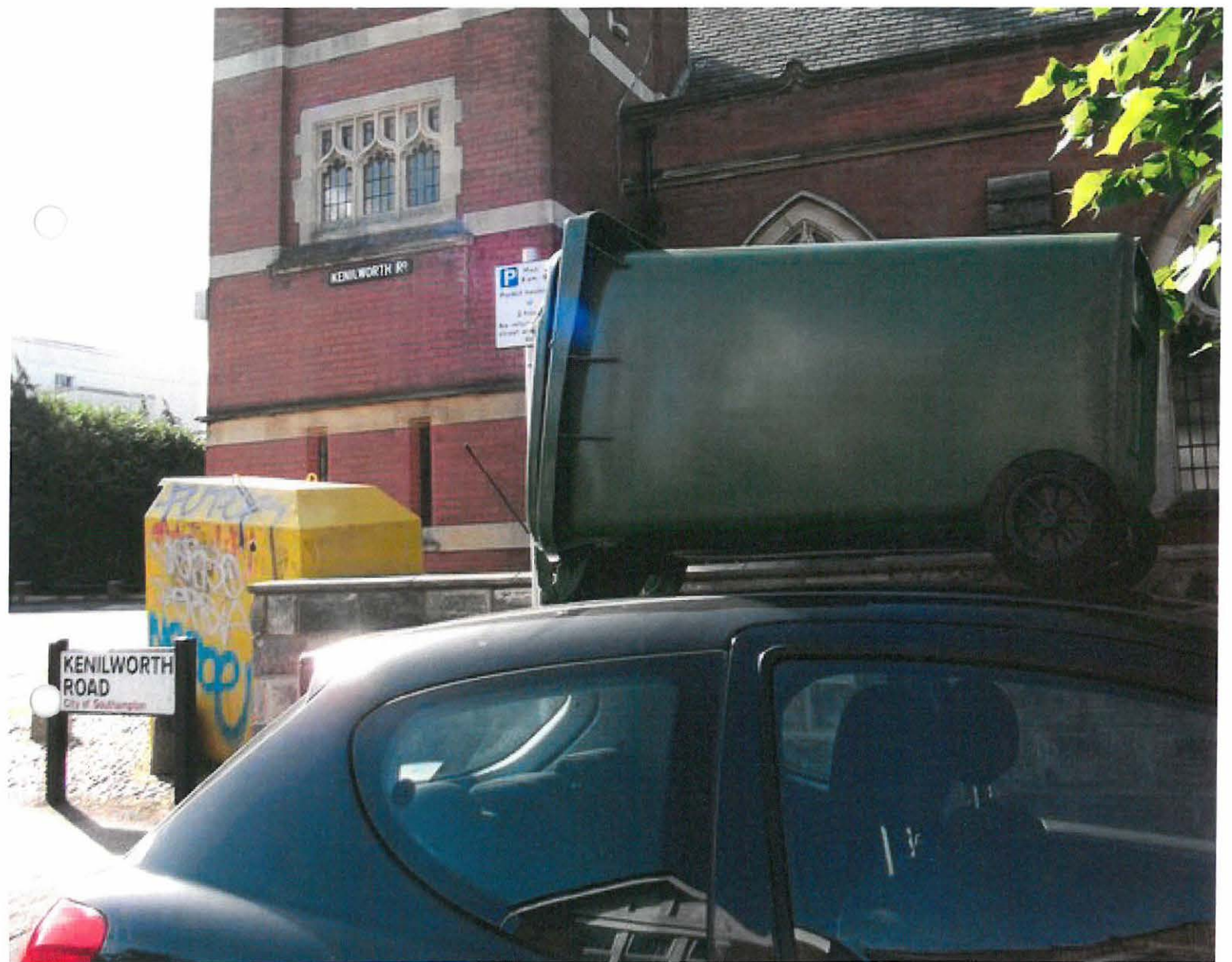
He said: "We can predict where Crime is going to happen and put policing presence in those areas."

PC Gail Clarence said: "The high visibility is a win-win for us – people notice we are out and about and we can prevent crime while putting career criminals on the back foot."

The police are constantly telling we residents not to give money to beggars and supposedly homeless people who sit outside Bedford Place off licences as they will most likely spend it on drugs and alcohol.

Having suffered the consequences of the local alcohol trade since the early 1990s, the drunken behaviour and criminal damage, noise nuisance etc

I state that the early hours of trading at this shop could cause patrons to call in on their way home from clubbing at Junk and Switch , or other venues that close at 5 or 6 a.m., become even more drunk, unable to control their behaviour or bladders, for instance on Sunday morning there were puddles of urine in Henstead Road, Carlton Place and Vernon Walk on Sunday 13th ,more on Tuesday 15th and Thursday 17th in Harborough, Kenilworth, Henstead Roads and Vernon Walk and more in Wilton Avenue to-day.
