- 5. During 2015/16 the OSMC prioritised scrutiny of the Council's transformation and estate regeneration programmes and proposals on the future of the library service.
- 6. The HOSP, alongside numerous challenging agenda items in 2015/16, scrutinised the decision of the CCG to close the Bitterne Walk-In Service and the Mazars report on the failings at Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust.

- 7. In its first full year the Children and Families Scrutiny Panel focussed on scrutinising performance, outcomes for looked after children and care leavers, and began to engage schools and colleges in discussions on educational attainment in Southampton.
- 8. The Scrutiny Inquiry Panel has just completed an inquiry into making Southampton dementia friendly. The final report will be discussed at OSMC in June before it is submitted to Cabinet for consideration.
