4.	The Bright Spots programme, developed by Coram Voice and the University of Bristol (now University of Oxford), directly addresses these gaps in our knowledge through the use of a set of well-being indicators to allow services								

5.	The Bright Spots programme aims to:  • Improve the care experience for all looked after children;								
6.	Each year a number of local authorities opt into the surveys and commission work, commit to disseminating the results, and producing action statements on how they will respond to the feedback from their children.
