Diwali is the five-day Festival of Lights, celebrated by millions of Hindus, Sikhs and Jains across the world. Diwali, which for some also coincides with harvest and new year celebrations, is a festival of new beginnings and the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness.

The festival is usually some time between October and November, with the date changing each year. This year Diwali took place over five days from 22 October to 26 October with the main day of celebration on Monday 24 October.

The word Diwali comes from the Sanskrit word *deepavali,* meaning "rows of lighted lamps". Houses, shops and public places are decorated with small oil lamps called diyas. People also enjoy fireworks and sweets too, so it's really popular with children. (www.bbc.co.uk)


Many thanks to everyone who supported the events, it was very much enjoyed by all!


'I wrote in the book and laid flowers. I will miss her' -Lynsey Megan and Lynsey signed the book of condolence at The Civic Centre.




