Early Language in everyday activities Shopping

Write a list

It's an important part of children learning to read and write to see people writing. You can also get them to do their own 'list'. Perhaps you can give them one of their own to take round the shop with pictures drawn on that they can spy / fetch.



Guessing game

Describe items as you put them on the list or as you go round the shops and see if your child can guess what they are. This is good for developing vocabulary knowledge and links. Talk about:



- What it looks / feels like e.g. it's round and bumpy and orange.
- How / What you use it for e.g. you put it on your cereal, you drink it in your cup, you eat
 it with a spoon.
- Where you might find it e.g. where it grows or where in the house you'd find / use it.
- What else it is linked with e.g. cows make it, monkey's like eating them.

We went shopping and bought...

Version of Granny's basket and is a bit of a memory game. You take it in turns to say what everyone has said beforehand and then add one e.g. We went shopping and bought milk, we went shopping and bought milk...and apples etc. You could do this with your real shopping once home and see if they can remember what you bought. You could have a bag of objects to help or give them clues like in the guessing game above.

Categories game

How many things can you think of in a particular group that have the same sound or number of syllables e.g. how many items of food beginning with 'b' (butter, banana, beef, bread, burrito) or how many bits of clothing with one clap / syllable (coat, hat, glove, shirt)






Five Currant Buns
