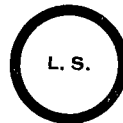
COUNTY BOROUGH OF SOUTHAMPTON.

BYE-LAW

For the good rule and government of the County Borough of Southampton and for the prevention of nuisances, made by the Council of the said County Borough in pursuance of Section 23 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, at a Meeting of the Council held on the eleventh day of December, 1912, at which forty-seven Members of the Council were present, being not less than two-thirds of the whole number of the Council.

Any person other than a Teacher, or a Child, or a Manager, Member or Officer of the Local Education Authority, or other duly authorized person, being in or on the buildings, playground, or other premises of any Public Elementary School, who, after being requested to depart therefrom by the Head Teacher or the Teacher acting as the Head Teacher of such School, refuses to depart therefrom and makes use of any violent, abusive, profane, indecent, or obscene language, or otherwise behaves in a disorderly manner, shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding five pounds.
