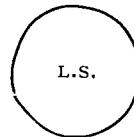

BYE LAW

Made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Southampton, acting by the Council of the said Borough, (under Section 23. of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882), at a Meeting held on Wednesday, the 24th day of May, 1899; two thirds at least of the whole number of the Council being present.

Any person who shall frequent and use any street or other public space within the Borough, either on behalf of himself or any other person, for the purpose of bookmaking, or betting, or wagering, or agreeing to bet or wager with any person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

Given under the Common Seal of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses this twenty-fourth day of May, 1899.
