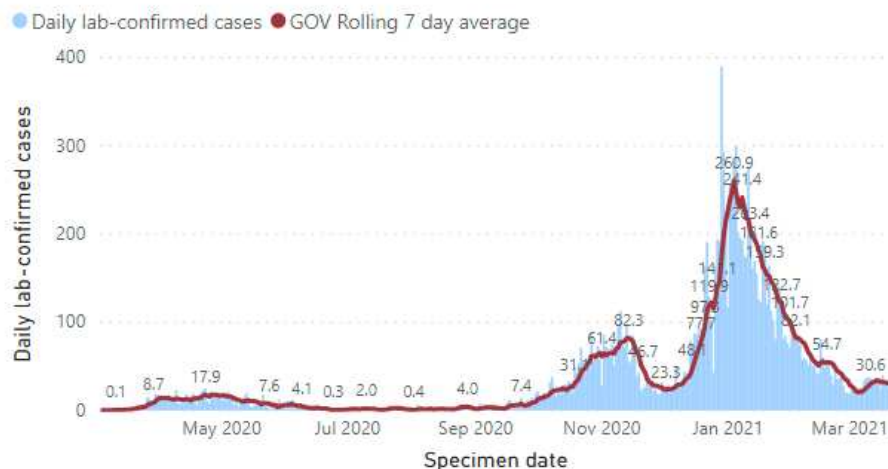

Number of COVID-19 cases per day and 7-day rolling average in Southampton for selected dates



There have been **14,180 confirmed cases** of COVID-19 in **Southampton** (includes both pillar 1 and 2 cases). There were **214 confirmed cases** in the **last 7 days**, which is an **reduction** of **12** compared to the **previous 7 days**.

Data is correct at time of publication, but is subject to change due to reporting delays and corrections. Therefore, any changes in the number of infections should be **interpreted alongside overall trends**, as there will be daily fluctuations. It is more important to consider any **sustained increases or decreases** that may occur.

The chart to the left shows the **daily number of confirmed cases** and the **7 day moving average** (to smooth out fluctuations) in Southampton. Recent data suggests COVID-19 infections are continuing to reduce but infection rates are still high.

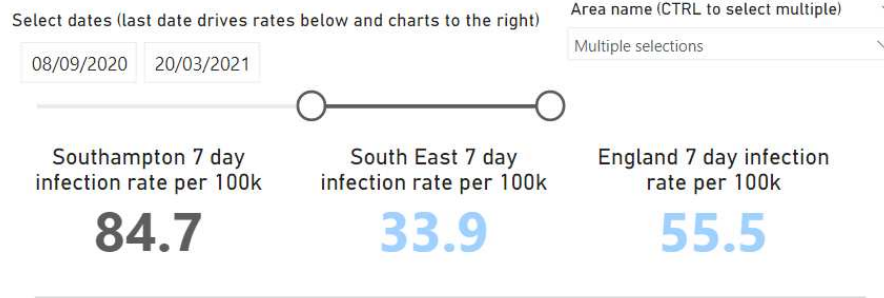

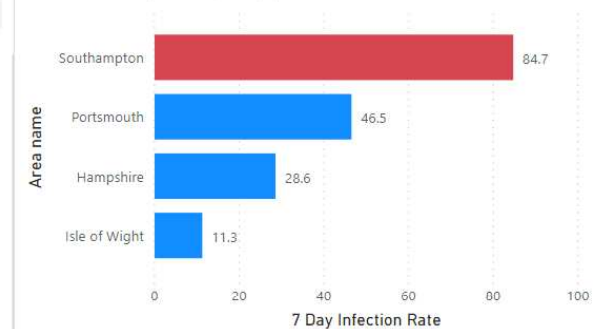

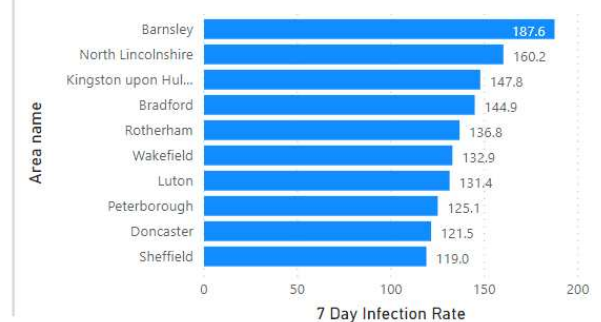

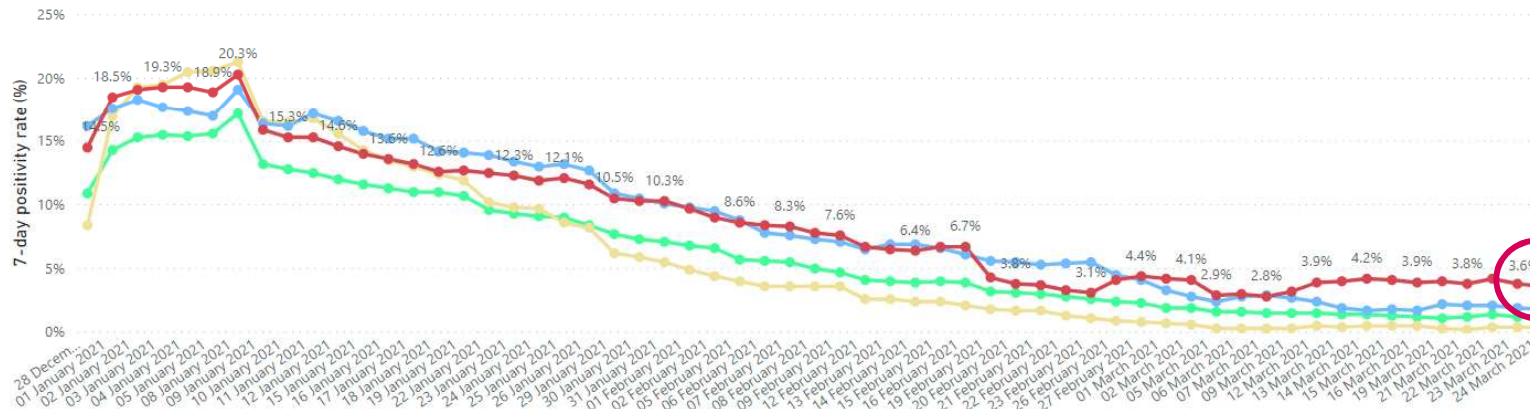

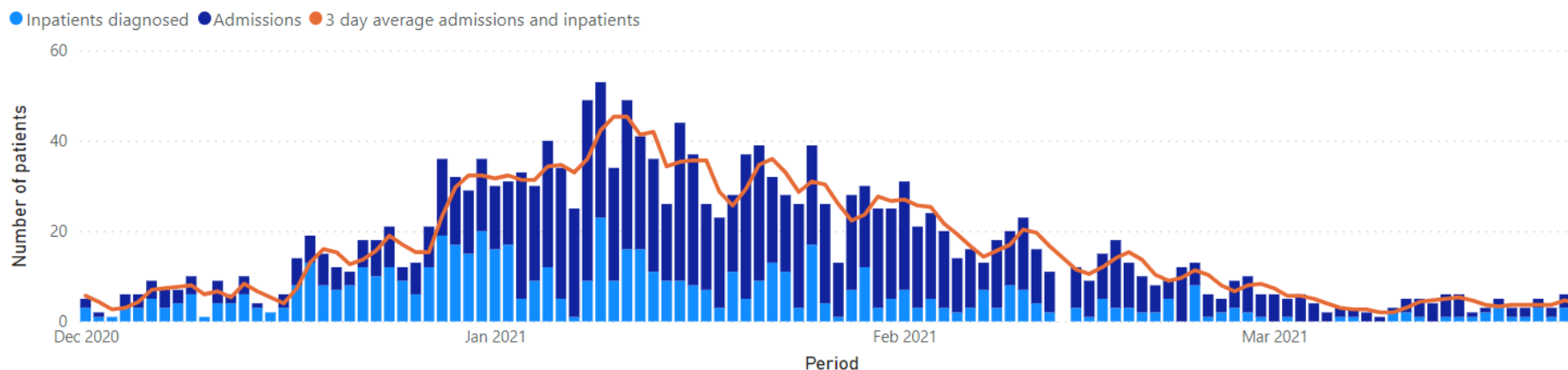

University Hospital Southampton - number of COVID-19 admissions, in last 24 hours, by age group



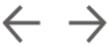

The chart above shows the trend in the total number of new COVID-19 inpatient diagnoses and admissions in the last 24 hours at University Hospital Southampton (UHS). This includes all patients at UHS, not just Southampton residents. In the last 7 days up to 24th March, there were **28 new cases** at UHS, which is a **reduction of -3** cases from the **previous 7 days**.

There have been a total of **374** COVID-19 related resident deaths in Southampton. There was **4** COVID-19 related deaths in the most recent week, which is **an increase of +4** when compared to the previous week.

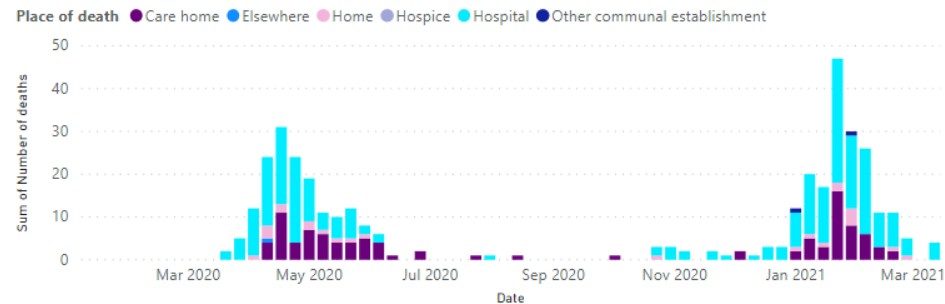
The chart to the right shows the number of COVID-19 related deaths by week and setting.

Latest data shows that there was **5 COVID-19** related deaths in **University Hospital Southampton (UHS)** between the 10th March up to 16th March. This data is different from that published by ONS as it doesn't necessarily include Southampton residents, only those who have died at UHS.

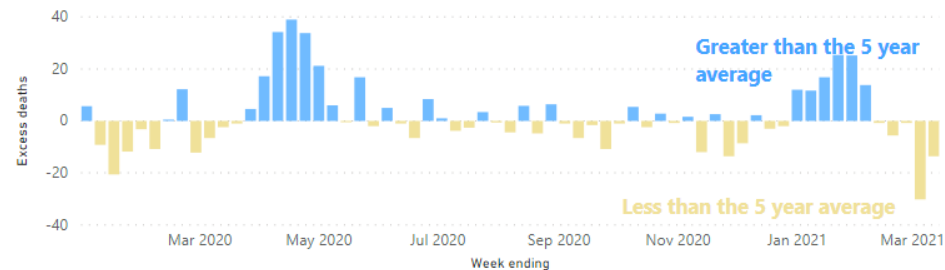
Excess deaths (COVID and non-COVID)

In Southampton, **resident deaths** are now at **lower levels** compared to previous years as shown in the graph to the right. This shows the death occurrence by week compared to the average deaths count, by week, for the years 2015 to 2019.

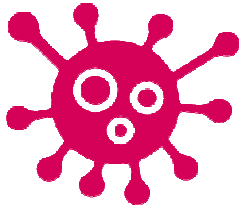

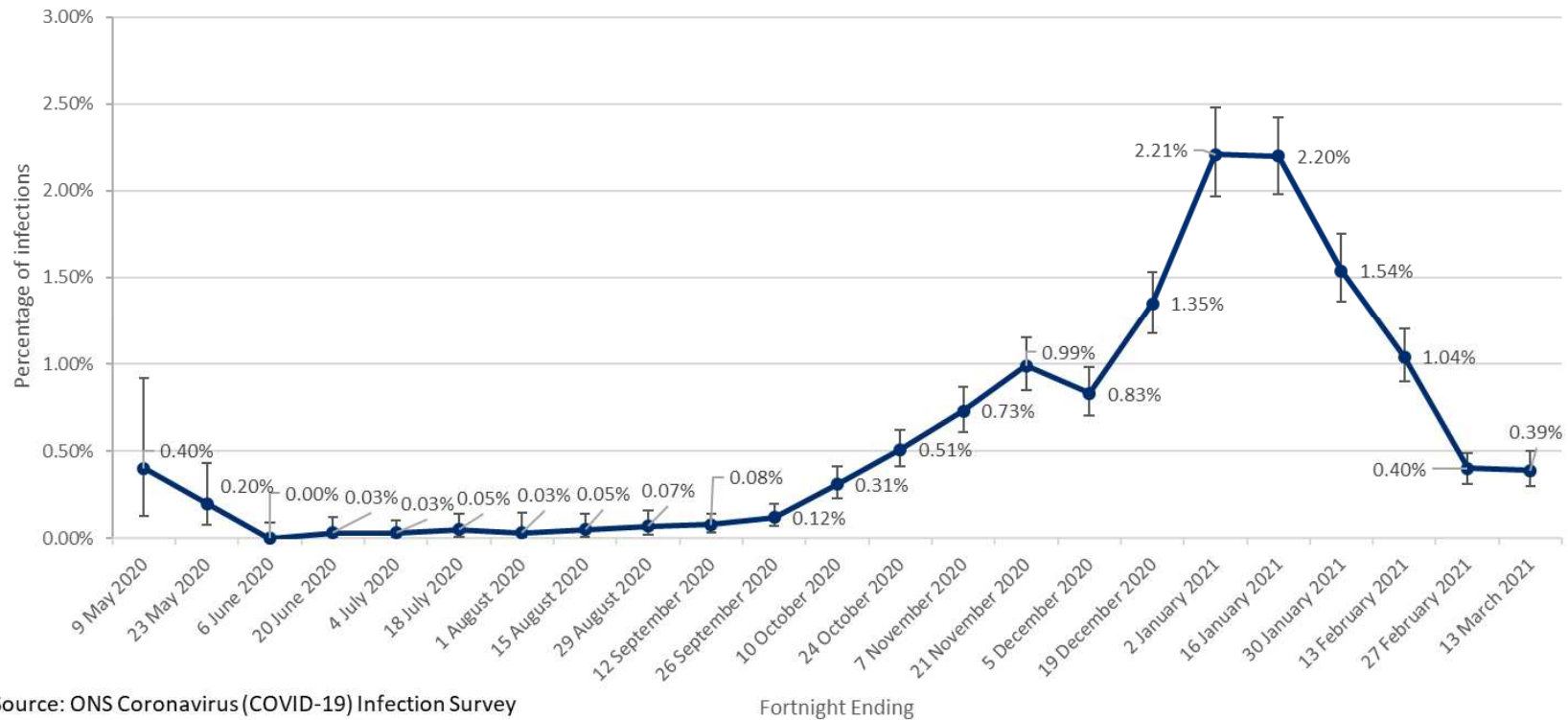

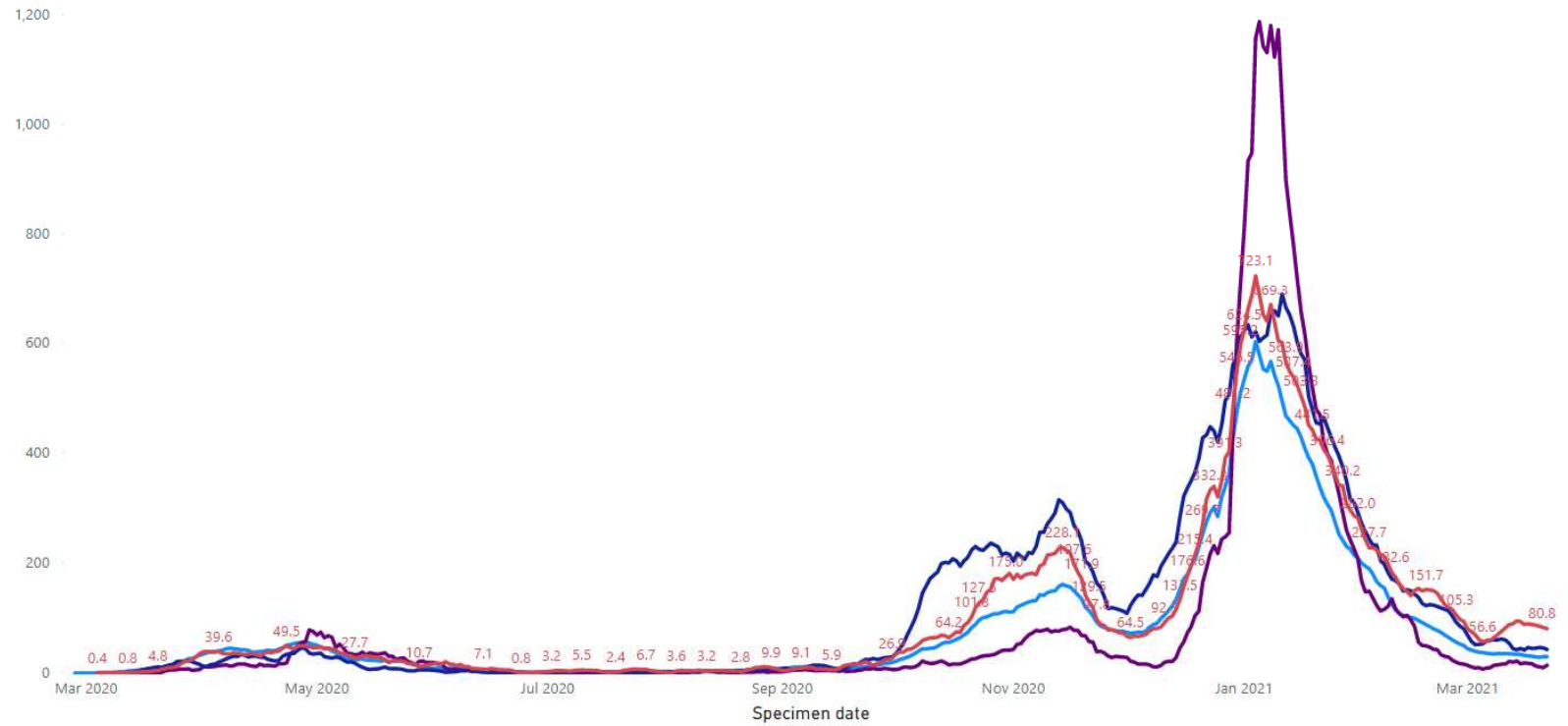

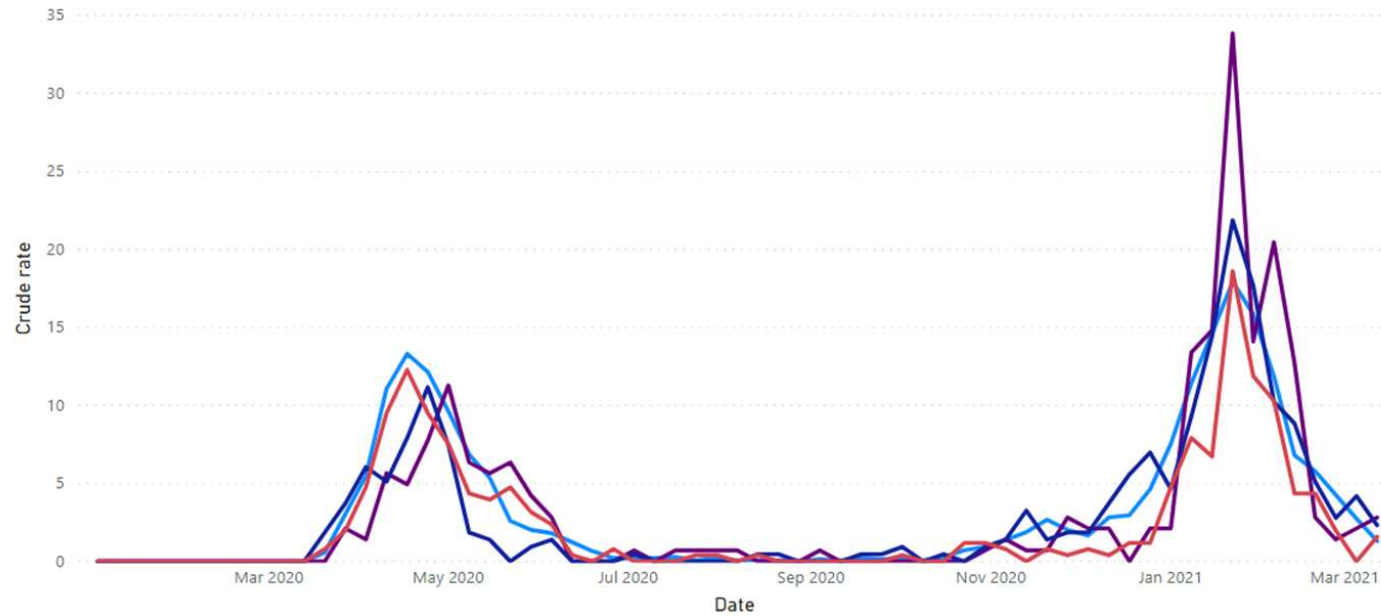

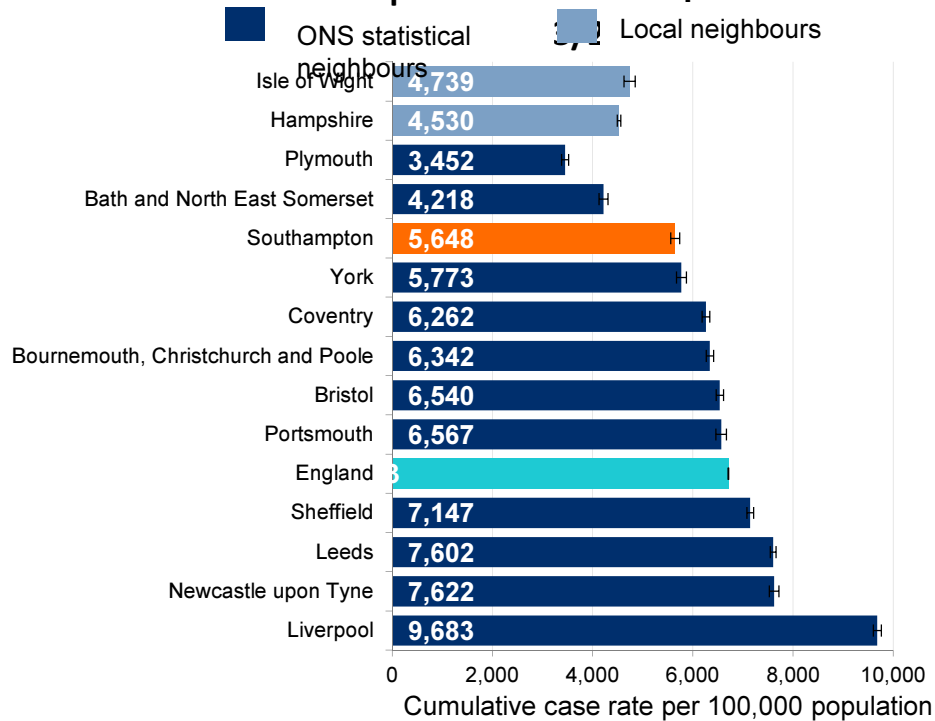
COVID-19 deaths crude rate by week (Deaths per 100k population)

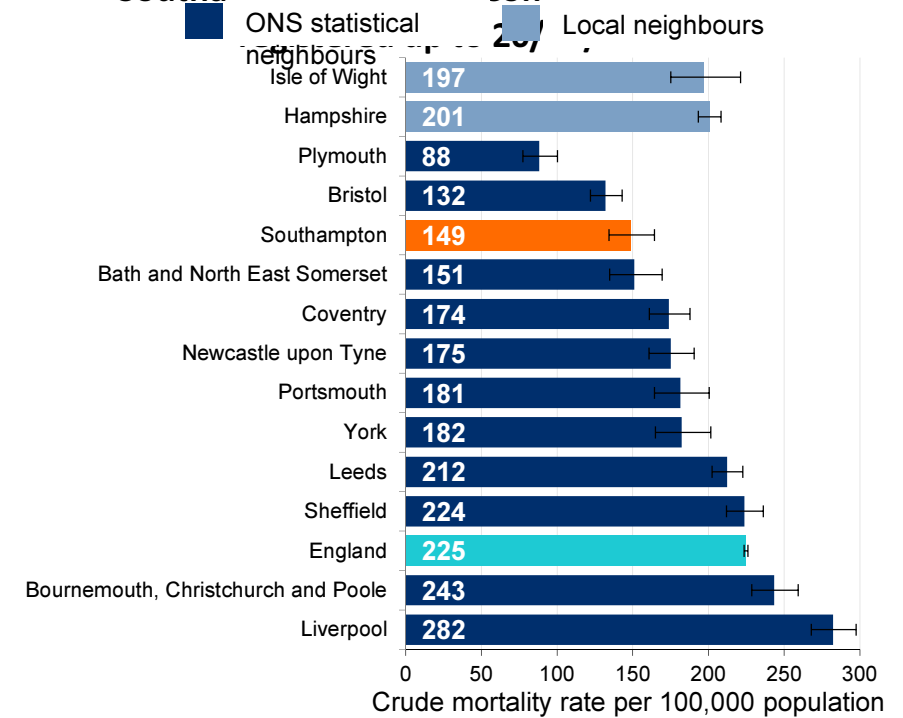


Cumulative case rate per 100,000 population: Southampton and ONS Comparators as at

Weekly COVID-19 updates

It is important that data and information provided on the coronavirus outbreak is timely, accurate and interpreted in line with changes to policy and recording. Therefore, a coronavirus infographic report will be published weekly on this page to help inform members of the public of the current coronavirus situation in Southampton. The report summarises some of the key information published by the government, Public Health England and other agencies which can be used to monitor the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic both nationally and locally in Southampton.



The report contains information on the number of coronavirus cases, the rate of cases among the resident population, coronavirus related deaths, including where people have died and the number of people reporting coronavirus symptoms through NHS Pathways (for example, 999 calls, 111 calls and 111 online). Links to the data used in the report can be found in the resources section below.

Comparisons in the report are made with the latest 7 days available data to the previous 7 days of data. Weekly variations in data, in the number of cases for example, is to be expected. Therefore, any changes should be interpreted alongside the overall trend, with sustained increases being more important than daily fluctuations. It is also important to highlight that the data in these reports, especially most recent figures, are subject to revision. Data presented in these reports are correct at the time of publishing, but historic reports available here may not necessarily reflect the current most up to date published figures. Why symptom free testing is important

- **One in three** people with COVID-19 don't have any symptoms and **could be passing it to others without knowing**.
- It will **help us to break chains of transmission**, reduce episodes of absenteeism and associated operational challenges.
- It will help to **keep key services and businesses running** in the city.
- It is **one important tool** of many that will help us move back to normality.
- Even if someone has had the **vaccine**, they **still need to do the symptom free testing**

Who can have symptom free testing?

- **People** who live or work in Southampton and **can't work from home**
- People who have **sustained contact with school children and early years**
- This includes **anyone living in households of children, members of support bubbles, childcare** and those in **related occupations**



What a rapid test involves

- Self-test
- Overseen by a testing 'operative'
- Screened station/booth to undertake the test in privacy
- Throat and nose swab
- Results by text or email within a couple of hours
- Register for a test prior to, or on arrival at, the site

- 

Remove your face covering. Look inside your mouth, and find your tonsils at the back of the throat. You can use the mirror to help. Your tonsils or where they would have been (if they are removed) are where you will swab your sample.
- 

Gently blow your nose into a tissue. Throw the used tissue into the healthcare waste bin provided. This is so that you get rid of excess mucus.
- 


Use hand sanitiser to clean your hands. This is so that you do not contaminate the test kit.
- 


Check if there is a swab in a sealed pack in front of you. Identify the soft, fabric tip of the swab.
- 

Open the package and gently take out the swab. This will be used for both tonsil and nose.

Important: Do not touch your tongue, teeth, cheeks, gums, or any other surfaces with the fabric tip of the swab. The swab is invalid if it touches these parts, and you will need to get a new swab. If this happens ask a member of staff to get assistance.

Important: The swabbing may feel uncomfortable. Do not insert the swab any deeper if you feel strong resistance or pain. If there is blood or vomit on the swab sample, please alert a member of staff.

- 

Holding the swab between your fingers, open your mouth wide and rub the fabric tip of the swab over both tonsils (or where they would have been). Do this with firm contact 4 times on each side (use a mirror to help you do this). Carefully remove the swab stick from the back of your throat.
- 

Put the same swab gently into one nostril until you feel a slight resistance (about 2.5cm or 1 inch up your nose). Roll the swab firmly around the inside of the nostril, making 10 complete circles and slowly remove it.

Important: After collecting the sample hold the swab upright in your hand, do not put it down and notify one of the Testing assistants. Be careful not to touch any surfaces with the swab. Put on your face covering.

Follow the instructions from a member of staff on what to do next.

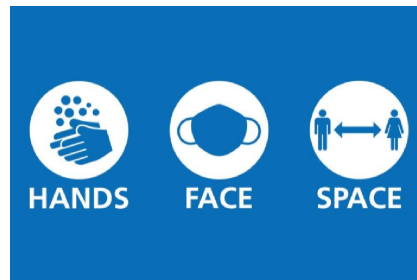

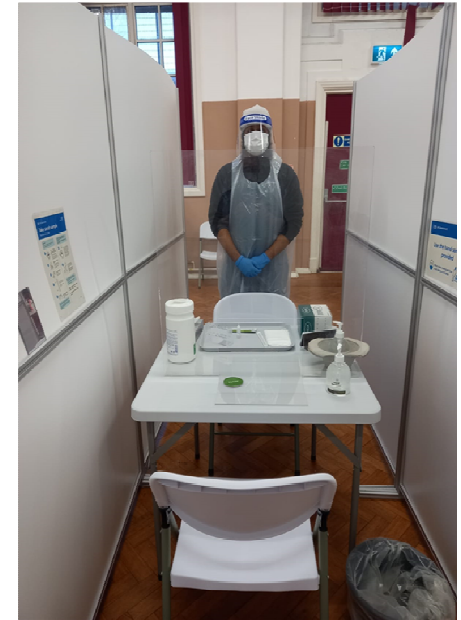

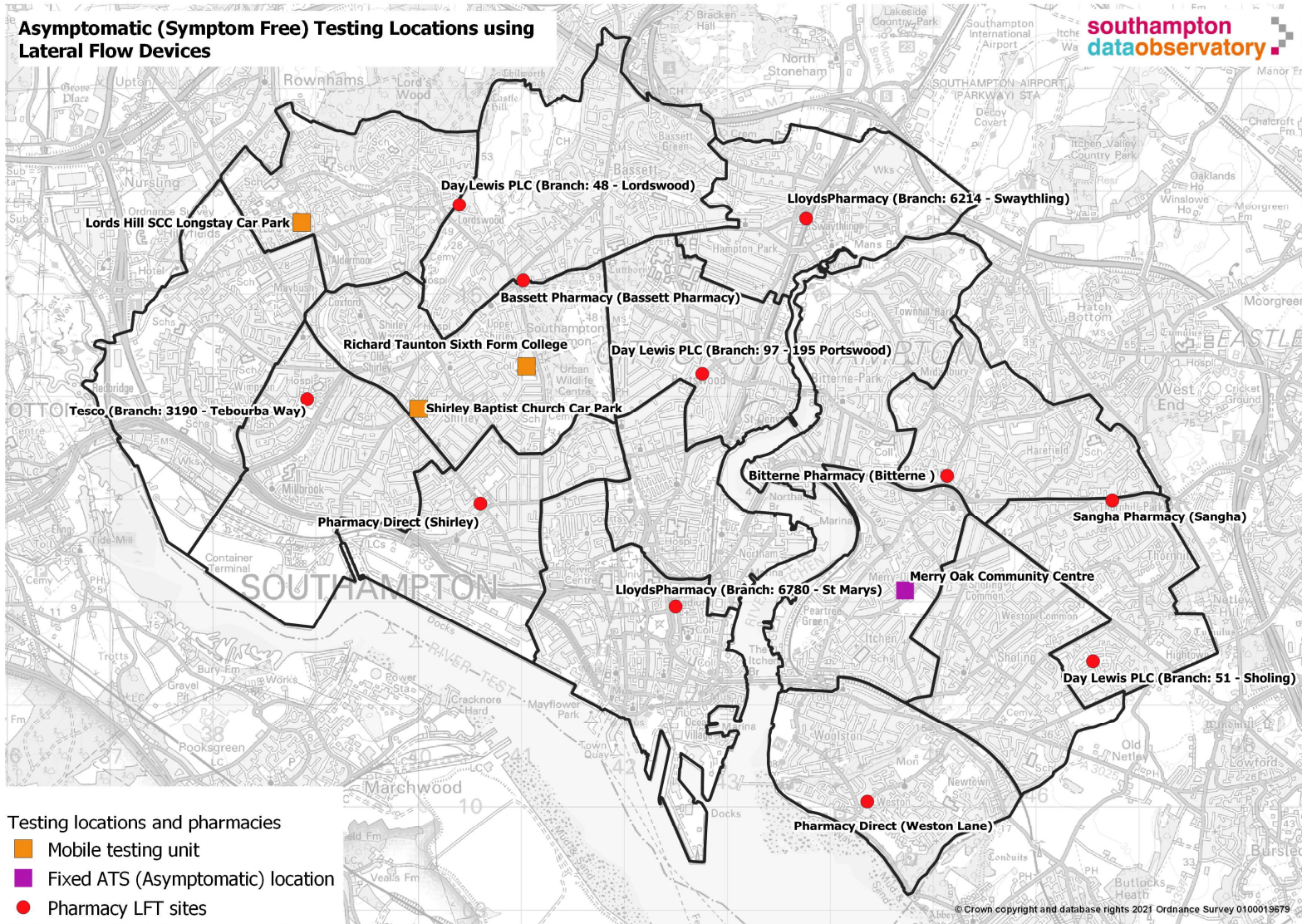
How people can access rapid tests

- At a local test site, which includes 10 community pharmacies
- By collecting a home test kit from one of the SCC local test sites from Tuesday 30 March, or one of the existing symptomatic testing sites (open for LFT collection in afternoons)
- By ordering a home test kit, if you cannot get to a test site
- Through your workplace if this is offered by your employer

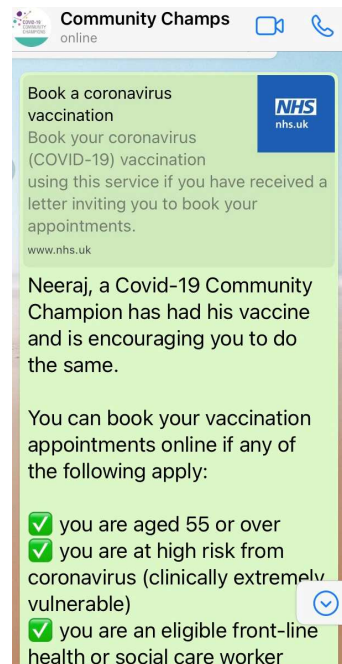

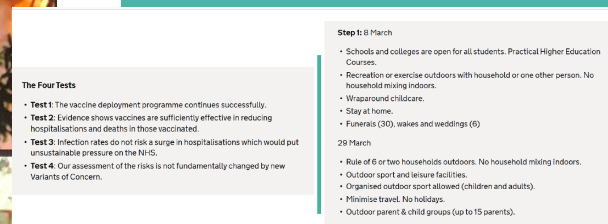
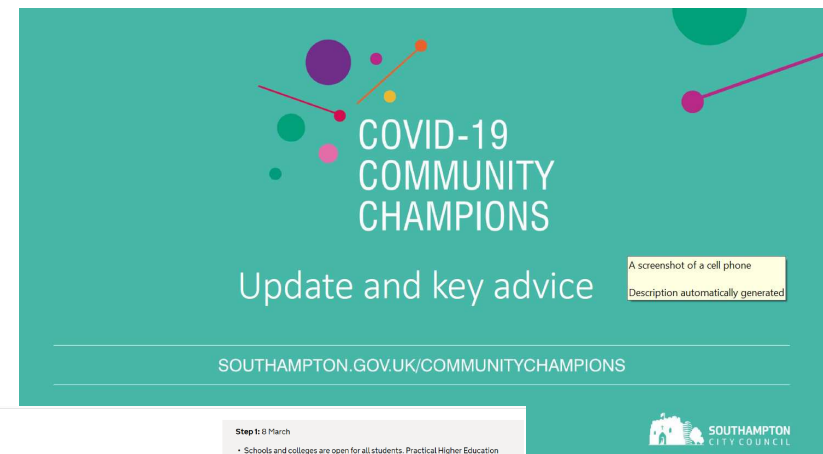

- The Thursday drop in is used to get to know champions. It's a more information social session.

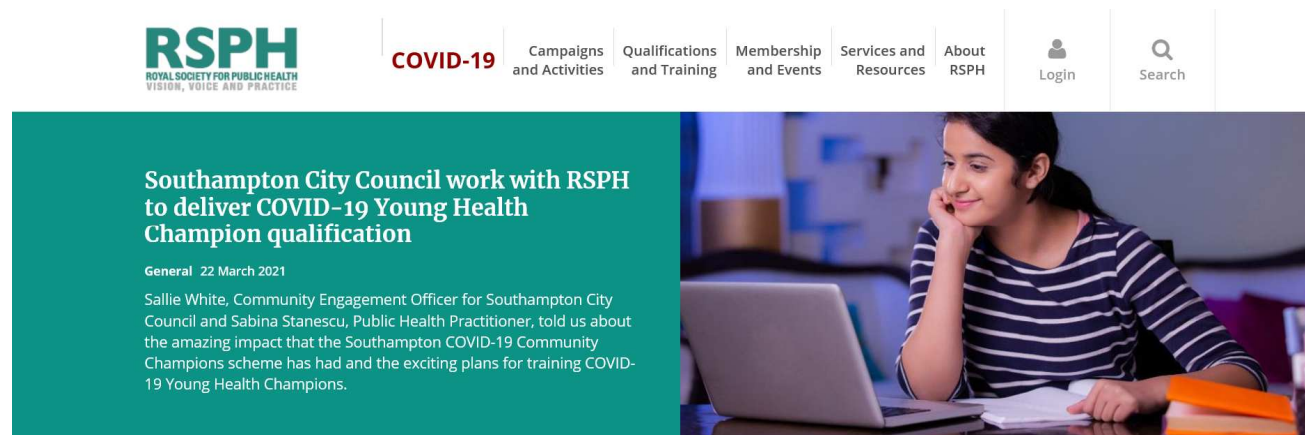

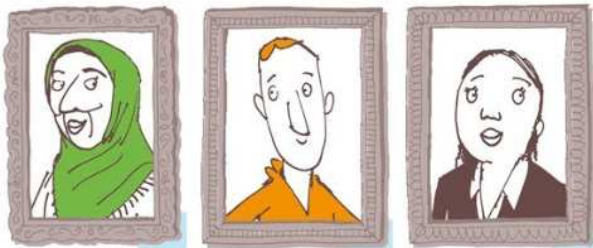

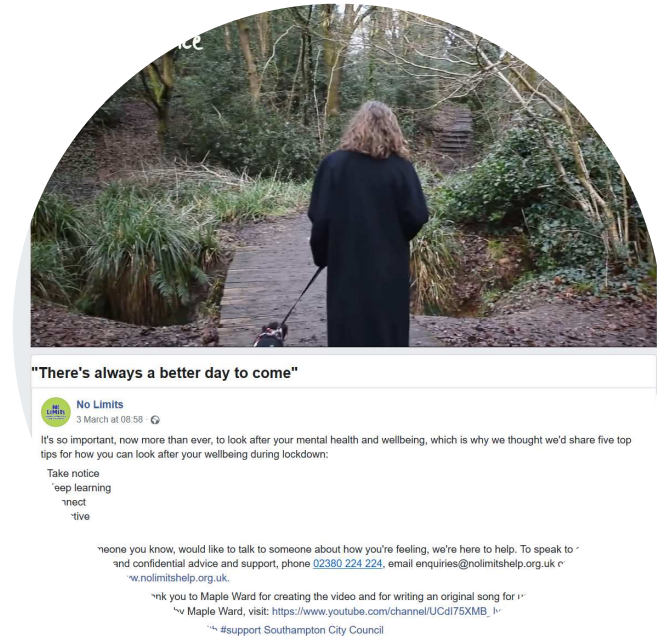

- Circa 240k adults registered with Southampton City practices
- As of today
 - Circa 103k first doses & 15k second doses
 - Over 80's = 95%
 - 65-69 = 90%
 - 50-59 = 75% and rising

 - Some variation by neighbourhood with lower uptake in areas with higher levels of deprivation

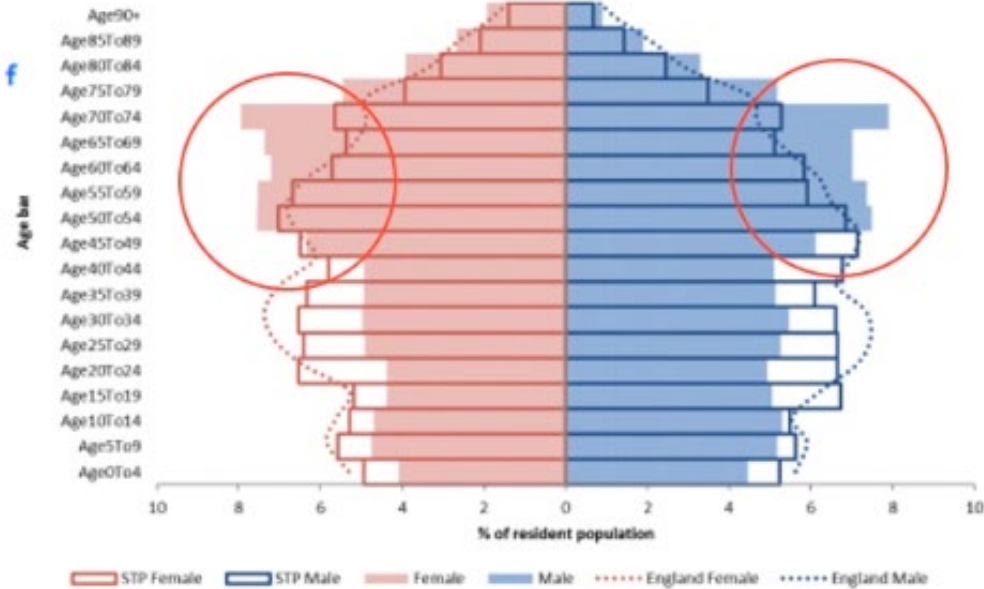

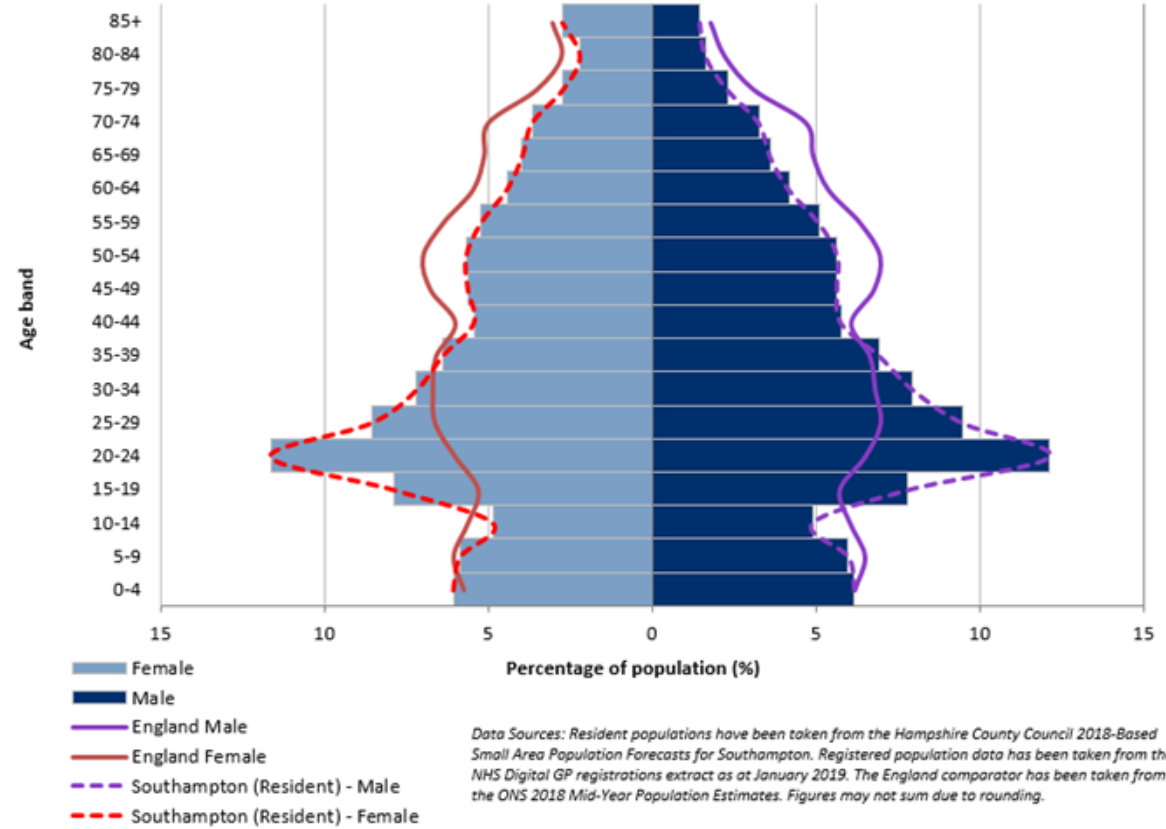
Population pyramid for registered population as at March 2019
