| 4.                | The 15 local authorities and two LEPs in the Hampshire and Isle of Wight (HIOW) area are continuing to work up proposals for devolved powers and funding from central government, to boost local economic growth and productivity and transform public services. HIOW was the only area nationally to propose foregoing Revenue Support Grants in exchange for retention of 100% business rates, and this initiative was subsequently announced for national roll-out at the Autumn Conservative Party Conference. In addition, local proposals focus on accelerated housing delivery, business growth, skills and employment support, transport and infrastructure investment, as well as integrated working across public sector agencies. At the time of drafting this report, a challenge session is being arranged with Greg Clark, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government in November. |             |                                 |          |                   |  |
| 5.                | Given our financial constraints and the level of savings we have to make in the future, we cannot delivery everything we currently do. We have to make difficult decisions and in identifying our main priorities, we have considered the feedback from residents on our priorities consultation. - Southampton is a vibrant modern city that functions for residents and businesses, a place where everybody works together to keep it looking clean and attractive.
- Over the last 18 months, we have been making efforts to significantly improve opportunities for citizens to engage with us. In addition to the traditional approaches of working with residents and tenants, this has included:
  - Improvements in the way in which we communicate and consult on our budget proposals, greater use of digital technology, easier methods for people to engage in specific issues
  - Working with the University and the Southern Policy Centre to pilot innovative techniques such as 'citizen science' and 'deliberative consultation' and our pledge in 2014 to establish a People's Panel, as part of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of gaining City status.
- 7. I am delighted that we now have over 1,000 members who have signed up for the People's Panel and have now completed a dozen polls and 3 surveys, averaging a response rate of over 65%. These consultations have covered a range of topics:
  - What is the best thing about living in Southampton?
  - Are you aware that health and social care are going to be working more closely together to provide a joined up service?
  - How strongly do you feel you belong to your local area?
  - Do you know who your local councillors are?
  - If you could change one thing about research and consultation from public bodies in Southampton, what would it be?
  - Which of the following modes of transport do you use most often?
  - Have you heard about the Dino Encounter exhibition coming to SeaCity Museum from 13th June 2015?
  - Overall, how often in the last 12 months have you volunteered or given unpaid help to any group, club or organisation?
  - Have you ever heard of a council statutory notice?
  - Which of the following items would you dispose of in your recycling bin with a blue lid?
  - What would be your ideal way of reporting a pothole?
  - Which of the following events did you attend this summer?
  - City markets
  - Community safety
  - Priorities
- 8. Citizen science is a research approach that allows local people to get involved in the whole research process. It is essentially science conducted by residents with support for professionals or academics. The benefit of this is the understanding of local areas and the honesty that can come from the research being conducted by a neighbour or local person rather than an external body. We are working with the University of Southampton on this and we are one of the first councils to use this research methodology in the country. 'Understanding barriers to recycling' is the topic for the first citizen science research pilot for the People's Panel. We held two information dropins with members of the People's Panel and interested individuals and have over 40 people who want to become citizen scientists for this pilot.
- 9. As mentioned in my report to July Council, we have worked with the

|     | Southern Policy Centre to pilot a new approach in community engagement, "deliberative consultation". The first session in July was attended by around 40 participants recruited through the People's Panel, and focused on issues around 'Prevention and Early Intervention'. Feedback from participants was overwhelmingly positive and they wanted to see more such events, and were particularly pleased that the Council was enabling them to play such a constructive part in formulating its policies. We are working with the Southern Policy Centre to run another deliberative consultation session on 28 <sup>th</sup> November 2015, focusing on issues around Housing and Planning policies.   |  |  |  |  |

lower incomes and others in the city, and between boys' and girls' educational achievements. The tenth Emotional Literacy Conference, reflecting the importance of children's emotional and mental health led by the Council's Educational Psychologists have held their 10th. A range of events have been held around Southampton aimed at ending the stigma associated with mental health as part of World Mental Health Day on 10 October 2015. These included a park run, theatre and a pop-up village. We have been encouraging more parents of two-year-olds in Southampton 16 who are eligible for free early education to claim their places at a childminder, preschool or nursery. The offer of free early years' education is open to the most disadvantaged two year olds with the aim of supporting them to be nursery and school-ready. The places give children the chance to make friends their own age and take part in play-based activities that they may not be able to do at home. PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE 17 The Council's Fostering Services are trialling a number of innovative new methods to try and attract new foster carers and reach a wider cross-section of the population. Some of the city's foster carers have supported these events, attending and talking to prospective foster carers about the challenges and rewards of fostering. The most recent of these events was held at Sainsbury's in Shirley on the 2 October 2015. This event was a success, with a number of enquiries received. 18. The Redbridge and Lordshill Primary Federation has been selected to become a Stonewall Training Partner, promoting equality in schools and tackling bullying. The school cluster will be the only training partner within a 40 mile radius, with Fairisle Junior School and Oakwood Primary leading the way. This is a project supported by the Department for Education and funded by the Government Equalities Office which allows the schools to deliver equalities training to other schools in Southampton and beyond. They will be offering 'Train the Trainer' courses, so that schools can share this vital training to all staff. 19. In light of the Syrian refugee crisis, I am proud that as a city we have agreed to receive 25 refugee families into the city over the five year period. We are working with local statutory, voluntary, community and faith organisations to ensure that those who arrive are welcomed into the city and supported as they seek to build a new life here in the coming months. We have made it clear that our offer is on the understanding that any additional expenditure will be covered by government funding. 20. The new enhanced Domestic abuse and sexual violence (DASV) early intervention and prevention service began on 1 November 2015 with implementation phased in over the period to August 2016 when it will be fully resourced. The contract was awarded to Southampton Rape crisis (SRC) as lead for a partnership of current providers of services locally. The main focus of the new service is to prioritise support, early intervention and prevention for families in the community to prevent escalation of need and to support them to stay in their homes. Something families have said they prefer where feasible and which will support new legislation to remove perpetrators from their homes for up to 28 days. GOOD QUALITY AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Council residents of 1,500 homes at Thornhill, Shirley Towers, Milner Court, 21. Albion Towers and Sturminster House are receiving £27m in energy-saving improvements, with work having started in October. These include: New windows New heating – tenant controlled External wall insulation New roofs Coloured rendering The improvements are part of a scheme being delivered in partnership with Southampton City Council and British Gas, under the Energy Companies Obligation (ECO), which obliges larger suppliers to deliver energy efficiency measures to domestic premises in Britain. Residents of International Way, Weston, recently received similar energy-saving improvements in more than 500 homes. 22. The Council has provided tenants with advice on how to reduce condensation and its impact. We have also signposted them to the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service website to help prevent fires in the home, particularly with regard to having an open fire. On 20 October 2015, Cabinet approved the Ethelburt Avenue Conservation 23. Area Appraisal and Management Plan which replaces the original Design Guide published in 1993. This Plan was developed following extensive consultation and is designed to ensure that residents within this conservation area have a clear set of guidelines and policies that will enable them to plan future changes in a manner consistent with the significance of the area. A key element of this was agreeing how changes to windows could be enabled which would be both cost-effective and environmentally friendly for the home-owners, and in keeping with the design of the buildings. The Environment Centre in partnership with Southampton City Council and 24. Southampton City CCG has just won a British Gas Energy Trust Bid worth £500K. A range of interventions will be offered with the aim of reducing the impact of living in cold homes particularly for those on low incomes and with chronic health conditions. **SERVICES FOR ALL** 25. On 20 October 2015, Cabinet approved the Policy and Strategy documents which form part of the revised Highways Asset Management Plan (HAMP). This will ensure the Council adopts an effective methodology for maintaining highways assets, and that most cost effective service is provided. The Government, through the Highways Maintenance Efficiency Programme, has decided that 10% of the future annual maintenance allocation of the Local Transport Plan will be issued through an Incentive Fund. In order to achieve the highest allocation through the fund, it is necessary to have in place a comprehensive HAMP and be able to demonstrate that it is at the heart of spending decisions and influences how the council approaches the management of assets. 26. The council is continuing to encourage residents to recycle more. Recently a new advertising campaign has been launched regarding home composting bins and the 'Green Johanna' food composter, both available at less than half price, for residents. CITY PRIDE

The Southampton Cenotaph designed by Sir Edwin Landseer Lutyens was 27. originally unveiled on 6 November 1920, and was later updated to commemorate servicemen and women who lost their lives in other conflicts. More recently the names were becoming illegible so were transferred to glass panels to make them more accessible. The Cenotaph was first listed in 1981 as Grade II (two), then upgraded to II\* (two star). It has now (28 Oct 2015) been upgraded again by Historic England to Grade 1 (one). The listing includes the new glass panels. 28. It has continued to be a successful couple of months for events in Southampton: On 18 September 2015, the Art Gallery opened a major new exhibition by artist Ben Johnson, 'Spirit of Place' has attracted considerable interest. and has featured on BBC Radio 4. The Southampton Boat Show ran between 11 – 20 September and more than 100,000 visitors attended the annual maritime event. It remains the largest on-water boat show in Northern Europe. An annual fireworks display was held on 7 November in Mayflower Park and was arranged by the Round Table. The annual Remembrance Service was held on 8 November at the Cenotaph and Guildhall Square. There were also a range of arts-based events which the council supported, including Music in the City which was held on 3 and 4 October 2015. This annual music event specialises in music in unusual places and attracted an estimated 15,000 people to various venues across the city centre. Southampton also held its first festival of words, SO: TO SPEAK. between 23 October and 1 November 2015. This took place in venues across the city, attracting local writers and comprising a range of literary events. o Black History Month was also a significant success, with a wide range of events being held, including theatre, music, cinema and exhibitions. 29. A number of charitable events took place, including Seven Weeks of Worship, a series of events held in Guildhall Square and the city's parks which included the creative arts, during which local residents have collaborated with schools, colleges and universities to raise hope, awareness and funds for 30 countries that have been traumatised by persecution, hostility and injustice through the work of 'Release International'. Another new event, Run for Chocolate, will be held on 14 November 2015. This will take place on Southampton Common, with runners celebrating fitness and wellbeing being rewarded with chocolate. An online resource library aimed at small community groups has been 30. developed, and is hosted on the council's website. It comprises 'how to' guides, templates and policies to help them improve their experience of getting involved in their local community. A SUSTAINABLE COUNCIL A report on the General Fund Revenue Budget 2016/17 will be presented to Cabinet 31. on 18 November 2015 for decision.
