Overall strategy	
71% agreed the strategy was easy to understand. However, there were some comments that the language used in the strategy was too technical and was complicated to understand.	The strategy was reviewed and edited to make sure that the language used was clear and concise. For example, explanations for terms such as 'public health approach' and 'whole housing approach' were added.
57% agreed that the draft strategy provides sufficient information, 27 respondents felt that further information about how the outcomes will be achieved was required, including financing the proposals.	<p>The Safe City Partnership will produce an action plan setting out a detailed plan to achieve the objectives set out in the strategy.</p> <p>The 'Governance' page title has been changed to 'Delivering our Strategy', to make it clearer that this page sets out how the strategy will be achieved.</p> <p>The finance element is delivered by each partner's core budget and will not be covered in the strategy.</p>
64% felt that the draft strategy will have a positive impact on themselves.	The Strategy has been assessed on a strategic assessment of crime and disorder across the whole community. An Equality and Safety Impact Assessment has been completed which considers the impact of the strategy on people with protected characteristics.
83 respondents provided suggestions for additional priorities. Of these, 42 respondents suggested increase police presence/resources/improvements.	Detailed information about police resourcing is beyond the scope of this strategy. Further information is available in police plans and strategies.
20 respondents suggested homelessness should be considered a priority.	The social causes of homelessness are beyond the scope of this strategy, which is concerned with the effects of crime and disorder. Aggressive Begging, an issue which may be connected to homelessness, is referenced in the strategy.
13 respondents suggested road safety to be a priority.	Road safety concerns are largely addressed in the 'Connected Southampton: Transport Strategy 2040'. Accordingly, they are not dealt with in detail by this strategy.
21 respondents have a lack of faith or trust that anything will happen or change.	Noted.
Priority 1	
Feeling safe in surroundings - focus on older people and vulnerable people.	No change – the strategy aims to ensure that 'people of all ages are safer and feel secure'.
Feeling safe in surroundings - focus on particular groups.	Changed 'Communicate information with local residents which will help them to keep safe' to: 'Communicate information with local residents which will help them to keep safe in a way that is accessible to all residents'.
Feeling safe in surroundings - Do not currently feel safe in certain surroundings.	Noted – the strategy aims to address this.

Feeling safe in surroundings - more streetlights.	No change to the strategy. Where data indicates need for additional lighting, provision will be addressed in relevant action plans.
Children and young people - safe places to go and activities to do.	This is an issue for the updated Children and Young People's Strategy which will be published next year.
Children and young people - focus on other groups too.	The SCP is an inclusive strategy which aims to make the whole community safer, including people with protected characteristics. The strategy's focus on particular groups, e.g. children and young people is informed by the needs assessment.
Children and young people - more preventative support.	This is an issue for the updated Children and Young People's Strategy which will be published next year.
Feedback suggests a lack of confidence that action will be taken when reporting antisocial behaviour and crime.	Added an action: 'Ensure that tools for reporting anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder or domestic abuse such as 101 are accessible and responsive, online, by phone and in person'.
Reporting antisocial behaviour and crime - Comments on Hate Crime.	'Raise awareness of hate crime' has been added as a specific objective.
Reporting antisocial behaviour and crime - make it easier to report/less complicated.	Added an action – 'Ensure that tools for reporting anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder or domestic abuse such as 101 are accessible and responsive, online, by phone and in person.'
Reporting antisocial behaviour and crime - fear of repercussions.	Added an aim to 'further develop and maintain third-party reporting, improving response and outcomes for victims'.
Suggestions for strengthening support for victims of domestic abuse.	A system-wide domestic abuse strategy will be drafted and consulted on in 2022.

Crime prevention and reduce reoffending - stronger enforcement, penalties, outcomes.	These issues are beyond the scope of the strategy. Matters for the police will be addressed in relevant police plans and strategies.
Support for potential or rehabilitating offenders - increase access to education, employment.	This is addressed in the strategy through the aim to; 'Increase support to offenders with access to accommodation, education, training, volunteering, employment, finance, debt and drug, alcohol and mental health services'.
Support for potential or rehabilitating offenders - access to drug, alcohol and mental health services.	This is addressed in the strategy through the aim to; 'Ensure support is available to high harm offenders with drug and/or alcohol dependence and/or mental health needs that do not belong in any existing pathways'.

Support for potential or rehabilitating offenders - increase access to housing and accommodation.	This is addressed in the strategy through the aim to; 'Increase support to offenders with access to accommodation, education, training, volunteering, employment, finance, debt and drug, alcohol and mental health services'.
Public health approach to understand serious violence - unsure what it means / questions about it.	Added an explanation of the public health approach under 'Our Approach'.

Build resilience in our residents, communities - More activities available / safe places to go.	This will be considered for inclusion in an action plan.
Build resilience in our residents, communities - More cohesive and inclusive communities.	The strategy aims to address this in its objective to 'Build resilience in our residents, communities including the business community, to build safer, stronger and more cohesive communities'.
Build resilience in our residents, communities - opportunities to have a say / be involved.	This will be considered for inclusion in an action plan. Police and Communities Together meetings to be reinstated where feasible, via a combination of in person and online meetings.
Build resilience in our residents, communities - Comments about needing more CCTV.	This will be considered for inclusion in an action plan.
Reduce the harm to community safety from drugs and alcohol - increase enforcement.	A specific Tobacco, Alcohol and Drugs strategy will be drafted and consulted on in 2022.
Reduce the harm to community safety from drugs and alcohol - increase support.	A specific Tobacco, Alcohol and Drugs strategy will be drafted and consulted on in 2022.
Reduce the harm to community safety from drugs and alcohol - protect young people.	A specific Tobacco, Alcohol and Drugs strategy will be drafted and consulted on in 2022.
Protect from being scammed through financial and online crime – two comments asking if this is being picked up by LSAB.	This sits within the delivery plan for the SSAB Prevention and Awareness Sub Group.
Develop collaborative partnerships.	This is addressed by the strategy - developing collaborative partnerships is an intended outcome of the strategy. The Safe City Partnership brings together public, voluntary, business and community sector interests to work together for Southampton and its citizens.
Develop data and intelligence.	This is an intended outcome of the strategy; 'Develop data and intelligence gathering to enhance understanding of crime issues and community tensions'.
Strengthen response on anti-social behaviour - focus on begging.	The strategy addresses begging through an action point; 'Support City Centre initiatives that tackle aggressive begging, such as alternative giving schemes to reduce acquisitive and violent crime and allow visitors to the city to experience a safe and welcoming experience, at all hours of the day'.
